TERMS OF ADMISSION.

No pupil will be admitted into the *Primary Department* under eleven years of age.

For admission into the Higher Department, the student must be prepared to pass an examination on the studies pursued in the Primary Department. An equivalent to these studies will be taken. The student will then be required, under direction of the Faculty, to make such a selection from the prescribed course of study as will form the best preparation for future life. The course is so arranged as to suit both students of Classics and Natural Sciences; while to secure thoroughness in the work undertaken, no student, under ordinary circumstances, will be permitted to take more than six, nor less than four of the studies prescribed. The course is also arranged so as to prepare for admission to the Law Society, or for matriculation in Arts. Law. or Medicine, in the University of Toronto. Ey omitting the Classics and higher Mathematics, young ladies will find the course of study interesting, thorough, and peculiarly adapted to their wants.

For admission to the Theological Department, candidates must be prepared to pass an examination on all the studies of the first year in the Higher Department, except French. They are also required to bring letters from their respective churches, either licensing them to preach, or approving of their studying for the ministry. Prior to full admission, they are required to submit to a Committee, chosen by the Trustees, a statement of their Christian experience and call to the ministry. Unless in very exceptional cases, every student for the ministry should take the full course of prescribed study; and those whose age and means will permit, are strongly recommended to take one or two additional years in the Literary Department, before entering the Junior Class of the Theological Department. The examinations for admission will be strict and thorough.

EXAMINATIONS.

Examinations of all the Classes in the Primary and Higher Departments are held either at the close of the term, during which each study has been pursued, or at the end of the year. The Theological Classes will hereafter be examined during the second week of September at the commencement of the Academic year. These examinations are conducted with the assistance of Committees appointed for that purpose.

MERIT-ROLLS AND DIPLOMAS.

A daily record is kept by each of the Teachers of the recitation and deportment of every student in a class; and this, in connection with the terminal examination, decides the position of the student on the Merit-Roll made up at the close of every term. Diplomas will be granted to those students who have pursued a full course of study, either in the Literary or Theological Departments, and have sustained good examinations thereon.

RELIGIOUS EXERCISES.

All students are required to attend, twice every Lord's day, such church as their parents or guardians may prefer. There are two Prayer Meetings held weekly; and a Bible Class is taught by the Principal every Sabbath afternoon. Attendance at the Prayer Meetings and Bible Class is optional. All students are required to attend chapel prayers every morning.

SOCIETIES.

There are two societies connected with the Institute,—the Adelphian. a Literary Society; and the Judson Missionary Society. The Literary Society is composed entirely of male students, and holds weekly meetings. The Missionary Society is composed of both males and females, and holds monthly meetings, at which Lectures are delivered, and Essays on topics of a missionary character are presented.

TERMS.

The Academic year commences about the middle of September. It is divided into three terms, two of 13 weeks each, and one of 14 weeks. The first term ends three days previous to Christmas, and is followed by a vacation of two weeks. The second term commences the second week of January, continues till the second week of April, and is followed by a vacation of one week. The third term commences about the middle of April, and continues till the middle of July.

Students, who come on Scholarships, must bring their documents with them, in order that the tuition given may be endorsed on them. Students for the ministry who have passed the entrance examination to the Junior Class in Theology, and have been accepted by the Examining Committee, receive tuition free. An Education Society has been formed to help those students for the ministry who may require aid.

All Bills must be paid in advance. Students, who prefer it, may obtain board in such private families as are approved of; but males and females are not expected to board in the same family. The Faculty, however, are unanimous in recommending all the students, and especially the ladies, to board in the Institution. Those who do so are required to furnish bed-clothes, pillows, and towels; and also fuel, provided they use a stove in their rooms.
