FIFTH MEETING of the Municipal Council of  
the Township of York. May 6, 1861.

Present—the Reeve and Councillors Bull  
Morse, Maginn, and Shepard.

Communications received from A. M. Clark,  
Esq., Wm. Gamble, Esq., and W. H. Norris,  
Esq.—Received and read.

Mr. Maginn presented the petition of Wm.  
Lenox, praying for a Tavern License.—Received  
and read.

Mr. Morse presented the petition of A. Mc-  
Clelland, praying for a reduction of taxes.—  
Received and read.

Mr. Morse presented the petition of John  
Fraser and others, praying that Wm. Watson be  
appointed Collector of the Western Division of  
the Township for the year 1861.—Received and  
read

Mr. Morse presented the petition of George S. Ross, praying for a Tavern License.--Received and read.

Mr. Bull presented the report of the Committee appointed to inspect the crossing at the Base Line of the Township on the Northern Railway.—Report received.

Mr. Maginn presented the petition of John Hogg and thirty-one others, praying to be allowed their Statute Labour to construct a side-walk on Yonge street.—Received and read.

Mr. Bull presented an application from the Trustees of School Section No. 21, praying for a loan to the section of \$500.—Received and read.

Mr. Morse presented a communication from F. Paddington, informing the Council that he declines taking out a Tavern License.—Received and read.

Mr. Bull presented the petition of J. P. Ross, praying for a grant of money to aid Mrs. McDonell, an indigent person.—Received and read.

Moved by Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Bull, *Resolved*,—That the petitions of George Ross, Robert Moodie, and Wm. Lenox be granted, and that the Inspectors be authorized to inspect the houses, and, if found qualified, to grant certificates to each of the above named persons.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Maginn,

*Resolved*,—That the overseer of road division No. 21 be, and he is hereby authorized to perform

such portion of the statute labour in his division as he may think proper upon that portion of the Don Mills Road running south-east from Thomas Hill's to the gravel road.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Bull,  
*Resolved*,—That William Brown be appointed Collector for the West Assessment District, and that Wm. Mulholland be appointed Collector for the Eastern Assessment District of this Municipality for the current year, and that five per cent. be the rate allowed for collecting.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Shepard,  
*Resolved*,—That the petition of Mrs. McDonell (whose husband is now in the asylum), praying for some assistance from the Council be granted, and that the sum of twelve dollars be paid to the order of Joseph Watson for the benefit of Mrs. McDonell.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Maginn,  
*Resolved*,—That the petition of Henry Dennis, Esq., on behalf of the Trustees of School Section No. 21 be granted.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Shepard,  
*Resolved*,—That the Clerk notify the Secretary of the Northern Railway Company that the Council has reconsidered the Road Crossing on the Base Line, and that they have now adopted the alteration referred to in the resolution passed on the 5th of November last, a copy of which was forwarded to the Road Company on conditions that the said Railway Company pay to the Treasurer of this Council \$100 towards paying for the land previous to establishing said road.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Morse,  
*Resolved*,—That the Clerk be instructed to notify the Superintendent of the Toronto Branch of the Great Western Railway, that this Council intends to open the public highway through Lot 32, broken front, running from the Lake Shore Road to the Lake, thereby crossing the railway.  
—Carried.

Mr. Bull introduced a By-law to commute certain Statute Labour to construct a side-walk on Yonge street from Yorkville to No. 6, inclusive.

The Council went into committee upon the By-Law

Mr. Shepard in the chair.

The Committee rose and reported the By-Law as amended.

The By-Law was then read a third time and passed.

Mr. Bull introduced a By-Law to amend a By-Law appointing Township Officers for 1861.

The Council went into committee upon the By-Law.

The Committee rose and reported the By-Law as adopted.

The By-Law was then read a third time and passed.

The Council then adjourned to meet at the Prospect House, on Monday, the 22nd day of May instant, at 10 o'clock A. M.

SIXTH MEETING of the Municipal Council of the Township of York, 22nd May, 1861.

Present,—The Reeve and Councillors Bull, Morse, Maginn and Shepard.

The Council met in Court of Revision.

There being no appeals the assessment rolls were examined, and upon motion of Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Shepard, the assessment of Morris Fitzgerrald was reduced \$100.

