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# MINUTES OF COUNCIL.

## FIRST MEETING.

SARBOROUGH, January 15th, 1866.

Pursuant to statute, the Council elect met this 15th day of January, at noon, at Johnston's Inn, Woburn.

The clerk produced the election returns from the different returning officers, declaring the following gentlemen duly elected councillors for this municipality for the year 1866, having made and subscribed to the declaration of qualification and office, according to law, viz.:—

The Clerk in the chair.

Moved by Mr. Stephenson, seconded by Mr. Chester, That Thomas Brown, Esq., be elected Reeve for the current year. Carried.

The Reeve having made and subscribed the declaration of office according to law. The Reeve took the chair.

Moved by Mr. Kennady, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That George Chester, Esq., be appointed Deputy-Reeve for the current year. Carried.

The Deputy-Reeve having made and subscribed the declaration of office according to law, the Council being regularly organized, proceeded to business.

The Reeve laid on the table from B. W. Gossage, P. L. S., plan and descriptions of that portion of the Government road allowance between lots No. 16 and 17, in concession D, of this township, which the corporation intends to stop up and dispose off; also, the plan and description of the road which passes over lot No. 5, in the 3rd concession of this township, which the Council intends to confirm as a highway.

Presented by Mr. Kennady, an account from Mr. M. Macklin, jun., Secretary of the Mount Meldrum Division Sons of Temperance, of two dollars, for use of hall at election, requesting payment of the same.

Mr. Chester moved, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That Geo. R. Secor be appointed inspector of houses of public entertainment, at a salary of fifteen dollars for the current year. *Lost*.

Mr. Stephenson in amendment moved, seconded by Mr. Kennady, That James Ormerod be inspector of houses of public entertainment for the current year, at a salary of fifteen dollars per annum. *Carried*.

*Yeas*—Messrs. Stephenson, Kennady, and the Reeve.

*Nays*—Messrs. Chester and Whiteside.

Moved by Mr. Kennady, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That Mr. Simon Miller be appointed auditor, to audit the township accounts for the year 1865. *Carried*.

On motion, Mr. Stephenson asked for leave to bring in a By-Law to appoint an Inspector of Houses of Public Entertainment. *Leave given*.

By-Law introduced, read a first, second and third time, and passed.

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#### BY-LAW No. 172,

*For the appointment of Inspector of Houses of Public Entertainment for the year 1866.*

The Corporation of the township of Scarborough enacts as follows:

That James Ormerod be and he is hereby appointed Inspector of Houses of Public Entertainment, at a salary of fifteen dollars for the current year.

By-Law read a third time and passed.

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BY-LAW No. 173,

*For the appointment of Auditors.*

The Corporation of the township of Scarborough enacts as follows:—

That Simon Miller and Wm. Dickson be, and they are hereby appointed auditors, at a salary of four dollars (\$4) each, per annum. Passed January 15th, 1866.

By-Law introduced, read the first, second and third time, and passed.

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BY-LAW No. 174.

*For the appointment of Assessors for the year 1866.*

The Corporation of the township of Scarborough enacts as follows:—

That Daniel Ferguson be, and is hereby appointed assessor for the current year, at a salary of seventy dollars (\$70) per annum.

Moved by Mr. Kennady, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That the treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay to Francis Bell, treasurer of Mount Meldrum Division of the Sons of Temperance, the sum of two dollars, being amount as per account rendered for use of Hall at Municipal election for Ward No. 4. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Chester, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That this Council do now adjourn, and stand adjourned until the second Monday in February. Carried.

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## SECOND MEETING.

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SCARBOROUGH, February 12th, 1866.

Council met this day at Johnston's Inn, Woburn.

The Reeve in the chair.

PRESENT.—Messrs. Chester, Kennady, Stephenson, and Whiteside.

Minutes of last meeting read.

By Mr. Stephenson—The petition of E. R. Jacques, and ten others, praying the Council to grant aid to William Callander.

