#### REGULATIONS.

- 1. That this Society shall be denominated "The Upper Canada Religious Tract and Book Society."
- II. That this Society approves of the principles on which the London Religious Tract Society is founded, as set forth in the official statement and declaration of that Society; and that it shall only circulate the publications of that Society, or other publications of a similar character.
- III. That Annual Subscribers, paying Five Shillings, Currency, or more, shall be members of the Society.
- IV. That Subscribers of Five Pounds, Currency, and Ministers remitting congregational collections to the extent of Five Pounds, Currency, shall be members for life.
- V. That a Committee of Twelve Members, exclusive of the Officers of the Society, shall be annually chosen, to conduct the business of the Society; that Eight who have most constantly attended the meetings of the Committee throughout the year, may be re-elected for the ensuing year; and that the Committee for the time being shall be empowered to fill up any vacancies that may occur.
- VI. That the Officers of the Society shall be—a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and Depositary.
- VII. That Ministers of the Gospel, being members of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.
- VIII. That all Subscribers shall be entitled to have Tracts to the value of half their subscriptions; and that Ministers, or others, remitting a collection, shall be entitled to Tracts to the value of half the collection—on behalf of the congregation that may have made the collection—the same being called for any time within three months of payment of subscription.
- IX. That the Committee shall meet for business at least once a-quarter.
- X. That this Society shall, to the utmost extent of its resources, encourage the formation of Auxiliary Societies throughout the Province.
- XI. That the Annual General Meeting of this Society shall be held at such time and place as the Committee shall see fit.
- XII. That all Meetings of this Society, and of the Committee, shall be opened and closed with prayer.

The ANNUAL MEETING of the UPPER CANADA RELIGI-OUS TRACT and BOOK SOCIETY was held in the Wesleyan-Methodist Chapel, Newgate Street, on Thursday Evening, the 2nd of May, 1844:

The Rev. WILLIAM RINTOUL in the Chair.

The Meeting was opened with Prayer by the Rev. J. Harris; and after the reading of the Report by one of the Secretaries, the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

I. Moved by the Rev. J. RICHARDSON; seconded by the Rev. J. HARRIS.

That the Report now read be adopted and printed, and that the following gentlemen, with the President and Vice-Presidents as in the past year, be the Officers and Committee for the ensuing year:

II. Moved by the Rev. J. ROAF; seconded by the Rev. H. WILKINSON.

That the increased circulation of Religious Books and Tracts, through the instrumentality of this Society, is a subject of thanks-giving to God; and that this Meeting entertains the conviction that the works circulated are well calculated to prove an antidote to those anti-Protestant and unscriptural sentiments and publications so zealously inculcated and widely circulated at the present time.

III. Moved by the Rev. A. LILLIE; seconded by Mr. Lawson.

That this Meeting tenders to the Tract Distributors an expression of thanks, and earnestly requests them to persevere in their work.

IV. Moved by the Rev. D. RINTOUL; seconded by JESSE KETCHUM, Esq.

That the Annual General Meeting of this Society be held at such time and place as the Committee shall see fit.

V. Moved by the Rev. J. HARRIS; seconded by Mr. J. LAMB.

That the Thanks of the Meeting be given to the Rev. William Rintoul, for presiding on this occasion.

The Meeting concluded with Prayer by the Rev. H. Wilkinson.

Your Committee feel much pleasure in having this opportunity of meeting their Christian Friends on the present Anniversary occasion; and, in submitting a brief Report of their labours during the past year, they would humbly and gratefully acknowledge the favour and blessing of Almighty God on their efforts, attributing all their success to Him whose blessing maketh rich and addeth no sorrow.

It is truly gratifying that they can report an increase of subscriptions and receipts for sales, and that the Society is in a prosperous condition,—affording the friends of this Institution abundant encouragement to increasing activity and perseverance in spreading the blessed truths of the glorious Gospel by the more extensive circulation of the publications of the Parent Society. And while we would devoutly attribute all our success to the blessing of Jehovah, we would fervently pray,—O, Lord, we beseech Thee, send us a continuance of prosperity!

#### THE FINANCES.

The total Receipts of the Society for the past year have been £493 1s. 7d., being £627s. 8½d. more than the preceding year. There has been an increase in the Subscriptions and Contributions of £13 12s. 4d. over the amount of last year,—including, however, Five Pounds which His Excellency the Governor-General has generously contributed to the funds of the Society. The Expenditure, including the several

payments made to the Parent Society for Tracts and Books, amounts to £484 10s. 9d.; to which may be added £29 8s. 6½d., being the value of gratuitous issues; making a total outlay of £513 19s. 3½d. We would here remark, that the sum the Society had to pay in October, 1842, on losses sustained by the grounding of the schooner Belvidere, in 1841, has been refunded.

The number of Publications issued is 132 more than the preceding year. The total circulation of the Society, since its commencement, has been 478,303 publications, or nearly half a million.

The demand for Libraries has increased considerably during the year, twenty-six having been disposed of. It is worthy of remark, that each of these Libraries contains one hundred volumes of most interesting

and decidedly evangelical publications; and we are assured that their circulation has already been useful to a considerable extent.

There have been issued from your Depository, during the year, Sunday School Books, &c., (supplied by the London Sunday School Union) 6,316 publications, amounting in value to £65 9s. 2½d.

#### THE CITY TRACT AND LOAN SOCIETY.

The Visitors continue their labour of love with unabated zeal and perseverance; and, during the past year, we have every reason to believe that their efforts have not been in vain. The importance of this part of the Society's operations cannot be fully estimated; for, doubtless, by this method many are brought to read, examine, and savingly profit by Divine truth, who could not be reached by the ordinary means of grace, in consequence of their habitual neglect thereof.