The Court then adjourned to meet on Thursday the 30th of May instant, at 2 o'clock P. M.

The Council then resumed, and proceeded to business.

Mr. Maginn presented the petition of Wm. Sanderson, praying to be allowed to perform his Statute Labour on a certain road.—Received and read.

Also, the petition of John Cochrane, Esq., and others, praying to be allowed to commute their Statute Labour to construct a side-walk on Yonge street.—Received and read.

Mr. Morse presented a By-Law to amend a By-Law for commuting Statute Labour on Yonge street.

The Council went into Committee upon the By-Law.

Mr. Bull in the chair.

The committee rose and reported the By-Law as amended.

The By-Law was then read a third time and passed.

Moved by Mr. Maginn, seconded by Mr. Morse,

*Resolved*,--That Henry Duncan and Mark Abby be allowed to perform their Statute Labour for the current year on the side line, between Lots 10 and 11 in the 3rd Concession east of Yonge street, and that Wm. Grey be allowed to perform his statute labour on the by-road leading past his grist mill in the third concession.--Carried.

Moved by Mr. Maginn, seconded by Mr. Shepard,

*Resolved*,--That the petition of Wm. Sander-son be granted, allowing him to perform his statute labour on the road leading from his residence to Yonge street.--Carried.

Moved by Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Shepard,

*Resolved*,--That the prayer of the petition of John Cochrane and sixteen others, and also of J. W. Hogg and 31 others be not granted.--Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Shepard,

*Resolved*,--That the Clerk be requested to notify Richard McDonell to remove his fence from off the public road where it encroaches on the Brockton Road, north of Dundas street.--Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Maginn,

*Resolved*,--That W. R. Wadsworth, Esq., be appointed arbitrator on behalf of this Township, relative to the purchase of the land necessary for the alteration of the public road at the cross-



ing of the Railroad, on the base line of the Township in the rear of Lots 33 and 34.—Carried.

The Council then adjourned to meet at the Prospect House, in Court of Revision, on Thursday the 30th instant, at 2 o'clock P. M.

#### SEVENTH MEETING of the Municipal Council of the Township of York, 30th May, 1861.

Present,—The Reeve and Councillors Bull, Morse, Maginn, and Shepard.

Petitions presented and read :

Of Joseph Holly, praying the Council to establish a road leading from the Weston plank road to the Humber Bridge.

Of Henry Sheppard and 30 others, praying for a transfer of Tavern License.

Of Henry Sheppard and five others, praying to be relieved from a fine imposed for selling spirituous liquors without a license.

Of B. A. Irwin, James Marks and John Luny, praying for a license to sell liquors at the Races, on the Carlton Race Course.

Of Dr. C. J. Philbrick for professional services examining lunatics for admission to the Asylum.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Maginn, moves that Alexander Duncan be allowed to perform his statute labour on the third concession east of Yonge street and south of side line between Lots 5 and 6.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Bull, moves that the petition of Dr. Philbrick be granted, and that the Treasurer be authorized to pay him the sum of \$50 out of the general funds of the Township, in full of his account.—Carried.

Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Morse, moves that the By-Law for the regulation of houses of entertainment be amended, by allowing the Inspectors to grant permission to Licensed Tavernkeepers in the Municipality to sell liquors and other refreshments on the Carlton Race Course, and Don and Danforth Course, for any period of time not exceeding three days at any one time.—Carried.

Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moves that the petition of Henry Sheppard be granted, and that the Inspector be allowed to transfer Mathers' License to Sheppard.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moves that the Trustees of School Section No. 1 be, and are hereby authorized to levy and collect the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars on the rateable property of the section for the purpose of meeting the first instalment of interest on mortgage, which interest falls due on the 18th day of June next, and that the Trustees furnish the Treasurer of the Municipality with

a receipt for the payment of the interest on the loan authorized to be raised by this Council.—Carried.

Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Morse, moves that the Clerk be instructed to notify the Inspectors of the alteration of the License By-Law.—Carried.

Mr. Bull introduced a By-Law to amend a By-Law passed the 18th day of February, 1861, for granting Tavern and Shop Licenses.

The Council went into committee upon the By-Law.

Mr. Morse in the chair.

The committee rose and reported the By-Law as adopted.

