Your Directors in presenting their Report of the operations of the Society for the year 1867, feel that they have reason to be thankful to the giver of all mercies, inasmuch as they are able to report a very considerable increase in the labours of the Society over those of any previous year. This is to them a great source of encouragement, as they trust it will be to all who take an interest in the Society. The fact that the operations of the Society have been steadily increasing in the past, and especially so for some years, when the facilities for great labours were, at least equal to what they are at present, shows, that all has not been done which might have been done, and your Directors hope that the Christian people of the Province will give their sympathy and support to the Society, and that the year 1868 will show a very much larger increase over 1867, than it does over the previous year. This can easily be done, and we would pray that the Lord may enlighten the minds of the people to the reception of the truth, and to see the value of a sound religious literature being diffused over the country.

Before entering upon the different items of the Report, it becomes the painful duty of Your Directors to refer to the blank which has been made during the past year in the list of the Vice Presidents of the Society. The familiar name of Jesse Ketchum, the kind benefactor of the Society, the willing supporter of everything deserving of Christian aid, is this year missed from the list proposed for your adoption. He has fallen asleep. In his removal the Society would seek to acknowledge the hand of an all wise and loving Providence, and offer to Mrs. Ketchum, his widow, their kindest Christian sympathy in her sad bereavement.

As compared with the Issues of the Society for the four preceding years, there is a fair increase in all, except two items. "Tracts sold," which in 1863, was 94,571, while for 1867 it was 93,145, shewing in favour of 1863, a balance of 1,426; but for the three subsequent years there is 7,096 in favor of 1867, over the highest. We trust that this increase is an evidence of the awakening of individual responsibility among the Christian people of our Province. The other item is that of "Bibles and Testaments with Psalms and Paraphrases," which in the year 1865 reached 9,033, giving in excess of 1867, 1,524. The large increase in "Libraries," sent out, is well worthy of note, and we think it may be taken as indicative of prosperity in the rural districts, as well as manifesting a desire for good sound reading matter. Sunday Schools, also, would seem to be taking advantage of the good likely to arise from the distribution of juvenile papers among the Scholars, if we can judge from the large issue of them.

As compared with the previous few years, the Gratuitous Distributions do not appear to have come quite up to the average. There is, however, a noticeable feature in one item under this head, that of "Country Distributions," which has gone up from 127,046, in 1866, to 270,784 in 1867. We are glad to see this, and, as in former Reports, would invite every one to draw out tracts to half the amount of their subscriptions, only let those doing so, see that the tracts are disposed of in such a way that they, under the blessing of God, may bring forth fruit to His glory. We would especially press upon the Christian public the importance of a tract distribution, which has so often proved the means of leading a poor sinner to Jesus—for who is there that cannot give away a tract? Your directors feel sure that much good could be done by a system of exchange distribution among the farming community, and would ask, will not Christians take it up. "He which converteth a sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins."

We subjoin Reports of Distributors to whom grants have been made, so far as these reports have been sent in; and we would just say for their encouragement, and also to those from whom reports have not been received, that the Directors derive great interest and benefit from these reports, and they feel confident that they will have the like effect upon the subscribers. "Cast thy bread upon the waters for thou shalt find it after many days."

#### REPORT OF THE TORONTO YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

*To the Directors of the Upper Canada Religious Tract and Book Society.*

SIRs,—In the name of the Toronto Young Men's Christian Association, I beg to thank you for your liberality in supplying us with tracts, which have been a very great help to us in our work. In fact tracts are an absolute necessity in some parts of our work. Perhaps you may say that we have not shewn our appreciation of your liberality properly, as we have not drawn as largely from you as we did last year; but we had this year large grants from the Parent Society, and also from Mr. Drummond and Mr. Bewley.