By Mr. Stephenson—Two accounts, one from David Wallace, for fuel used at the municipal election in ward No. 2; the other for cleaning school-house, amounting to fifty cents each.

By Mr. Stephenson—The petition of Robert Dixon and 35 others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to William Keeler, to obtain a license from the Revenue Collector, to keep an inn on lot No. 7, concession first, of this township, and known as "The Commercial Inn."

By the Reeve—The report of the auditors and township accounts for 1865.

Mr. Stephenson moved, seconded by Mr. Kennady, That the account of David Wallace, amounting to fifty cents, for fuel used at the Municipal Election in Ward No. 2, held in the School House, section No. 7, be paid; and also the account of fifty cents for cleaning said School, and that the treasurer pay the above accounts. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Whiteside, seconded by Mr. Chester, That the sum of five dollars be granted for the relief of Elizabeth West, and that the treasurer is hereby instructed to pay the same to the Councillor for Ward No. 5. Carried.

Mr. Stephenson moved, seconded by Mr. Chester, That the township Accounts, as received from the Auditors, be adopted, and that they be printed along with the minutes of this Council. Carried.

Mr. Stephenson moved, seconded by Mr. Kennady, That the Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and required to get printed, at as cheap a rate as possible, five hundred copies of the Minutes and Accounts of this Corporation for 1865, and that ninety-five copies be given to each Councillor for distribution. Carried.

Mr. Stephenson moved, seconded by Mr. Chester, That this Council do now adjourn, to meet again in this place on Monday, the 26th February, 1866. Carried.

Council met this day at Johnston's Inn, Woburn.

The Reeve in the chair.

**PRESENT**—Messrs. Chester, Kennady, Stephenson, and Whiteside.

Minutes of last meeting read.

Petitions presented:

By the Reeve—Petition from Richard Sylvester and thirty-three others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to Alexander Thompson, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector, to keep an inn on lot No. 27, concession B, and known as "The Halfway Inn."

By the Reeve—Petition from James Jones and thirty-four others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to Ingol Burton, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector, to keep an inn on lot No. 29, concession B, and known as "The Farmers' Inn."

By Mr. Stephenson—Petition of Thomas Parker and thirty-nine others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to Eli Shackleton, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector, to keep an inn on lot No. 10, concession first, and known as "Shackleton's Inn."

By Mr. Whiteside—Petition from William Bell and thirty-two others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to Samuel Mighton, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector, to keep an inn on lot No. 29, concession C, and known as the "Blue Bell Inn."

By Mr. Chester—Petition from William Chamberlain and thirty-two others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to Jonathan Baird, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector to keep an Inn on lot No. 19, concession D, and known as "The Railway Inn."

By Mr. Chester—Petition from Thomas Parker and thirty others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to William Johnston, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector to keep an Inn on lot No. 19, concession 1st. and known as "General Wolfe's Inn."

By Mr. Chester—Petition from William Burton and thirty-four others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to John Raymer, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector to keep an Inn on lot No. 19, concession 2nd, and known as "Speed the Plough Inn."

By the Reeve—Petition from Arthur Martin and thirty-three others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to Alexander Moffatt, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector to keep an Inn on lot No. 35, concession C, and known as "The Royal Oak Inn."

By Mr. Whiteside—Petition from Robert Armstrong and thirty-two others, praying the Council to grant a certificate to Richard Sylvester, to obtain a license from the Revenue Inspector to keep an Inn on lot No. 35, concession D, and known as "The Rising Sun Inn."