The By-Law was then read a third time and passed.

The Council adjourned to meet at the Prospect House on Monday the first day of July next, at 10 o'clock A. M.

**EIGHTH MEETING** of the Municipal Council of the Township of York, 1st July, 1861.

Present,—The Reeve and Councillors Bull, Morse, Maginn, and Shepard.

Petitions presented and read :

Of Francis Jackson and others, with reference to the side road between Lots 10 and 11.

Of Allen Grey and 18 others, praying the Council to grant a sum of money for the support of an indigent person

Of Joseph Dennis, Esq., and 99 others, praying the Council not to confirm the alteration of a certain road at the crossing of the Northern Railway at the Base Line

Of William Smith and 32 others, praying for a transfer of Tavern License.

Of the Trustees of School Section No. 18, John Boyenton and 31 others, praying for an alteration in said Section 18.

Of Hugh Laird and five others, praying the Council to remunerate Charles Edwards for

care and maintenance of Edward Hillock, deceased, being removed to the General Hospital.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Bull, moves that the prayer of the petition of Wm. Smith be granted, and that the Inspector be authorized to make a transfer of Tavern License from Perkins to the petitioner.—Carried.

Mr. Shepard, seconded by Mr. Bull, moves that Daniel Stong, Senr., be allowed to perform the whole of his labour on the Township line between York and Vaughan.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Maginn, moves that the Treasurer be authorized and required to invest the amount of Clergy Reserve Funds in hand, and also the sum to be received by this Municipality due for the present year in City or County Debentures for the benefit of this Township, and that the resolution passed on the 6th of May last on the petition of Henry Dennis and others, on behalf of the Trustees of School Section No 21 be rescinded.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Bull, moves that the Clerk be authorized to grant a special Store License to James Bary for the remainder of the current license year, and that the sum of \$20 be the amount charged therefor.—Carried.

Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moves that the petition of Hugh Laird and five others, praying that some remuneration may be granted to Charles Edwards for keeping and attending an indigent person for the term of

seven weeks be granted, and that the sum of fourteen dollars be paid by the Treasurer to the said Charles Edwards for the same.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moves that before any alteration shall be made in the boundary of school sections within the Municipality, the Council or parties intending to make application to the Council for any alteration in the boundaries of school sections shall, before any action be taken by the Council, cause the Trustees of the sections to be affected by such alteration to be served with a notice, either personally or left at their usual place of residence, which notice shall set forth the extent of the intended alteration, and that a copy of such notice be posted in at least six public places in each school section, one of which shall be at the school house in each section, interested at least twenty days before such alteration shall be confirmed by this Council.—Carried.

Mr. Shepard presented a By-Law to appoint Thomas Haysted a Pound-keeper.

The By-Law was duly read and passed.

Mr. Morse presented a By-Law to grant licenses for public exhibitions, menageries, &c.

The Council went into committee upon the By-Law.

Mr. Maginn in the chair.

The committee rose and reported the By Law as adopted.

The By-Law was then read a third time and passed.

Mr. Morse presented a By-Law to grant a sum of money for making and repairing roads and bridges.

The Council went into committee upon the By-Law.

Mr. Shepard in the chair.

The committee rose and reported progress and asked leave to sit again.—Report received.

The Council then adjourned to meet at the Prospect House, on Monday the 5th day of August next, at 11 o'clock A. M.

NINTH MEETING of the Municipal Council of the Township of York, 5th August, 1861.

Present,—The Reeve and Councillors Bull, Morse, Maginn and Shepard.

Petitions presented and read :

Of Thomas Davidson and 21 others, praying for a special grant to build a bridge across the River Don.

Of James Ashdown, praying to be relieved from the payment of certain fines imposed on him.

A communication was received and read from John McDonald, Esq., respecting the cutting of a hill on the 2nd concession.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moves that the petition of John Parker and 34 others be granted.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moves that the Reeve be, and he is hereby instructed, to take such action upon a communication with the Grand Trunk Railway Company as may be necessary to secure the requisite improvements at their crossing on the Base Line of the Township, and putting on the necessary cattle guards required by law.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Bull, moves that the Reeve be, and he is hereby instructed to write to the late Reeve of this Township, William James, Esq., demanding all books and papers now in his possession belonging to this Municipality, and received by him as Reeve of the same, and that in the event of the neglect or refusal of Mr. James to deliver up the same, that the Reeve do place the matter in the hands of Messrs. Cameron and McMichael, Solicitors of this Municipality.—Carried.

Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moves that the Reeve be instructed to notify Vice-Chancellor Spragg, Mr. Joseph Spragg and Rev. Dr. Lett, that unless the fences and other obstructions upon the public road allowance on Lot No. 32, running from the Lake Shore Road to the Lake Shore, and over which Mr. Richey is Overseer, be removed from the same before the first day of October next, and in



case of refusal or neglect that he be authorized to take the necessary steps to compel them to remove the same, and also to notify the Great Western Railway Company to make a crossing on said road.—Carried.

Mr. Bull introduced a By-Law to raise by assessment a sum of money for general purposes, roads and bridges and County assessments.

The Council went into committee upon the By-Law.

Mr. Bull in the chair.

The committee rose and reported the By-Law as amended.

The By-Law was then read a third time and passed.

The Council resumed the committee of the whole upon the By-Law to grant and apportion a sum of money to the several Wards of the Municipality.

Mr. Shepard in the chair.

The committee rose and reported the By-Law as amended.—Report received.

The By-Law was then read a third time and passed.

The Council then adjourned to meet at Prospect House, on Monday the second day of September next, at 11 o'clock A. M.

**TENTH MEETING** of the Municipal Council of the Township of York, September 2nd, 1861.

Present—The Reeve, and Councillors Morse Bull and Maginn.

The following communications and petitions were received and read:—

From the Managing Director of the Great Western Railway, in reply to a notice to cut the thistles on their line of Road ;

Of Dr. J. A. De La Hook, enclosing account for examining a lunatic for admission to the Asylum ;

Of William Morse, Esquire, informing the Council that Mr. James, the late Reeve, had forwarded to his office the Consolidated Statutes received by him for the use of the Council ;

Petition of J. S. Dennis, Esq., and 14 others, praying for a grant of money to repair the Humber Bridge, opposite Eagle's Tavern.

The Treasurer informed the Council that he had purchased City of Toronto Debentures, (which were laid upon the table,) to the amount of \$2,800, out of monies arising from the Clergy Reserve Fund of the Municipality.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Maginn, moved that the sum of three dollars be granted for the purpose of paying for the interment of the child of James Purchase, an indigent person, and that the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay such sum out of the general funds of this Municipality.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Maginn, moved that the Treasurer pay to Drs. De La Hook, Beatty and Tuck, or either of them, the sum of \$12, for examining a lunatic previous to his admission to the Asylum.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Maginn, seconded by Mr. Morse, that the prayer of the petition of Thomas Davidson and 21 others be granted. That a special appropriation of \$200 be granted, for the purpose of erecting a Bridge across the East Branch of the River Don, between Lots 15 and 16, in the rear of the 2nd Concession, East of Yonge-street, and that the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay such appropriation out of the general funds of this Municipality, the money to be expended by the Commissioners of the Ward.—Carried.

Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Maginn, moved that the Reeve be instructed to reply to the communication of J. G. Spragge, Esq., and state that no authority is given to Township Councils to authorize any encroachments upon the public highway.—Carried.

Mr. Morse presented a By-Law to allow the inhabitants of Weston to commute their statute labour for two years.

The Council went into committee upon the By-Law.

Mr. Morse in the chair.

The committee rose and reported the By-Law as adopted.

The By-Law was then read a third time and passed.

The Council then adjourned, to meet at Prospect House, on Monday, the 7th day of October next, at 11 o'clock, A.M.

ELEVENTH MEETING of the Municipal Council of the Township of York, October 7th, 1861.

Present—The Reeve, and Councillors Bull, Morse, Maginn, and Shepard.

The Reeve presented a communication from the Great Western Railway Company, with reference to a certain crossing.

Mr. Morse presented the petition of certain persons, praying to be attached to School Section No. 18, now residents of Section No. 5.—Received and read.

Mr. Bull presented the Report of William Watson, Local Superintendent of Schools, on School Property, &c., &c.—Received and read.

Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moved that the Reeve be instructed to reply to the communication of the Managing Director of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, (J. C. Brydges, Esq.,) relative to the railway crossing on the laid out Road through the centre of the West half of Lot No. 32, in the first Concession from the Bay, and also to have the fences

and all other obstructions at once removed from said Road.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Shepard, moved that the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and required to receive the amount loaned by this Council to Messrs. Charlton and Bull, on mortgage, bearing date the 6th day of October, 1858, and that the money so received be invested in debentures forthwith.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Maginn, moved that the prayer of the petition of William Helliwell, Esq., be granted, and that in accordance therewith all that part of Section No. 1, being the West halves of Lots Nos. 13 and 14, in the 2nd Concession from the Bay, East of Yonge-street, be transferred from Section No. 1, and be attached to and form part of Section No. 7, for all Common School purposes, and that the Clerk do notify the Trustees to that effect.—Carried.

Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Morse, moved that the Treasurer be authorized to inquire whether this Municipality is liable for the amount claimed by Mr. Brooks, Attorney, in the case of *Priestly vs. the Municipality*, (an appeal case from the decision of Messrs. Norris and Wheeler, Justices of the Peace,) and that if this Council is liable for the said amount, that the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay the same forthwith, and that the Constable's fees in said case be also paid by the Treasurer, and that this be his authority for the same.—Carried.

Whereas application has been made for

different sums of money for Bridges and Culverts, in Ward No. 3, largely in excess of the amount at the disposal of the Commissioners of the Ward: it is, therefore, moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Morse, that a special grant of \$300 be placed to the credit of Ward No. 3, out of the general funds of the Township, to be laid out at the disposal of the Councillor for the Ward.—Carried.

Mr. Morse, seconded by Mr. Bull, moved that the Report, presented to this Council by Mr. William Watson, in relation to the value of the several school properties of this Township, and payment of the Teachers for the year 1860, as also all other expenses for the year, be deemed highly satisfactory to this Council, and that the Clerk be instructed to insert in the Minutes the Statement for the benefit and information of the public, and also that the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay to Mr. Watson the sum of \$30 for his services in preparing said Report.—Carried.

## AUDITOR'S REPORT.

*To the Municipal Council of the Township of York.*

We, the Auditor's appointed to audit the Township Treasurer's accounts, beg leave to submit the following Report :

That we have investigated the several accounts, and according to the Vouchers produced find them correct. There is, however, some few items on both the debit and credit side of the accounts for which there are no Voucher's; the most important one being on the debit side, and for which there is a total absence of any check against any error which might arise. We allude to the receipts for Licenses to Taverns and Stores. This want of Vouchers has been noticed by Auditors in former years, and we beg to draw the attention of the Council to the fact, trusting they will adopt some plan for supplying the necessary check hereafter. The correct accounts receivable from magistrates for fines in the different wards are not easily ascertained.

On the credit side of the account, there are a few items charged by the Treasurer which have no Vouchers, such as Postage, Notice of Elections, Township Officers, &c.; these items have been allowed in former, and we have therefore allowed them this year. There is, however, one charge which appears to be new, viz, that for notifying School Sections of intended alterations. This is the first of the kind we remember being paid out of the general funds of the Township. Mr. Wilson states he received orders from the Council to send the Notices; we have therefore passed this item without a Voucher; at the same time we beg leave to suggest to the Council the propriety of having their orders placed on the Minutes of the Council, and which would be a sufficient Voucher.

Further, it appears that the Auditors last year deducted from the amount paid by Mr. Wilson to the County Treasurer

the sum of \$10.06, they being of an opinion that he had overpaid the County Treasurer that much. Mr. Wilson having drawn our attention and explained the matter to us, we are decidedly of the opinion that the sum paid the County Treasurer was correct; we have accordingly allowed Mr. Wilson the \$10.06 which was struck off last year by the Auditors.

Further, in the published statement of the investments of the Clergy Reserve Fund last year, it is stated that the sum of £300 was then due from Abraham Johnson, Esq., Trustee of the Methodist Church at Newton. This was an error; it should have been £200. It was originally £300, but the sum of £100 had been paid last year, as will appear by reference to last year's account. The balance of £200 has been paid this year and re-invested, as will appear by examining the accounts.