We have distributed tracts and handbills to the sailors and lumbermen on board the vessels and in the shanties, to the cabmen, the soldiers, and the travellers in trains about to start, and elsewhere, as opportunity has offered, such as to workmen going home on Saturdays, to the crowd coming out of the Police Court and around the Market Place. Tracts have also been circulated through

the Centre Street and Sayer Street schools. Among Sabbath strollers we distributed 10,641 handbills, principally in the Queen's Park and on Yonge Street, but also in St. James' Cemetery and along the Esplanade.

Although we cannot report to you any instance in which we know that one of the tracts you have supplied us with has been the direct means of conversion, we have not been without evidence of your tracts being appreciated.

On one occasion, a woman on board one of the freight steamers, gave the distributors twenty-five cents towards your Society. This she did quite of her own accord, but this did not much surprise the distributors, as she appeared from her conversation to be a Christian. But on another occasion a distributor told a French Canadian cabin-boy that the Captain had said they tore the tracts up. The boy quite indignantly went to his chest and produced ten or twelve tracts, evidently both read and taken care of. He had read all the three different kinds of French tracts which the distributor had with him that morning, but as one of them was "Mick Healy," which he said was "tres bon," he asked for another copy. Here also, as on many former occasions, your Society proved the handmaid of the Bible Society for this lad though he did not buy a Testament was quite eager for a gift of St. Luke's and St. John's gospels, which he received, though it is not our general practice to give more than one. The following Sunday the same schooner happening to be in, the boy was exceedingly anxious for the distributor to have a reading on board of her, but time did not allow.

One of the soldiers found the tracts so applicable to himself that he thought the distributor had always chosen them with a special view to his own case.

The gunboat "Heron" has been visited every week or two, and tracts given, which has been most gladly received by the sailors.

I may here perhaps, without any impropriety, mention a fact, which, though it does not relate to a tract supplied by your Society to our Association, does relate to a tract bought at your Depository by a member of our Association. After a prayer meeting in Montreal last year, a young man asked a member of our Association if he had not been on board a certain steamer, at a certain time. On being answered in the affirmative, he said that at that time he was in an undecided state, that on being given a tract by our member he felt rather insulted; but that the thoughts which that tract had given rise to had led him to decide for Christ, and he was then endeavouring to live for Him. The tract was in Welsh, and had been bought (I think in mistake for Gælic or Norwegian), at your depository two or three years before given. Hoping that this

will help you feel that even those tracts in strange languages in the out-of-the way pigeon holes are not lost, and that the other incidents will be felt encouraging.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE BOND  
STREET CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH TRACT DIS-  
TRIBUTION SOCIETY—PRESENTED 21ST FEBRUARY,  
1868.

Whenever we take a retrospective glance at the way in which the Lord hath led us, whether it be for a month or a year, and call to remembrance what we have done for God, and what we have left undone, and think of what he hath done for us, we have never to charge our God with having forgotten to be gracious, or that he hath withheld from us such aid as we may have required in any time of need; our want of success in any undertaking we can always trace to our own want of energy and perseverance, or too great confidence in ourselves, arising from the vain imaginings of the thoughts of our own hearts. We do not seek as we ought to glorify God in all that we do, we seem to forget what is the chief end of our being.

In presenting this Report, the committee feel greatly humbled by a recollection of the little we have done for Him who hath done so much for us. The number of our distributors has been, during the past year but five, and the number of families visited has not exceeded two hundred, still we have to sing of goodness and mercy and we confidently say that the Lord hath not forsaken us, and we believe that he will revive us again and bless us and make us increasingly useful. We have to record many tokens that the seed that has been sown in weakness will be raised in glory, and that we shall some day see much fruit that will refresh us and gladden our hearts. No longer back than Saturday, 15th, the writer of this Report called upon a family in one of our Districts, and was rejoiced to hear from the wife, who was the only one at home, that both herself and husband were anxious to see Jesus that they might surrender their hearts to him, and might be enabled to come forward and publicly declare themselves on the Lord's side. She stated that "she blessed God for having sent our distributor to her house, for she looked upon that friend as having been

the means of bringing her out of darkness into the glorious light of the Gospel of Jesus." May we not now say, "come magnify the Lord with us, let us exalt his name together." Our distributors also report other very hopeful cases.

