MINUTES
OF THE
MUNICIPAL COUNCIL
OF THE
TOWNSHIP OF YORK
FOR THE YEAR 1868.

The members returned for this Municipality, viz.: Bartholomew Bull, Esq., Reeve; Richard E. Playter, Esq., Deputy Reeve; William Jackes, Esq., Deputy Reeve; William Tyrrell, Esq., Deputy Reeve; and George Jackson, Councilman, met at the "Prospect House," Eglington, on the 20th day of January, A.D. 1868, and, having taken the declarations of office and qualification, the Reeve took the Chair.

An account was received from Drs. DeLahoke, Savage and Bull, for an examination of Joseph Ellis, a lunatic.

Also, an account from Dr. DeLahoke, for medical attendance on a man named Donaldson.

Mr. Tyrrell presented the petition of William Jackson, and fifty others, praying that B. P. Sheppard be appointed Assessor. Received and read.

Mr. Jackes presented the petition of Mrs. Priestley, an indigent widow, praying for aid. Received and read.

Also, the petition of Mrs. McDonald, an indigent widow, praying for aid. Received and read.

Also, the petition of Mary McDonald, praying for aid. Received and read.

Also, the petition of William Bonner, an indigent person, praying for aid. Received and read.

Mr. Playter presented the petition of Messrs. Taylor, praying to have a portion of Lot No. 10 attached to School Section No. 7. Received and read.

Mr. Jackson presented the petition of John McCarty, praying to be appointed Inspector of Licenses. Received and read.

The Clerk presented certificates for damages, for sheep killed by dogs, in the matter of the claims of William Vine, William Holley and John Hurst. Received and read.

Moved by Mr. Tyrrell, seconded by Mr. Jackes,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to Dr. DeLahoke, or his order, the sum of twelve dollars for the examination of Joseph Bliss, a lunatic, by Drs. Savage, Bull and DeLahoke; and also the sum of two dollars for his attendance on an indigent man named Donaldson. Carried.

Resolved,—That the prayer of the Messrs. Taylor be granted, and that all that portion of Lot No. 10, in the 3rd Concession, now lying in School Section No. 2, be attached to School Section No. 7, provided consent be first obtained from the Trustees of School Section No. 7. Carried.

SECOND MEETING OF THE COUNCIL.

February 17th, A. D. 1868.

The Council met, the Reeve in the Chair.

Present: MESSRS. Tyrrell, Jackes, Playter and Jackson.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and adopted.

Communications were received :

From Samuel Scarlett, Esq., asking for a loan of \$2,000.

From George S. Teasley, in the matter of John Ball, an indigent person, and

From Messrs. Barrett and Evans, in *Re-Dunlop*.

Mr. Tyrrell presented the petitions of John Coulson and twelve others, praying for aid for Ann McKendry, an indigent person; of Robert Taylor and 44 others, praying for a Certificate for Mrs. John Little to enable her to obtain a Tavern License; and of John Severn, and 12 others, praying for aid to erect a bridge on the Thompson estate. Received and read.

Mr. Jackes presented the petitions of John Sherwood, and others, in reference to the survey of the Fourth Concession, East York, between Lots 19 and 25; of James Chadwick, and 102 others, praying for a road across Lot No. 6, in the First Concession, east of Yonge street; and of Charles McBride, praying for remuneration for board of Sarah Wil-

loughby, a deranged person, and for conveying her to jail. Received and read.

Mr. Playter presented the petitions of Messrs. Taylor Bros., praying for a conveyance of certain road allowances; of Margaret Kennedy, praying for aid for her mother; and of Robert Robinson, and others, praying for aid for Mrs. Campton. Received and read.

Certificates for damages, for sheep killed by dogs, were presented by the Clerk in the matter of the claims of Edwin Snider and John Haney. Received and read.

