MINUTES OF COUNCIL.

FOURTH MEETING

Of the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', held, pursuant to adjournment, on Monday, 25th April, 1859, at Mr. J. Armstrong's Inn.

MEMBERS PRESENT-John P. Wheler, Esq., Town Reeve, J. Crawford, Esq., Deputy Reeve, Wm. Helliwell, Esq., I. Ashbridge, Esq., E. Snider, Esq.

Minutes of preceding meeting read and confirmed.

Presented by Mr. Snider, petition of Joseph Hough and others, praving for a sum of money to build a bridge on concession D.

To the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', in Council assembled :

The petition of the undersigned humbly sheweth, —That the bridge on Con. D, crossing the Little Don, adjacent to Lot 30, is in a dangerous position for teams to cross; it would also require turnpiking on the east side of the bridge, as it is almost impossible to pass when the water is high. The undersigned petitioners do humbly pray, that your honorable body will grant the sum of Thirty Dollars, which sum, your petitioners think it would require to erect a new bridge thereon.

And, as in duty bound, your petitioners will ever pray.

Mr. Snider, seconded by Mr. Ashbridge, moved, that the prayer of the petition of Joseph Hough and others, be granted, and that Joseph Hough, Thomas Steele, and James McCowen, be commissioners for expending the same, and the money to be paid by the Treasurer on the order of the Reeve. Carried. Presented by Mr. Crawford, petition of Widow Shanks.

To the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro':

The petition of Janet Shanks humbly sheweth,—That your petitioner is the Widow of the late James Shanks, who died last summer, and left your petitioner with five small children unprovided for, and having no relations in this country, desires to return to her friends in Scotland, and not having means sufficient to do so, would request that your honorable body would grant her the sum of Twenty Dollars, or such other sum as your honorable body may see fit to do.

And your petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Mr. Crawford, seconded by Mr. Helliwell, moved, that the petition of the Widow Shanks, praying for aid, be granted, and that the Reeve is hereby authorised to give an order on the Treasurer in favor of Robert Hamilton and John Elliot, for the snm of Twenty Dollars, for the purpose of assisting her to return to her native country. Charied.

Presented by Mr. Crawford, petition of S. R. Wright and others, praying for aid to improve the north townline, read as follows :-To the Reve and Councillors of the Municipality of the Township of Scarboro':

GENTLEMEN -- The undersigned, rate-payers of the Township of Scarboro', would respectfully call your attention to the condition of a portion of the tewnhac between this Township and Markham, east of the plank road, at the foot of the 8th and 9th Con. Your petitioners, whilst acknowledging the very valuable assistance rendered last year by the Municipality of Scarboro', in connection with that of Markham, toward the improvement of this road, would also, with satisfaction, refer to the manner in which that money was expended; but, as a portion of the line is still in an almost impassible condition during a part of the year, in consequence of insufficient drainage and extension of the turnpiking, they would respectfully ask a further aid from your Municipality of the sum of Eighty Dollars, which, with the assistance expected from Markham, will enable them to secure a good outlet to the plank road.

Mr. Ashbridge, seconded by Mr. Crawford, moved for leave to present the petition of John C. Jones, and that the 36th rule be suspended for that purpose. Carried.

Mr. Ashbridge then presented said petition, as follows :--

To the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', in Council assembled,

The petition of John C. Jones, of the Township of Scarboro', carpenter, humbly sheweth,—That your petitioner about twenty months since, while working on a building, unfortunately fell from the same, by which he sustained such injuries as have precluded, and do now preclude, any ability to earn, in however small a degree, a livelihood for himself and family. Your petitioner has long depended on the kindness of a few individuals, but for whom he and his family must long since have suffered from want; he therefore humbly prays your honorable Council to grant him some small assistance. And your petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Mr. Helliwell, seconded by Mr. Crawford, moved, that the sum of Twenty Dollars be granted for the relief of John C. Jones, and that the Treasurer be authorised to pay the same on the order of the Reeve. Carried.

Presented by the Reeve, Circular No. 67, from the Inspector General's office, Customs Department, requesting the excise duties to be paid into the Bank of Upper Canada.

The Reeve introduced a By-law referring to the Statute Labour in this Township. By-law read and laid on the table.

In reference to the Municipal Reports, edited by R. A. Harrison, Esq., and published by Maclear & Co., the following resolution was adopted :--

Mr. Helliwell, seconded by Mr. Crawford, moved, that the Clerk do give an order for one copy of the Municipal Reports for the use of this Council. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Helliwell, seconded by Mr. Crawford, that this Council resolve itself into a Court of Appeal forthwith. Carried.