We have also used other agencies, for we do not like to stand idle when so many of our fellow-sinners are perishing around us. We may mention that we employed a brother on several Sabbaths during the summer months to distribute in the College Avenue some of our little books that had gone the round of our Districts, and he rejoices in the assurance that his labours were owned and blessed of God. We have also supplied on three occasions, friends in the country with other tracts that had also passed through our Districts, and there is reason to believe that this little effort to glorify God and make his name known in the backwoods of our Province, has not been without its reward.

We are renewing our efforts in this work, and it is with pleasure we have to report that we expect to commence the month of March with eight distributors, two of whom will take two districts each, so that we hope to visit not less than three hundred families.

We are grateful for the supply of tracts we have received from the Upper Canada Tract and Book Society, and we say, "Brethren pray for us;" it is our own prayer that "we may never faint or grow weary in this work of the Lord.

And it is to be hoped that these efforts, though weak in themselves, shall not be in vain; but that they shall be instrumental in leading souls to Jesus.

## TORONTO ENGLISH CHURCH CITY MISSIONARY'S REPORT.

As to the value and importance of tract distributing, I think there can be no question; and that a good work is going on silently and quietly, by means of them I have every reason to believe. In all my house visits I make it a point always to leave one behind me with instructions when it is read to send it to their friends. I have been much gratified to learn, that in most cases where I have left them, they have been highly praised. One aged servant of God with whom I had left one, remarked on my visiting her again, "That was a beautiful tract you left me, it just suits my case." To another when talking about tracts, he said, "That next to the Bible he loved tracts." By means of them, we have an opportunity of laying before our Roman Catholic brethren the truths of the Gospel, which, in many instances, we cannot do in any other way, as they will listen to a tract when they will not listen to the Bible. No later than the other day, a Roman Catholic sent to me by a friend for a tract on the doctrine of Transubstantiation.

## CITY MISSIONARY'S REPORT.

At the close of another year, I feel it my duty to give a short report of my work, as a tract distributor, to the U. C. Tract Society, who liberally supplied me with tracts this last year. I have circulated many in dark places in this city in my daily visiting, and at the cottage prayer-meetings and jail. At these, I loan them, and next time exchange. In the summer, I visited daily the mail boat on her arrival, gave tracts to the passengers and emigrants on board. Generally they are received gladly, and many ask another from me. One lady, five years in Canada, said this was the first time a tract had been offered to her—she lives back in the country. She took some home with her for her friends and neighbours.

I have another field, the Park, which I visit on Sabbath evenings, when there are crowds walking, and many of them go to no church. One evening last summer I gave 1,700 tracts. I gave tracts on drunkenness, Sabbath-breaking, and the Gospel; all take them, and you would see crowds reading them on the grass as they were sitting there. I doubt not but much good has been done here. I know one, a drunkard, got a tract, he read it and he resolved to stop drinking—it is now five months, he has signed the pledge, he and family attend church; now he is another man, and a tract was the means under God of delivering him from the curse



of this land, strong drink—the name of the tract is “Is there any hope for the drunkard.” Ill. H.-Bills, No. 25.

When I think how many tracts are given, how much of God’s word they contain, and how many prayers are offered up for God to bless them, I doubt not, but that many will have cause to bless the Lord that these Tract Societies were formed. May the Holy Spirit awaken many, and bring them into Jesus’ fold, is the prayer and wish of your servant.

