FIRST MEETING OF COUNCIL.

January, 18th, A D. 1871.

The members elected to compose and form the
Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town-
ship of York, for the year 1871, viz :

Met at the "Prospect House," Eglington, on Monday,
the sixteenth day of January, A.D. 1871, at 1 oon, and

having severally subscribed their declaration of office and qualification, the Reeve took the Chair.

Communications were received from Messrs. Osler & Moss *In Re Burns vs. Taylor et al*, stating the amount of damages and costs. Read.

A communication was received from Thomas Mulholland, Esq., asking for a discharge of his mortgage, and that his title-deeds be produced. Read.

A communication was received from George Lesslie, Esq., relative to the child of Jennie Suggett. Read.

An account was received from John C. Daniels, for serving notices and causing certain persons to remove from off the public highway between Lots 25 and 26, in the 3rd Concession from the Bay. Read.

An account was received from Wm. Sharp & Sons, for coffin for Jefferson Pipken. Read.

Mr. Bull presented the petition of William Douglas, praying to be appointed Inspector for East York. Read.

Mr. Duncan presented the petition of George Lesslie and five others, praying that George Cooper be appointed License Inspector for East York. Read.

Mr. Bull presented the petition of John Shuttleworth, praying to be appointed License Inspector for West York. Read.

Mr. Bull presented the petition of F. B. Shephard,

praying to be appointed License Inspector for West York. Read.

Mr. Bull presented the petition of William Sanders and thirteen others, praying the Council to appoint him License Inspector for West York. Read.

Mr. Bull presented the petition of Samuel Littlejohn and twenty-six others, praying the Council to appoint him Assessor for West York. Read.

Mr. Watson presented the petition of Isaac Dollery and twelve others, praying to be appointed Assessor for West York. Read.

Mr. Watson presented the petition of John McCartney, praying for aid for Mrs. Devaney. Read.

Mr. Bull presented the petition of Robert Moore, praying for aid. Read.

The Council examined into the claims of Albert Farr and John Dingle, for sheep killed by dogs.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Watson,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and is hereby instructed to pay into the Sheriff's office the amount of judgment and costs in the case of Burns vs. Lauder and Taylor. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Bull,

Resolved,—That the Reeve be authorized and instructed, to apply to Rusk Harris, Esq., for the title-deeds and papers deposited with Mr. Bacon, by Mr. Thomas Mulholland, for the Corporation of the Township of York, as collateral security to a mortgage, given by Mr. Thomas Mulholland to the said Corporation, for securing the sum of one thousand dollars, with interest at eight per cent. Carried.

And that the Reeve be further instructed to take such measures or proceedings as may be necessary for recovering the said title-deeds and papers for this Corporation. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Watson,

Resolved,—That the foundling child, now in the possession of Mrs. Jepson, be given to John West, and that he be paid at the rate of five dollars per month, until further provision be made for said child, and that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay George Cooper the sum of five dollars, to be paid by him to Mrs. Jepson, being the amount due her for keep of said child up to the time of transferring said child to John West. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Bull,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay to George Cooper, the sum of ten dollars, for extra trouble and expense in the case of Jane Suggett. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Armstrong,

Resolved,—That the bill of J. C. Daniels, amounting to ten dollars, for removing certain parties from the highway, be paid by the Treasurer. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and is hereby instructed to pay to the order of Joseph Watson, the sum of five dollars, for funeral expenses of the late Jefferson Pipken, to be paid by him to Henry Holden. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Watson,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to the order of Albert Farr, the sum of thirteen dollars and thirty-three cents, for sheep killed by dogs, and also to John Dingle, a similar amount, being two-thirds the amount of loss sustained by them. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to the order of William Tyrrell, Esq., the sum of twelve dollars, four dollars of it to be paid to Robert Moore, an indigent person, and eight dollars to be paid for the support of one Burns; and to the order of Joseph Watson, to be divided between Mrs. Gilpin, and Mrs. Devaney and Amos Rowel, the sum of fifteen dollars. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Watson,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to the order of the mover, the sum of six dollars, to be paid by him to Gange, for the support of Mrs. Cooper; also to the order of W. Jackes, Esq., the sum of four dollars, to be applied towards the support of Mrs. Mayland. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to the different Returning Officers for the Township, the amount due them for their services as such, the sum of six dollars each, for the current year, upon demand thereof. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Bull,

Resolved,—That the Township Surveyor be and is hereby instructed to prepare plans and receive tenders for the erection of three new bridges, on the second Concession East York, one opposite lot three, one opposite lot five, and one opposite lot eleven, and submit the same to this Council at the next meeting. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Reeve be and is hereby authorized to grant a certificate of admittance to the hospital, to one James Jones, an indigent person. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Armstrong,

Resolved,—That Electoral Divisions Nos. 4 and 5 be set

off as a division for one Assessor, and Electoral Division No. 3 be also assigned to one Assessor. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Watson,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and is hereby instructed to open an account, to the credit of the Municipality, with the Banks of Toronto or Commerce, and that all funds coming into his hands, on behalf of the Municipality, be deposited in said Bank to the credit of York Township Municipality, and that the Reeve and Treasurer be instructed to ascertain the Bank with which the best arrangement can be made. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be instructed to procure stationery and blank forms for the Municipality, also to order all printing required for the Municipality during the year 1871. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Bull,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be and is hereby required to prepare a short report of each meeting of the Council through the year, and send the same to each of the three leading papers in Toronto, for publication. Carried.