The Court of Appeal being composed of the following membersthat is to say-John P. Wheler, Esq., *Reeve*; John Crawford, Esq., *Deputy Reeve*; Wm. Helliwell, Esq.; Isaac Ashbridge, Esq.; E. Snider, Esq.

Mr. Crawford being called to the chair, and after a short discussion the following motion was put and carried.

Mr. Helliwell, seconded by Mr. Snider, moved, that the Court of Appeal do now adjourn until Monday, 16th May, at 'ten o'clock, a.m. Carried.

On the members resuming their duties in Council, it was moved by Mr. Helliwell, seconded by Mr. Snider, for leave to present the petition of Thos. Young and others, and that rule 36 be suspended for that purpose.

Mr. Helliwell then presented said petition, as follows :---

To the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', in Council assembled, The petition of the undersigned, inhabitants of this Township, respectfully sheweth,-That the several farms of your petitioners are so situated, with regard to both side-lines and concessions of the township, as that the said road allowances are never, or very seldom, required or travelled, by any one of your petitioners, and more particularly so, in going to Toronto, the principal place of business which calls your petitioners from home,-That the farms of your several petitioners are situated south of the Kingston Road, almost the only road they have any occasion to travel, and the position of the said lines being generally such as to render them impracticable As roads, your petitioners can derive no benefit whatever from said lines, and are compelled to appropriate part of their farming lands as roads, for the accommodation of themselves and the public with whom they have business, and to keep the same in repair at their own expense, whilst they are assessed to the highest value for statute labour, and compelled to repair the public highways for the benefit of others. Your petitioners, therefore, humbly desire, that the Council will be pleased to take into their consideration that whilst your petitioners have no direct access by any public line to, and little or no benefit from, the roads whereon they are called to perform statute labour, that they are in justice entitled to a commutation or reduction of the number of days' labour imposed by law, for the consideration above named. Your petitioners therefore pray, that the Council will be pleased to make such a reduction in the number of days' statute labour, to each of them, as in their wisdom, the several cases of your petitioners are entitled to.

And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

BY-LAW No. 111,

For the appointment of Township Officers.

It is enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', that the following named persons be and are hereby appointed township officers to the various offices hereinafter named, whose duties and liabilities shall commence from and after the passing of this By-Law.

Kir. Crawford, seconded by Mr. Helliwell, moved that Percival Kerl be allowed to perform his statute labour south of the Kingston Road, provided the road allowance is opened before the time that the labour should be performed. Carried.

Moved and seconded, that the Council resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, to take up the By-Law for enforcing the performance of statute labour.

The Council went into committee of the whole—Mr. Snider in the chair. The committee rose, the chairman reported the adoption of the Br-Law with certain amendments; report received, and the following Br-Law finally passed.

BY-LAW No. 112,

For Enforcing the Performance of Statute Labour.

1st. Be it enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', that from and after the passing of this By-Law it shall and may be lawful for the Pathmasters to notify all such persons as may be liable to the performance of Statute Labour, and residing within the limits of their divisions (and not otherwise exempt), of the time and place where such labour is to be performed, not less than three days previous; and if any person neglect or refuse to perform Statute Labour, either by himself or by an able-bodied substitute, after such notification, it shall be the duty of the Pathmaster, within ten days, to report such defaulter to the Township Clerk, whose duty it shall be to bring the offender to justice, and ou conviction, such defaulter shall be liable to a fine of not less than five shillings for each day's labour so neglected or refused to be performed, together with costs, the same to be recovered by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of such defaulter, and if no goods shall be found, then such defaulter shall be imprisoned for a term not less than six days nor more than twenty, and shall be still liable to the performance of his quota of labour.

2nd. Be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of each Pathmaster to superintend and keep in repair the roads and bridges in his division, and to direct persons performing Statute Labour to destroy weeds hurtful to husbandry; to erect by Statute Labour guards and fences in dangerous places within his division; and cause the Statute Labour under his direction and control to be performed, and the money to be expended, between the tenth day of May and the first day of November, and to insert in his Return of Statute Labour the names of all persons in his division liable to the performance of Statute Labour, whether on the Assessment Roll or not, and to require from each his portion of labour according to this By-Law.

Erd. Be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Pathmaster to order and direct every person liable to perform Statute Labour to bring with him such tools and implements as may be necessary, or such as he may be the owner of, and to require that he do, either in person or by an ablebodied man, work faithfully and diligently on the road; and when and where a team, waggon or cart shall be required and employed, with an able-bodied man to work the same, one day's work of such team and man shall be held and allowed as equivalent to three days' personal labour of one man—that eight hours' work, exclusive of the time of coming and returning, shall be considered and allowed as a day's work, and any man who shall refuse or neglect to work faithfully and diligently under his directions, the Overseer is authorized and required to discharge, and he shall not allow such person for any part or portion of the day in which he shall have laboured.