Moved by Mr. Jackes, seconded by Mr. Tyrrell,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer and Reeve be instructed to loan to Mr. Samuel Scarlett the sum of fifteen hundred dollars of the Clergy Reserve money, on mortgage, for three years at 8 per cent. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Tyrrell, seconded by Mr. Playter,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to Mr. John Coulson the sum of ten dollars, to be applied by him in aiding Ann McKenzie; also the sum of ten dollars to Mr. Playter, to aid Mrs. Compton; and also, to the order of the Reeve, the sum of twenty dollars, to be applied by him as follows: to Margaret Kennedy, the sum of eight dollars, and to John Ball, the sum of twelve dollars—all indigent persons. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jackes, seconded by Mr. Tyrrell,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be instructed to notify the Township Surveyor and Mr. George McPhillip, P.L.S., to make a survey of that portion of the 4th Concession, east of Yonge street, lying between Lots Nos. 19 and 25, both in-

clusive, and also to plant stone monuments on the two corner lots. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Tyrrell, seconded by Mr. Jackes,

Resolved,—That the prayer of the petition of James Chadwick, and 102 others, be granted, and the Township Surveyor be instructed to stake out the road prayed for by the petitioners, and that Mr. Jacob Lawrence be paid by the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, on signing a deed to this municipality for the land required for said road, and that the Clerk be instructed to prepare said deed so soon as he obtains the proper description from the Surveyor. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jackes, seconded by Mr. Playter,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer of this Township pay to the order of Charles McBride the sum of five dollars for boarding one Sarah Willoughby, a person of deranged mind, for two days, and also for conveying her to jail. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Playter, seconded by Mr. Tyrrell,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be instructed to cause the necessary notices to be published and posted up for closing a certain original road allowance, between the second and third concessions from the Bay, upon the expenses being guaranteed by the parties interested. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jackes, seconded by Mr. Playter,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer of the Township pay to the order of Henry Haney and Edwin Snider the amount of damages claimed by them for the loss of their sheep, viz.: Henry Haney, \$16; Edwin Snider, \$35. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Tyrrell, seconded by Mr. Jackes,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be instructed to have the ne-

cessary notices put up and published according to law to close the northerly trespass road crossing the farm of Mr. John Lawrence. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Playter, seconded by Mr. Tyrrell,

Resolved,—That in compliance with the petition of Edward Shortes, Esq., and John McCarty, that the sum of one hundred and sixty dollars be granted out of the general funds of the Township to reimburse the petitioners for money expended by them in opening and improving the public highway on Lots Nos. 38, 39 and 40, in the first Concession from the Bay, west of Yonge street, and to be paid to the order of the petitioners by the Treasurer: to the order of Edward Shortes, the sum of one hundred dollars; and to the order of John McCarty, the sum of sixty dollars; Mr. Shortes to be paid on or before the 31st December next. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Playter, seconded by Mr. Jackson,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be authorized to pay to the order of Wm. Brown the sum of \$12 50, being the amount paid by him for poundage on a certain colt empounded in Snider's pound. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jackson, seconded by Mr. Tyrrell,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to purchase the necessary stationery for the use of the Township for the year 1868. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jackes, seconded by Mr. Tyrrell,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be and he is hereby instructed to get printed on card 150 copies of the By-law regulating the sale of spirituous and other Liquors in Taverns and Shops, and also the licensing of Billiard Tables, and fifty on

sheets; and that the Statute relating to the closing and sale of spirituous liquors on Saturday nights be printed with the By-law, and that the Clerk do forward to each qualified Magistrate in the Municipality one copy of the By-law. Carried.

Mr. Playter introduced a By-law for regulating Public Houses of Entertainment and Licenses for Shops and Billiard Tables.

The By-law was read a first and second time.

The Council went into Committee of the whole on the By-law, Mr. Jackes in the chair.

The Committee rose and reported the By-law as amended.

The By-law was then read a third time.

Mr. Tyrrell moved, seconded by Mr. Jackson,

That the 20th, 21st and 22nd clauses, which refers to Billiard Tables, be struck out.

The yeas and nays being called for,

Mr. Tyrrell and Mr. Jackson voted yea.

Mr. Playter and Mr. Jackes voted nay.

The Reeve voted with the nays, and declared the resolution lost.

The By-law was then passed.

The Council then adjourned, to meet at the "Prospect House," Eglinton, on Monday, the 24th day of February instant, at eleven o'clock, a.m.

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and he is hereby instructed to grant Certificates to the following named persons to enable them to obtain a Tavern License, on receiving the Inspector's certificate, and also receiving the sum of thirty-one dollars from each of the said applicants: Francis McFarlane, Daniel O'Sullivan, John Raymer, William McBride, James Cooke—5. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Playter, seconded by Mr. Jackes,

Resolved,—That the prayer of the petition of John Severn, and 12 others, be granted, and that the sum of two hundred dollars be granted out of the general funds of the Township towards the erection of a bridge and improving a road through Lot No. 17, in the 2nd Concession from the Bay, provided the petitioners raise the sum of five hundred dollars, and that the above sum be laid out and expended under the direction of P. S. Gibson, P.L.S., and that the said road be registered (if not already done). Carried.