### III.—BRANCHES AND AGENCY.

For a full account of this important part of the work of your Society, we must refer you to the Report of the Agent, from which it will be seen, that though many of the Branches fell back, to some extent, from their usual activity, probably from not being visited by the Agent, yet they are again, by the Spirit of God, girding themselves for the work under the influence of a visit from the present efficient Agent. It is indeed important that the work of the Tract Society should be kept alive, as well as every good work, in these places, removed from the centre of population and activity, to which the advantages of resource and power over the rural parts, usually appertain; and hence it is not at all likely that the Directors, here, in the Metropolis, can devote too much attention to this part of the work.

For a period of ten months previous to the appointment of the present Agent, which took place in June last, no agent had been employed. But at no time during that period did the Board of Directors think, but that their own hands would be strengthened, and the work of the Society greatly aided by an efficient officer in that capacity; for they felt that much good was being left undone throughout the country, which could be accomplished by the agent. And so after great care, and considerable time, spent in trying to get one, who, in their judgment, possessed the necessary qualifications, the Rev. Peter Ker was engaged; and they are happy to think that the account of the labours of that gentleman shows that, in him, they made a good choice. Your Directors wish him every success in his work, and ask on his behalf, the sympathy and kindness of the people amongst whom he labours.

### IV.—FINANCES.

It is gratifying to the Directors that under this head of the Report, success is also to be noted. The receipts from Sales show a considerable advance on the previous year, while in the subscrip-

tions to the Society there is also some increase, notwithstanding that the Agent has only been labouring for about half of the year. In this connection the Directors would beg to acknowledge, with gratefulness, the receipt of the bequest of the late George Michie, Esq., of \$1,000.

#### V.—KINDRED SOCIETIES.

First among these stands our kind parent “The London Religious Tract Society,” whose efforts for the spread of truth continue unabated, and with increased zeal. During the year 1867, eighty-eight new tracts were added to the number already issued by that Society, and the total publications put forth by the Society, (as shewn by the last Annual Report in May 1867) for the previous year amounted to 38,720,491, making a total since its being established of 1,192,000,000. In every particular it appears to have the

Lord's blessing, as year after year there is a steady increase. The Society deserves, as it has, our best wishes and prayers, our object is similar, and we can well give it our sympathy. To the Home Society we are indebted for its usual grant of tracts, to the amount of £50 Stg., and an additional grant to the amount also of £67-13s. 4d.; also, for School Libraries at reduced prices, while its kind offices are felt at home and abroad.

We are highly pleased to see that the Paris Tract Society has not been idle during the past season of the Exhibition, and that through that society alone, and in many cases with marked good effect, the large number of between seven and eight millions of tracts were given away to visitors, while twelve hundred copies of portions of the Word of God were put into the hands of Roman Catholic Priests.

The American Societies appear, from their Report, to be fully up with the progress made by the other societies, and active in the work.

The different societies throughout the Dominion of Canada report favourable progress.

May the blessing of God rest upon all, and His directing Spirit be given, that all things may be done with effect, and in well pleasing—For, "Except the Lord keep the City the watchman waketh but in vain."

## REPORT OF THE REV. P. KER.

TRAVELLING AGENT OF THE SOCIETY.

*To the Secretaries of the Upper Canada Religious Tract and Book Society.*

GENTLEMEN,—As the year is drawing to a close, you doubtless will expect the Agent of your Society, to give an account of the labours in the past; being appointed to our responsible position, and entering upon duty, the 1st of June last, with the single direction, "begin at Stratford."

First, may we be permitted to bear our humble testimony to the goodness of Almighty God, whose we are, and whom we delight to serve, and whose watchful Providence extends to individuals, Societies, and to the Universe at large; by giving us and the Society we represent, favor with the public generally, and especially with ministers of the Gospel, and Christian Churches, with whom we more frequently associated. Pulpits were invariably offered to us on the Sabbath, without solicitations, and we were cordially invited to share the hospitality of Christian households.

No agent having been in the field for ten months previous to

to our entering it, had an embarrassing tendency. Societies being less vigorous on that account.