We might also mention that several scholars of different Sunday Schools have, during the year, organized themselves into Juvenile Loan Tract Societies,—subscribing among themselves to buy Tracts,—obtaining Tracts from subscribers,—and a part have been furnished them at your Depository gratuitously. They have employed themselves diligently during their spare hours on the Sabbath in visiting the most destitute parts of the City, loaning and exchanging their Tracts; and we feel a strong confidence their labours will be made a blessing, and would encourage them to persevere.

The Tract Distribution among the Military in the Garrison has been continued during the past year.

#### TRACT DISTRIBUTION BY YOUR DEPOSITARY.

The Lunatic Asylum, General Hospital, and Jail, have been regularly supplied with Tracts gratuitously; and, by the manner in which they are received, we

have encouragement to hope, and believe, that they have been generally useful.

The Steamboats and Emigrant Sheds have been also regularly visited by your Depositary, and supplied with Tracts, during the season commencing in May and closing in November. The Tracts have generally been received with gratitude, and our hopes are sanguine that much good has been effected thereby.

#### AUXILIARIES.

In the absence of Reports from the different Auxiliaries, we have reason to believe, from the supplies of Tracts and Books sent, that their operations are continued with success.

#### PARENT SOCIETY.

We have again gratefully to acknowledge the liberality of the Parent Society, in presenting this Auxiliary with ten pounds sterling worth of Tracts. Their Forty-fourth Report has been received; it is highly interesting, and an attentive perusal of it must gladden the soul of every sincere Christian, while its gigantic and multifarious operations in every part of the world are truly astonishing.

The Publications issued from their Depository are 16,067,176, making the total circulation of the Society, in nearly ninety different languages, including the issues of Foreign Societies, assisted by the Parent Institution, to exceed three hundred and seventy millions of copies of its different publications. The total benevolent income (including £1,747 4s. 4d., special donations for China,) amounts to £6,908 0s. 2d. Total amount received for sales £43,064 14s. 9d., making the whole amount of receipts, including proceeds of sales, £52,605 7s. 9d. The gratuitous issues, includ-

ing money grants to Foreign Societies, &c., is £6,649 7s. 1d., being £1,488 11s. 3d. over the amount of benevolent contributions. We trust that their benevolent, vigorous, and successful operations will stimulate us to copy their example, to follow them as they follow Christ.

With regard to the Publications of the Parent Society, which we circulate, we cannot better describe them than by giving you an extract from their Report, page 10th:—"The works of the Society are almost as various in their size and contents as the characters of the readers for whose spiritual good they have been prepared. They commence with the little handbill, and extend to a commentary upon the Holy Scriptures, and even to a complete edition of the Bible itself. They include publications suitable for all classes of people, from the child of penury to the richest noble in the land. They afford instruction to the theological student, and the poor cottager who is seeking the way of salvation."

"In the works of the Reformers and Puritans, and in many other publications, there will be found 'strong meat for them that are of full age;' in the numerous juvenile works 'milk for babes who are unskilful in the word of righteousness;' while, in every production that is sent forth, 'the bread of life' is presented to the

poor and perishing sinner."

"In the preparation of the Society's works it is the constant and invariable desire of the Committee that every tract and book shall contain a clear statement of the method of a sinner's recovery from guilt and misery by the atonement and grace of the Redeemer. So that if a person were to read a tract, even of the smallest size, and should never have an opportunity of seeing another, he might be plainly taught that, in order to salvation, he must be born again of the Holy Spirit, and justified by faith in the perfect obedience unto death of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

#### MONTREAL TRACT SOCIETY.

We have not received the Annual Report of the Montreal Tract Society, and therefore cannot furnish any details of their operations; but we are glad to learn from other sources, that they continue vigorously to proceed in their career, and that their labours are crowned with success.

#### AMERICAN SOCIETY.

By the Report of the Parent Society we are informed that the American Tract Society continues with increased activity to prosecute the glorious Christian and Missionary work of disseminating religious truth by means of its publications.

#### CONCLUSION.

In closing this very brief Report your Committee would assure you, that it affords them sincere pleasure in being able to inform you that cordial harmony has prevailed among them during the year. And although they have not been able to accomplish all they have desired, yet, with a oneness of mind and feeling, their end and aim has been to spread, to the utmost of their power, the soul-saving principles of the religion of their Divine Master. And in resigning their trust, they would conclude in the language of the Committee of the Parent Society,—expressing their sincere hope that the future Managers of the Society may be specially prepared for the duties they have to discharge.

"The wisdom and goodness of God to his Church have often been displayed in the adaptation of instruments for the times in which they have lived. Such persons, they trust, will be raised up, who will cheer-

fully co-operate with the friends of this Institution in opposing the numerous and dangerous errors which now prevail: Men who will be the Wickliffes, the Luthers, and the Knoxes of our day;—men who, jealous for the Divine honour, shall rise above the love of party and the fear of man, and proclaim 'the whole counsel of God;'—men who, uniting holy zeal with christian meekness, shall 'earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints;' and who, without reserve and with uncompromising fidelity shall determine to know nothing among men 'save Jesus Christ and him crucified.'"

With such instrumentality, accompanied by the blessing of the Holy Spirit, the Society will successfully advance in its conflict with every soul-destroying error; calmly resting its hope of final triumph on the Divine assurance, "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me."