SECOND MEETING OF COUNCIL.

February 20th, 1871.

The Council met; the Reeve in the chair.

Present:—Messrs Bull, Watson, Duncan, and Armstrong.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

A communication was received from the Council of the Township of Markham, stating that they had granted \$150 towards the building of certain bridges on the Town line, between York and Markham, on condition that York Township would grant a similar sum. Read.

A communication and report were received from J. McNab, Esq., commissioner of side walk on Davenport. Read.

Reports were received from W. Douglas, and B. F. Sheppard, License Inspectors. Read.

Mr. Watson presented the petitions of Wesley Coats and Eliza Graham, praying for aid. Read.

Bills of costs were received from Messrs Osler and Moss, Bull and Jackes, *In Re Burns vs. Taylor, et al.* Read.

The Council examined into the claim of David Kennedy, for sheep killed by dogs.

Resolved,—That the Report of the Auditors, for the past year be adopted. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved.—That the Township Engineer, be required to report to this Council at the next Meeting, the state of the Bridges referred to in the communication from the Markham Council, and the cost of erecting said Bridges. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Reeve be and is hereby instructed to take proceedings to collect the interest in arrears on the Mortgages of Messrs Shea & Tobin, Amos Wright & Carsons. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Reeve be and is hereby instructed and required to notify the different Railway Companies whose line of road passes through York Township, to put the various crossings now out of repair, in a proper state. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Bull,

Resolved,—That the tender of Joseph Pennock, be accepted for building the three new bridges on the second Concession East York, amounting to \$547.50. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and is hereby requested to pay to the order of the Inspectors of Licenses, the sum of Twenty-five dollars each, for their services the present year, \$50.00. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Bull,

Resolved,—That the the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay the sum of fifteen dollars to each of the Auditors, for their services for the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and is hereby instructed to pay to the Auditors of the account just passed, the sum of twenty dollars each, for their services as such, and that the Treasurer enclose the amount to their post office address; and that a former resolution referring to the matter be rescinded. Carried.

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to the order of David Kennedy, the sum of thirty-three dollars and thirty-two cents, damages on ten sheep killed by dogs. Carried.

Resolved,—That the Treasurer pay to the order of Mr. John Dew, the sum of nine dollars and fifty cents, (\$9.50) which amount he has paid for the support of Samuel Sampson and E. Cooper, indigent persons. Carried.

Resolved,—That the sum of \$10.00 be granted to Mrs. Woods, an indigent person; also the sum of \$8.00 to Samuel Sampler, an indigent person, to be paid to John McCarty for him; also the sum of \$10.00 for William Burns, an indigent person, to be paid to the Reeve; also the sum of \$4.00 to Mrs. Milan, an indigent person, to be paid to William Jackes, Esq.; also to Eliza Graham, an indigent person, the sum of \$5.00, to be paid to Joseph Watson; also to Mrs. Devaney, the sum of \$4.00, to be paid to Mr. Joseph Watson. Carried.

THIRD MEETING OF COUNCIL.

March 6th, 1871.

The Council met; Mr. Bull, Deputy Reeve, in the chair.

Present:—Messrs Duncan, Watson and Armstrong, afterwards the Reeve.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

A communication was received from T. H. Bull, Esq.,

in reference to the mortgages of Shea and Tobin and Wright and *Re* Dennis and Mulholland's paper. Read.

A communication was received from Rev. R. Monteith, relative to Mrs. McKensie, an indigent person. Read.

A communication was received from Henry Johnson *et al.*, praying for aid. Read.

A communication was received from John McCarty *et al.*, asking aid for Emma Williams. Read.

Mr. Bull presented the petition of Daniel Sellars, praying for a certificate to obtain a Shop License. And the petition of William W. Hodgson and thirty-one others, asking for leave to do their Statute Labor on the roads running through the Don Mount. Read.