We succeeded, however, in establishing *New Branches* at *Listowell, Seaforth, Bayfield, Chatsworth, Pelham, Wainfleet, Wardsville,* and *Newbury*; and revived as *many more*, with good effect, which have been for some years defunct.

The religious voice of the country, is decidedly in favour of the Society we represent. It is to be regretted, however, that so many parts of the country are not visited, and cannot be while the field continues so extensive.

The Canadian mind seems most anxious, as the claims and objects of the society are presented, to become identified with the work of spreading a healthy and useful literature through every part of the Dominion.

It is pleasurable and profitable to provide for those who have not the means of furnishing reading matter for themselves, obeying the injunction of the Great Master, "it is more blessed to give than to receive."

We might have furnished the names of gentlemen of position and influence very frequently, and to whom we are laid under lasting obligations, for the timely assistance they rendered us, under circumstances of trial and embarrassment.

But it may be sufficient here to say, we frequently think of them, and sincerely thank them for past favours.

Having succeeded to some extent thus far, we are encouraged to hope for the future, and as we are about to proceed to parts where we are but little known, our anxiety naturally increases.

Allow me to suggest the insertion, in the Annual Report of the "Summary" of the last report of the Parent Society; that our contributors and well-wishers may obtain enlarged views of the work of our *hands* and *hearts*, and of the *glorious results* which have followed, and which we hope will continue to *follow devout efforts*.

We now proceed to give some statements, in reference to the Branches we visited:—

MITCHELL—In arriving here we called on the resident ministers. Occupied three pulpits on the Sabbath. Meeting on Monday evening was successful, new life being infused.

LISTOWELL AND SEAFORTH—Being new Branches, indicate vigour and prosperity.

CLINTON—Has been in the habit of having the Agent's labours on the Sabbath, but not so this year, therefore less interest was manifested. Subscriptions not so large as formerly—has ability and will act her part.

**BAYFIELD**—A small branch, which is contiguous to *French and German Settlements*—needs the sympathy and support of *Christian Churches*.

**GODERICH**—Is an important point, and should have an efficient branch, but has not at present. Gave a donation and subsequently invited the Agent to revisit them, and establish an auxiliary, which is not yet effected.

**DUNGANNON**—Could not be visited this year.

**LUCKNOW**—Was organized, and we believe fruit will be reaped in the future.

**KINCAIDINE**—Meeting small but successful—churches well represented. All had a mind to work.

**WALKERTON**—This being the County Town of Bruce, will, doubtless, be a place of note. Tract cause is not new. Rev. Mr. Moffatt's congregation and others contributed liberally.

**PAISLEY**—Has had a Branch for some time—has worked well—zeal unabated.

**PORT ELGIN**—Meeting small, but funds in advance. Promises well. Staff enlarged.

**SOUTHAMPTON**—This Branch sets an example to others. Here Clergymen and Laymen worked unanimously. Fine moral influence the result.

**INVERMAY**—Has done but little, but contributed her share in sustaining religious literature.

**TARA**—Has done less than the last mentioned Branch. These two Branches would work much better if united.

**OWEN SOUND**—Always stood foremost in the North-west, and nobly maintains her mission. Fine field for Tract distribution—exhibits a truly Christian spirit—promises to continue in efficiency.

**CHATSWORTH**—Came next in our way. Here we formed a new Branch. Contributions good. An efficient staff of officers appointed.

**DURHAM**—Is a place of business. Meeting in the Wesleyan Methodist Church thinly attended. Society revived. Funds good.

**MOUNT FOREST**—Not long since a natural and moral waste, now contains several churches, harmoniously working together. Tract cause thought of, and well supported. It is pleasurable to be associated with such Branches.

**ARTHUR**—Has ability to do more than she is doing at present. Zeal and perseverance are particularly required.

FERGUS—Is a fine town. All things in order here. Report in due form, containing encouraging matter. Subscriptions collected before the agents arrival, and paid over to the proper authorities.

