MINUTES
OF THE
MUNICIPAL COUNCIL
OF THE
Corporation of the Township of York
FOR THE YEAR 1869.

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The members returned for this Municipality, viz.: Bartholomew Bull, Esq., Reeve; William Tyrrell, Esq., Deputy Reeve; William Jackes, Esq., Deputy Reeve; Richard E. Playter, Esq., Deputy Reeve; and George Jackson, Esq., Councilman, met at the "Prospect House," Eglington, on the Eighteenth day of January, A. D., 1869, and having taken the declarations of office and qualification, the Reeve took the Chair.

A communication and account was received from F. W. Jarvis, Sheriff of the County of York, in the matter of conveying one Johnson, a lunatic, from Toronto to Rockwood Asylum, Kingston. Read.

A communication was received from the Rev. W. A. Johnston, in the matter of John Prescott, an indigent person. Read.

A communication was received from C. B. Bridgland, in the matter of Henry Hetherington, an indigent person. Read.

A communication was received from Rev. W. A. Johnston, and others, in the matter of Mrs. Kirkland, an indigent person. Read.

Mr. Jackes presented the petition of J. W. Gwynne, and others, asking for a grant of an original Road allowance. Read.

Mr. Tyrrell presented a report of Mr. Dew, in the matter of Elizabeth Cooper, an indigent person. Read.

Mr. Playter presented the petition of W. H. Keele, praying to be appointed License Inspector for the West Division of the Township of York. Read.

TO THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF YORK.

We, the undersigned Auditors appointed by the Council, having carefully examined the accounts of A. L. Willson, Treasurer, beg leave to submit the following report, viz :—

1st. A detailed statement of the Receipts and Disbursements, made from the 1st day of January to the 31st day of December, both days inclusive, for the year A.D. 1869.

2nd. An abstract statement of the said Receipts and Disbursements, shewing the total amount paid on each separate head of the accounts, also the balance in the hands of the Treasurer, December 31st, 1869.

3rd. An abstract statement of the Liabilities and Assets, on the 31st December, 1869.

4th. An account of the Clergy Reserve Fund, shewing that the sum of \$6,230 13c. has been appropriated and expended for Township purposes out of that Fund.

With reference to the last named account, your auditors cannot but think that the way in which it now stands is very unsatisfactory. The large amount now due by the Township to the Fund, should, by some means, be reimbursed. It is of course for the Council to provide ways and means; but we, in calling the attention of the Council to the matter, respectfully suggest that the repayment of the amount due, say \$6,230 13c. should at once be secured either by a By-law passed for that purpose, or other efficient means, the ultimate redemption of the debt to be provided for either by an annual assessment on the Township to continue through a series of years, or at some definite period to be fixed by the Council, and at such a rate of interest to be paid annually as the Council may think just and reasonable.

This matter being settled, we would further suggest to the Council the propriety of keeping both the Fund, and its accounts, distinct from all other accounts of the Township.

We also draw the attention of the Council to the large amount of interest now in arrear on the Mortgages belonging to the Fund. Some have five or six years' interest overdue and unpaid.

We also notice a charge somewhat new in its character (*i. e.* as regards the liability of the Township) we allude to

the payment of the sum of \$57 made to the Sheriff of the County, for conveying one John Johnson, a lunatic, to the Rockwood Asylum. We are not aware by what authority the Council ordered the payment. We have reason to believe that the County Council generally pay the Sheriff for services of this nature.

We further suggest that the Council provide some more efficient way of ascertaining the number of Tavern Licences granted, and checking the amount paid thereon, and would recommend, in connection therewith the passing a By-law fixing and determining the duties, privileges, &c., of the License Inspector.