The Reeve read and laid on the table the following communications, viz :

Moved by Mr. Stephenson, seconded by Mr. Kennady, That the report of the License Inspector as received, be adopted. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Stephenson, seconded by Mr. Chester, and *Resolved*,—That the treasurer is hereby instructed to sign certificates to obtain licenses for the following innkeepers, who have complied with the law in that behalf, namely, Messrs. Alexander Thompson, Ingol Burton, Eli Shackleton, Samuel Mighton, Jonathan Baird, William Keeler, William Johnston, John Raymer, Alexander Moffatt, and Richard Sylvester.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Chester, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That the treasurer be, and is hereby authorized to pay Peter

Cavanagh, or order, the sum of five dollars, as per account, rendered for assisting B. W. Gossage, P. L. S., in surveying the road over lot No. 5, concession 3rd. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Stephenson, seconded by Mr. Kennady, That the treasurer be and he is hereby ordered to pay the account of Messrs. Dennis & Gossage, P.L.S., amounting to thirty-one dollars and eighty cents, for surveying and drawing plans of side road between lots Nos. 16 and 17 in concession D, and also the road on lot No. 5, concession 3rd. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Stephenson, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That the Councillor for Ward No. 2 be and he is hereby instructed to sell the timber on the 3rd concession road, in front of lots Nos. 5, 6 and 7, and to expend the proceeds in front of said lots. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Chester, seconded by Mr. Kennady, That this Council do now adjourn, and stand adjourned until Monday, the 3rd March. Carried.

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#### FOURTH MEETING.

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SCARBOROUGH, March 5th, 1866.

Council met this day at Johnston's Inn.

The Reeve in the chair.

PRESENT—Messrs. Chester, Kennady, and Whiteside.

Minutes of last meeting read.

Petitions presented:—

By Mr. Chester—Petition of Martin Crosier, praying for aid, recommended by several rate-payers.

Moved by Mr. Chester, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That the sum of ten dollars be granted for the relief of Martin Crosier, being in destitute circumstances, and that the treasurer be, and is hereby authorized to pay the same into the hands of the Councillor for Ward No. 3 for said purpose. Carried.

Mr. Chester moved for leave to bring in a By-Law for regulating and enforcing the performance of statute labour, &c., and for repealing By-Laws No. 4, 93, and 112.

Leave given. By-Law introduced, read a first and second time. On motion, the Council went into committee of the whole thereon.

Mr. Kennady in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the By-Law as amended.

Report received and adopted. By-Law read a third time and passed.

#### BY-LAW No. 175,

*For regulating and enforcing the performance of Statute Labour, &c., and for repealing By-Laws Nos. 4, 93 and 112.*

1st. *Be it enacted* by the Corporation of the township of Scarborough, That from and after the passing of this By-Law, it shall and may be lawful for the Pathmasters to notify all such persons as may be liable to the performance of Statute Labor, and residing within the limits of their Divisions (and not otherwise exempted), of the time and place where such labor is to be performed, not less than three days previous; and if any person neglect or refuse to perform Statute Labor, either by himself or by an able-bodied substitute, after such notification, it shall be the duty of the Pathmaster, within ten days, to report such defaulter to the township Clerk, whose duty it shall be to bring the offender to justice, and, on conviction, such defaulter shall be liable to a fine of not less than one dollar for each day's labor so neglected or refused to be performed, together with costs, the same to be recovered by distress, and sale of the goods and chattels of such defaulter, and if no goods shall be found, then such defaulter shall be imprisoned for a term of not less than six days nor more than twenty, and shall be still liable to the performance of his quota of labor.

2nd. *Be it further enacted*, That it shall be the duty of each Pathmaster to superintend and keep in repair the roads and bridges in his Division, and to direct persons performing Statute Labor to destroy weeds hurtful to husbandry; to erect, by Statute

Labor, guards and fences in dangerous places within his Division, and cause the Statute Labor under his direction and control to be performed, and the money to be expended, between the tenth day of May and the first day of October, and to insert, in his return of Statute Labor, the names of all persons in his Division liable to the performance of Statute Labor, whether on the Assessment Roll or not, and to require from each his portion of labor, according to this By-Law.