ELORA—Not having heard of the appointment of the agent, or when he was likely to make his annual visit, proceeded to collect and forward her funds. We spent the Sabbath here, and took part in three services.

CHIPPEWA—Was never backward in contributing. Less vigorous in distribution, quite an amount of stock on hand. Meeting thinly attended.

DRUMMONDVILLE—On account of the many visitors at the Falls, is an inviting field of labour, and ought to be more thoroughly cultivated. Funds increased more than one hundred per cent.

CLIFTON—Is sustaining the cause we all delight to see promoted; principally, however, the labour and support of a few.

MONTROSE—Is struggling for an existence, has a few well-wishers to the cause. Had we a greater variety of *German Tracts*, they could be *distributed* within the *boundaries* of the *four last mentioned Branches with profit*.

PELHAM, (Fenwick P.O.)—Was visited for the first time by a tract agent. An auxiliary formed, and funds raised to purchase stock. This new Branch promises success.

WAINFLEET—Exhibits a fine religious influence, but takes hold of tract business *sparingly*. Funds rather deficient.

WELLAND PORT—Was visited, but no society formed.

WATERDOWN—Formerly had a Branch, but long since became defunct. Society re-organized, officers will undoubtedly do their duty.

WELLINGTON SQUARE—Meeting in the Town Hall. Society re-organized under encouraging circumstances.

CUMMINSVILLE AND LOWVILLE—Had our attention; but could not succeed in forming Branches at present.

MILTON—A Branch has existed in the past, and was productive of good, but persevering effort is required.

GEORGETOWN—Evinced more sympathy for the cause this season than last. Still room for improvement.

EBIN—Letters failed to reach here in time. No meeting held; must be re-visited.

ACTON—Although in the midst of political discussions, gave attention to the meeting, and supported the cause in her usual way.

ROCKWOOD—Is a very efficient Branch, and takes pleasure in doing her duty.

GUELPH—Was our next destination. And, oh! sad to say, no meeting announced. Officers out of town. Have the promise of a cordial co-operation in the future. This place must not be overlooked. Fully expect her to sustain her character.

BERLIN—Was reached with difficulty; nothing doing here at present. They do not wish to cut connection with the Tract Society, but are not in working order. No financial return.

SHAKESPEARE—Is weak and not very unanimous in her movements; could not establish a Branch. Funds limited.

STRATFORD—Meeting held in the W. M. Church; congregation small; clergy acquitted themselves creditably. Here are to be found some of the most efficient lady-collectors in our work.

ST. MARY'S—Appointment not circulated. Tract Society having been immersed into a village mission, and that not in a flourishing condition. Better to have remained as formerly.

LUCAN, (A new point,)—Coming in contact with a previous engagement, no meeting was held. Promises to co-operate another year.

AILSA CRAIG—Should have a Branch; could not succeed for the present, but expect to do so hereafter.

SARNIA—Is one of our strong points at the West. Gentlemen of position and influence being connected with the cause. Unfortunately politics ran too high for tract interest to be appreciated. After Sabbath labour, we proceeded on our way, and returned to this point again, (greatly increasing our expenses;) when they acquitted themselves creditably, as the financial return will show.

STRATHEBY—Meeting good; churches all represented; organized a Branch, with financial success. New ground.

MUNCEY INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL—Was next visited, and is an *important institution to the native children.*

ST. THOMAS—Moves on with majesty and success, and gave us one of our most successful meetings; collection and subscriptions excellent. The Young Men's Christian Association nobly stepped forward to our aid, rendering valuable assistance to the cause.

PORT STANLEY—Meeting a failure. No organization here, consequently not understood. This ground should be cultivated in order to meet the wants of the seamen.

FINGAL—Meeting also a failure, coming in contact with other religious services.

ALYMER—Is small, but gives signs of vitality and life.

**PORT BURWELL**—Meeting in Baptist Church. Violent rain storm prevented attendance.

**VIENNA**—Was formerly in a more flourishing condition than at present. Feeble efforts in the past, inspire but limited hopes for the future.