Mr. Watson presented the petitions—

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay to Henry Duncan, the sum of eight dollars, for Mrs. McKenzie, an indigent person.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That Treasurer pay to John McCarty or order, the sum of seven dollars, to be by him applied to the maintenance of Henry Johnson and Emma Williams, two indigent persons. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Bull,

Resolved,—That a certificate to obtain a Shop License be granted by the Treasurer to Daniel Sellars, so soon as he has complied with the requirements of the By-laws of the Municipality. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the petition of William W. Hodgson and thirty-one others, asking for leave to perform their Statute Labour on the road running through Don Mount, instead of the Mill Road, be granted. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Watson,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to grant a certificate to obtain a Tavern License to William Kirk. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Armstrong,

Resolved,—That the Clerk be and is hereby authorized and instructed, to furnish the following persons with certificates to obtain Tavern Licenses: Francis Hayden, Wallace Carson. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Armstrong,

Resolved,—That the Township Engineer be and is hereby instructed to examine the hills at the head of the Grenadier Pond, on Bloor Street, and report the probable expense of making the same a reasonable grade at the next meeting of this Council. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Township Engineer be and is hereby instructed to examine the hill known as Sparkhall's Hill, and referred to in the petition of John Mills and others, and report to this Council at the next meeting what repairs are necessary. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bull, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Township Engineer be and is hereby instructed to have the hill on the sixth Concession West York, in front of Lot No. 18, put in a fair state of repair, by planking, logging or otherwise, as to him may seem best. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Watson,

Resolved,—That the Engineer be and is hereby instructed to examine the hill opposite Lot 17, in the 2nd Concession West York, and report the cost of making it passable, at the next meeting of the Council. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved,—That the Treasurer be and is hereby instructed to notify the Reeve of the Township of Markham, that in compliance with a communication received from their Council, the Township Engineer has examined the bridges referred to in their communication, and finds that the Commissioners appointed by the Council of the Township of Markham decline to act; that this Council are prepared to pay one-half of the cost of repairing the present bridges, or paying their proportion of the cost of new bridges, if done under the superintendence of the Township Engineer, and approved of by the Council of Markham. Carried.

Mr. Bull introduced a By-law, No. 373, to amend By-law No. 371, appointing Township officers for the year 1871.

The By-law was read a first and second time.

The Council went into a committee of the whole on the By-law.

Mr. Bull in the chair.

The committee rose and reported the By-law as amended.

The By-law was then read a third time and passed.

The Council then adjourned to meet at the "Prospect House," Eglington, on Monday, the third day of April, A. D. 1871, at 11 o'clock, A.M.

April 4th, 1871.

The Council met ; the Reeve in the chair.

From Alexander Fleury, offering to supply the Township with road scrapers at a reasonable price.

From Osler, Moss and Foster, *in re* Old Yonge Street.

From Wm. Rennie, offering to supply road scrapers for the Township at \$6 each.

TOWNSHIP OF YORK.

We, the undersigned Auditors appointed by the Council to examine the accounts of the Treasurer, Mr. A. L. Wilson, for the year 1871, beg leave to report that we have minutely examined his books and the accounts and vouchers, and have great pleasure in expressing our approval of the systematic and exact manner in which they are kept, and to submit as correct the foregoing statements, which comprise,

1st. A full statement of the Receipts and Disbursements for the year.

2nd. An abstract statement of said Receipts and Disbursements shewing the total amount received and paid out under the several headings of the accounts, whereby it will be seen that the Disbursements exceeded the Receipts to the amount of \$207 84.

3rd. A statement of the Clergy Reserve Fund account, by which it will be seen that the large amount of \$6,145 63 of that Fund has been expended for Township purposes and still remains uninvested.

4th. An abstract statement of the Assets and Liabilities, shewing an excess of Assets of \$484 05.

5th. A list of the Securities held by the Municipality on account of the Clergy Reserve Fund.

For the last two years your Auditors have drawn the attention of your Council to the fact that they

could not check the amount received from the issue of Tavern and Shop Licenses, and we would again impress upon the Council the necessity of devising some means whereby the number of Licenses granted and the amount paid thereon could be efficiently checked.

We would renew the suggestion of the Auditors of last year, and ask your Council to make it a part of the duties of Inspectors to visit every Tavern in the Township at the close of the year, and send in to the Auditor's a list of those parties who have Licenses to which the Treasurer's signature is attached. Certificates are issued to parties who do not pay the Township dues, and they may be selling under the Government License only.

We find that during the year 45 Certificates were issued, 5 of them being marked for transfers, 40 being paid for.

With regard to the Dog Taxes we would say that \$813 51 was paid for sheep killed by dogs, and that \$987 50 was received from Dog Taxes, \$108 25 of that amount being on account of the Dog Tax Reb for 1871.

We would also draw the attention of the Council to the fact that there is a large amount of interest due on two or three Mortgages.

With regard to the Carson Mortgage we would state that as the Mortgage is not in the hands of the

Treasurer, and as we cannot get any information concerning said Mortgage, we have not included it in the list of Securities, or the interest due in the list of Assets.

The Mortgage is for \$800 at 8 per cent., and is dated July 21st, 1860. There has only been one year's interest paid, leaving ten years interest yet due.