3rd. *Be it enacted*, That it shall be the duty of the Pathmaster to order and direct every person liable to perform Statute Labor, to bring with him such tools and implements as may be necessary, or such as he may be the owner of, and to require that he do, either in person or by an able-bodied man, work faithfully and diligently on the road; and when and where a team, waggon or cart shall be required and employed, with an able-bodied man to work the same, one day's work of such team and man shall be held and allowed as equivalent to three days' personal labor of one man; that eight hours' work, exclusive of the time of coming and returning, shall be considered and allowed as a day's work; and any man who shall refuse or neglect to work faithfully and diligently under his directions, the overseer is authorized and required to discharge, and he shall not allow such person for any part or portion of the day in which he shall have laboured.

4th. *And be it enacted*, That it shall be the duty of all pathmasters to make out their return of statute labour performed, of labour commuted or compounded for, and of all moneys coming into their hands by virtue of their office, and of the expenditure of the same, also, of all persons who have neglected or refused to perform their statute labour, and deposit the same with the township clerk, on or before the first day of November in each year.

5th. *And be it further enacted*, by the authority aforesaid, That every male inhabitant of the township, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, and under sixty years of age, and not otherwise assessed, shall be liable to one and a-half days of statute labour, on the roads and highways in the township; and every party assessed upon the assessment roll of the township, shall, if the property of such party be assessed at not more than \$200, one and a-half day's labour.

And for every \$800 above the sum of \$4,000, six hours' labor, or to compound for the same by paying to the Overseer of the Beat where he, or she may reside, the sum of seventy-five cents for each day they may be so liable, on or before the day on which he notifies the parties to work.

6th. *Be it further enacted*, That By-Laws Nos. 4, 93 and 112, being By-Laws for enforcing and regulating the performance of Statute Labor, and all other By-Laws inconsistent with this By-Law, are hereby repealed.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. Chester, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That this Council do now adjourn, and stand adjourned until the fourth Monday in April, the 23rd instant. Carried.

TORONTO, April 16th, 1866.

*And, whereas*, the line of the said road as now laid out under the provisions of the said acts has been adopted and used, and being so used and travelled, F. F. Passmore, Deputy Provincial Surveyor, has reported in writing that such new and travelled road is sufficient for the purposes of a public highway, and the portions of the said road allowances hereinafter mentioned and described, have been, and are in the opinion of the Council of the said municipality, useless for the purposes of a road or highway. And it has been considered advisable that the said pieces

being portions of the said public allowance for road should be closed, and no longer used as a public highway, but that the same should be respectively sold and conveyed.

*And, whereas,* the said several pieces or parcels respectively adjoin and lie alongside the lands and premises of several persons hereinafter mentioned, to whom they are hereinafter directed to be respectively sold and conveyed. And it is proper that the price or purchase money of the said several respective pieces or parcels of land should be paid to the several persons from whose land the corresponding portions of the road, as now laid out, and use have been taken.

*Be it therefore enacted,* By the municipal Council of the township of Scarborough :—

That the several pieces or parcels of land hereinafter described and numbered respectively from one to three inclusive, being part of the original road allowance between lots 16 and 17, in concession D, in the township of Scarborough, be, and the same are and so much of the said highway as passes over the same, is hereby closed and stopped up, and the same shall no longer be used as a highway.

*And be it further enacted,* That the piece or parcel of land, portion of the said highway, but hereby closed up and stopped, and which may be better known and described as follows, that is to say :—Commencing at a point on the west limit of the said government road allowance (on a straight line drawn from the front to the rear of the concession), which point is at the distance of twenty-eight chains and three links on a course north, sixteen degrees west, from a stone monument planted by P. Passmore, on the north west limit of the government road allowance, between concessions C and D; thence north sixteen degrees west, along west limit of said side road a distance of twenty-one chains, more or less, to the intersection of the west limit of the road now laid out; thence south twenty-five degrees, thirty minutes; east, four chains, fifty links; thence south fourteen degrees, fifteen minutes; east, seven chains, fifty links; thence south twenty-five degrees; east four chains twenty links; thence south three degrees thirty minutes; east five chains seventeen links, more or less, to the place of beginning, containing by admeasurement one acre and three perches of



land, more or less, be sold to Colonel McLean, of the township of Scarborough, for the price or sum of twelve dollars, and that the Reeve of this municipality be authorized, and he is hereby required, to sign, seal and execute, in the name of and on behalf of the municipality all necessary deeds and writings for the proper conveyance of the same, and that the purchase money thereof be paid to Jeremiah Annis.