4th. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of all Pathmasters to make out their Return of Statute Labour performed, of labour commuted or compounded for, and of all moneys coming into their hands by virtue of their office, and of the expenditure of the same; also of all persons who have neglected or refused to perform their Statute Labour—which Return and Account must be verified on oath before the Township Clerk or a Justice of the Peace, and deposited with the Township Clerk on or before the first day of December in each year.

5th. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That every male inhabitant of the Township of the age of twenty-one years and upwards and under sixty years of age, and not otherwise assessed, shall be liable to one and a-half days of Statute Labour on the roads and highways in the Township; and every party assessed upon the Assessment Roll of the Township shall, if the property of such party be assessed at not more than \$200, one and a-half day's labour.

At more than \$200, and not more than \$400, 2 days' and 2 hours' labour.

BY-LAW No. 113,

To prevent the Misapplication of Money and Statute Labour.

lst. Be it enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', That from and after the passing of this By-Law, it shall not be lawful for the Treasurer to pay, on the order of any Councillor or the Reeve, any sum or sums of money if such order does not plainly and particularly set forth from what appropriation such moneys are to be paid, and whether from general or special appropriations; neither shall it be lawful to pay such order unless there are sufficient funds in his hands specially appropriated to the purpose for which such order is given. 2nd. And be it further enacted, That no individual Councillor, out of Council, shall have power or authority in any way to interfere with the Pathmaster duly appointed, or to grant any order for the diversion of labour or money from the division to which such labour or money of right belongs, and the pathmaster's instructions shall be the authority by which each particular division shall be defined.

3rd. And be it further enacted, In cases where parties applying for grants of money for special purposes, and promising to contribute a sum or sums of money to said purpose, it shall not be lawful for the Treasurer to pay any portion of said grant until the parties have paid into his hands their portion, or furnish him with a certificate from the parties doing the work that they have received such money in part payment for such work.

From the fact above stated it will obviously occur to your municipal body, that the circumstances of your petitioner must be peculiarly distressing; especially, when it is considered that the only means available for the support of herself and family, are and have been, since the period of her husband's death, derived from the benefactions of the charitable and humane, for which, indeed, your petitioner is truly grateful. EXPLANATORY REMARKS

On the stopping up of part of the Danforth Road.

The Reeve addressed the audience, stating the nature of the case, and the utility of having those pieces of the Danforth Road closed up. The Reeve read the Statute of 1858, chap. 99, relating to the matter in question, which was necessary for the information of those present, and also stated, that any gentleman present was at liberty to address the Council with regard to his opinion in the matter. Some few of the gentlemen present addressed the Council, stating that, in their opinion, as the Danforth Road was now a public road, it would be better to keep it open so long as it was a public accommodation, at the same time knowing that those pieces of road proposed to be stopped up would not injure the benefit of the travelling public. Some who opposed the stopping up of any part of the Danforth Road got rather excited, and forming an erroneous idea, said if the Council should take it upon them to stop up part of the Danforth Road, that, in a short time, they would close it up altogether. But let them consult the statutes as above, and they will find that the road cannot be stopped up, unless ingress and egress can be obtained by the other public roads, adjoining the property connected with the Danforth Road. To authorise the opening of a certain Road Allowance in this Township.

Whereas application has been made to the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', to open the allowance for road between lots 14 and 15, in the 2nd concession, and the parties in possession thereof having refused to do so,

Be it therefore enacted, by the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', that from and after the passing of this By-law, that the Reeve is hereby authorised, and required forthwith, to take legal steps to open, or cause to be opened, the allowance for road between lots 14 and 15, in the 2nd concession, in said township.

Mr. Helliwell, seconded by Mr. Ashbridge, moved that Wm. Johnston be allowed to transfer his tavern licence for the Blue Bell Inn to Wm. Marr. Carried.

Mr. Crawford, seconded by Mr. Helliwell, moved that the Treasurer be authorized to give credit to Daniel Ferguson, Collector, for the sum of one dollar thirty-four and a-half cents, that he could not collect, as the parties had removed. Carried.

Mr. Helliwell, seconded by Mr. Snider, moved that the sum of one dollar and three cents be paid to Andrew J. Thomson, that amount having been collected from him in error. Carried.

Mr. Crawford, seconded by Mr. Ashbridge, moved that the sum of ten dollars be granted to Ward No. 3, to pay for plank for bridges in said Ward. Carried.

BY-LAW No. 122.

Be it enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Scarboro', That so much of By-Law No. 118, appointing James Purvis, Returning Officer for Ward No. 3, be repealed, and that the same be amended by inserting the name of John Muir, Sen., as Returning Officer for said Ward No. 3.