Moved by Mr. Tyrrell, seconded by Mr. Playter,

Resolved,—That the Reeve be instructed to consult with Messrs. Patterson & Harrison in reference to the opening of the road crossing the property lately owned by Mr. Archi-

bald Scarlett, and to ascertain whether it was necessary to notify the person holding a mortgage on the said property at the time of establishing the said road, and as to the proper course to be pursued at present by the Corporation in reference to the said road, and their opinion shall be submitted to this Council at its next meeting; and, further, that the Reeve shall have an appearance entered to the suit, "Dunlop vs. The Corporation of the Township of York." Carried.

Moved by Mr. Playter, seconded by Mr. Jackes,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer place to the credit of Electoral Division No. 1 the sum of \$50, to be paid to the order of R. E. Playter. Carried.

A Resolution was also passed instructing P. S. Gibson, P.L.S., to make an estimate of the probable cost of the contemplated road to run across Mr. Jacob Lawrence's farm; also, the cost of improving the original road allowance, and to report to this Council at its next meeting.

FOURTH MEETING OF THE COUNCIL.

April 6th, 1868.

The Council met, the Reeve in the Chair.

Present, Messrs. Tyrrell, Playter, Jackes and Jackson.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

A Communication, accompanied with a written opinion in the matter of the road lately opened through the land of Archibald Scarlett, in this Township, was received from Messrs. Paterson, Harrison & Paterson, and read.

Communications were also received :

From the Rev. W. A. Johnson, relative to certain poor persons in the Township.

From James Hodgson, Esq., applying for a grant to Weston Grammar School.

From Nicholas Maughan, Esq., Inspector, relative to the Certificate requisite for Mr. Strader to obtain before obtaining a Certificate for a Tavern License.

From John McNabb, Esq., in the case of Frank Wood, an indigent person ; and

From W. A. Wallis, in *Re-George Clayton's* dog tax. Read.

Mr. Tyrrell presented the petition of Wm. Nason, and ten others, praying for aid for Moses Findlay, an indigent person. Received and read.

Resolved,—That the prayer of the petition of Charles Loeffler, William Erwin and John Straden be granted, and that the Clerk is hereby authorized to grant the necessary Certificates to the above parties on the receipt of \$31 from each. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Playter, seconded by Mr. Jackes,

Resolved,—That the petition of James Manning, and others, praying to have the fence removed from off the side road running from the Kingston Road north, between Lots Nos. 10 and 11, be granted, and that the Clerk be and he is hereby authorized to notify Thomas Hastings to remove his fence from the original road allowance by the 1st of June next. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Playter, seconded by Mr. Jackes,

Resolved,—That the prayer of the petition of John Hector, and others, praying for a grant of money to improve the road upon Lot No. 40, in the 1st Concession from the Bay, and also to extend said road as prayed for, be granted, and that the sum of fifty dollars be granted out of the general funds of the Township to be expended under the superintendence of Mr. R. Bond. Carried.

Resolved,—That the Treasurer pay to the order of John Dew, Esq., the sum of five dollars, to assist James Hall, an indigent person. Carried.

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be authorized to pay to the order of the Reeve the sum of \$8, for the relief of Mrs. Gilpin, an aged and infirm widow. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Tyrrell, seconded by Mr. Jackes,

Resolved,—That the Reeve be instructed to write to —

Christie, the Managing Director of the western portion of the Grand Trunk Railroad, requesting his immediate attention to the several crossings over the Railroad in the Village of Weston, and state to him that several of the crossings are in such a bad state of repair that it is with difficulty that teams can pass. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jackson, seconded by Mr. Jackes.

Resolved,—That the Reeve be instructed to write to F. W. Cumberland, Esq., the Managing Director of the Northern Railroad, requesting his immediate attention to the widening and bringing to a legal grade the crossings between Lots Nos. 10 and 11, also 15 and 16, and 20 and 21, as said crossings are exceedingly dangerous. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Playter, seconded by Mr. Jackson,

Resolved,—That the Resolution passed at the meeting of the Council on the 17th of February, 1868, ordering the Township Surveyor to survey a road across Jacob Lawrence's Lot, be and is hereby rescinded, and that the Clerk be instructed to take no further action in the matter.

Messrs, Playter, Jackes and Jackson voted yea.

Mr. Tyrrell voted nay.

The Reeve declared the Resolution carried.