*And be it further enacted*, that the piece or parcel of land, portion of the said highway, but hereby closed up and stopped, and which may be better known and described as follows, that is to say:—Commencing at a point where the east limit of the road, as now laid out, intersects the east limit of the Government road allowance, between lots sixteen and seventeen; thence on a course north, twenty-five degrees, thirty minutes, west, four chains, more or less, to the centre of the Highland Creek; thence easterly, along the centre of the said Highland Creek, fifty links, more or less, to the intersection of the east limit of the Government road allowance; thence south, sixteen degrees, east, three chains, more or less, along east limit of said Government road allowance, to the place of beginning, containing by admeasurement eleven perches of land, more or less, be sold to Jeremiah Annis, of the Township of Scarborough, for the price or sum of four dollars, and that the Reeve of this municipality be authorized, and he is hereby required to sign, seal and execute, in the name of and on behalf of the municipality, all necessary deeds and writings for the proper conveyance of the same, and that the purchase money thereof be paid to the executors of the estate of the late Robert Jackson.

*And be it further enacted*, That the piece or parcel of land, portion of the said highway, but hereby closed up and stopped, and which may be better known and described as follows, that is to say:—Commencing at a point where the west limit of the government road allowance intersects the east limit of the road as now laid out; thence on a course north, one degree; east, four chains, more or less, to the intersection of the east limit of the said government road allowance; thence south sixteen degrees; east, along east limit of said road allowance, seven chains, sixty links, more or less, to the centre of the Highland Creek; thence westerly following the centre of said Highland Creek, fifty links,

more or less, to the east limit of the said road as now laid out; thence north twenty-five degrees, thirty minutes; west three chains, eighty links, more or less to the place of beginning, containing by admeasurement one rood, thirty-two perches of land, more or less, be sold to William H. AND PEEL, TO WIT: } Majesty's Justices of the Peace,  
hereby certify that we have been called to examine into the cause of the destruction of some sheep and the injury of some others belonging to Mr. James Maginn, of the township of Scarborough. We found the sheep were killed and injured on the 18th and 19th June last, those killed were buried at the time, so that we could not examine them, but we took such evidence as was produced (which we herewith submit) as to satisfy us that he had five lambs killed with dogs, worth two dollars and fifty cents each, and three lambs and one sheep damaged to the amount of one dollar and fifty cents each, making eighteen dollars and fifty cents, and the further sum of three dollars damage incurred in cost, making together the sum of twenty-one dollars and fifty cents, which we consider him entitled to under the 29th Vic., Cap. 39.

Mr. Chester moved, seconded by Mr. Kennady, That the treasurer be, and is hereby authorized to pay Edward Armstrong the sum of fourteen dollars, being amount of his claim for two sheep and two lambs killed by dogs in June last. Carried.

Mr. Whiteside moved, seconded by Mr. Stephenson, That the sum of five dollars be granted for the relief of Elizabeth West, and that the treasurer be, and is authorized to pay the same into the hands of the Councillor for ward No. 5. Carried.

Mr. Stephenson moved, seconded by Mr. Whiteside, That the

treasurer be authorized to pay Charles Lee the sum of six dollars for repairing the bridge on the 1st concession road in front of lot No. 3. Carried.

On motion of leave, Charles D. Maginn, Esq., was heard before the bar of this Council with regard to the omission of his name from the assessment roll, for the year 1866.

Mr. Whiteside moved, seconded by Mr. Kennady, That the clerk be, and he is hereby authorized to insert in the assessment roll and also in the voters' list the name of Mr. Charles Maginn, his name having been inadvertently left out by the assessor, contrary to the assessment Act of Upper Canada.