**TILSONBURG**—Is looking upward—prospect somewhat encouraging.

**INGERSOLL**—Visited the second time on account of failure in announcement. An efficient staff of officers appointed, and when brought into proper working order, must wield an influence for good.

**BEACHVILLE**—Meeting in Baptist Church. Society re-organized with prospects of success. Funds in a healthy state.

**MOUNT BRIDGES**—Solicited our influence in favour of a grant, which was generously acceded to by the Central Committee. Melbourne and two other villages also received assistance.

**CHATHAM**—Although increasing in wealth, intelligence and prosperity, has not an efficient organization. There is great room here for Tract distribution among the *colored population*. The means are ample, and we hope the distributors will be forthcoming. Meeting thinly attended.

**WINDSOR**—Is our most distant point in the West, and one of importance, being the terminus of the G. W. R. R. Meeting well attended and profitable. Here the committee decided to circulate the periodicals of the Society, to hold their annual meetings in the month of February, and to control their own funds, but to give a donation annually to the Society.

**SANDWICH**—May be regarded as defunct.

**WARDSVILLE**—Meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Here we succeeded in establishing a new Branch. The public contributed willingly and we expect to hear of beneficial results.

**NEWBURY**—Also a new Branch. The ministerial and professional gentlemen of the place came to our assistance. Officers and collectors duly appointed. This Branch is formed, and begins her work under favorable circumstances.

**PLATTSVILLE**—Not a stranger to Tract distribution, which was being effected by individual effort. When we arrived, funds had been raised. Stock purchased, and officers duly appointed. Financial returns may be expected hereafter.

**AYR**—Has some zealous tract distributors, but no society. Ought to have one—Could easily maintain a working Branch.

**GALT**—Meeting not very largely attended, evening unfavorable, collection good. Young Men's Christian Association took hold



of the work with energy. The meeting authorized the appointment of officers from that association, and they offered to be the medium of communication. The churches pledged their sympathy and support. May the *result* be *glorious*.

GLEN MORRIS—Meeting well attended, weather considered. The Pastor of the church taking a deep interest in the movement. The Branch is in a healthy state.

ST. GEORGE—Is a Branch of some standing and importance, and is ready for work.

WOODSTOCK—Once vigorous and healthy, voted herself to death. This was the most serious voting of which we have any knowledge. The resurrection may be more difficult than the demise.

PRINCETON—Not agreed to form a society at present, may do so hereafter.

BURFORD—Manifests a readiness to co-operate with every benevolent movement.

SCOTLAND—Is prompt, energetic and useful.

WATERFORD—Hesitated in identifying herself with the Tract Society, but ultimately decided in forming, and promises well.

SIMCOE—Has ability to do more than she is doing, and we expect more from her in the future.

PORT DOVER—Is acting well her part in the noble enterprise.

MOUNT PLEASANT, (West)—Meeting small; Ministers present; Funds tolerably good.

PARIS—Has been inactive for some time past. Meeting large. Ministers present and churches well represented. The Y. M. C. Society manifested a praiseworthy sympathy with the cause.

BRANTFORD—Was formerly reported as "having gone wrong." Can say nothing in regard to the past, but have pleasure in saying "all right now," as her acts clearly show.

DUNNVILLE—Meeting did not come up to expectations, having spent the previous Sabbath there. There was but one feeling manifested. A desire to extend the circulation of religious literature. Society revived.

ST. CATHERINES, THORALD, WELLAND, CENTERVILLE, ALLENBURG, PORTS ROBINSON, COLBORNE and DALHOUSIE, were visited, and consultations held with the resident Ministers. Your Agent was frequently urged to *promptness of action* in reviving the different *Branches*:—But found that the "*Seamen's Friend Society*," (of the United States) have employed an Agent in the past; and it appeared to me unwise to have two *rival Societies*, on the same ground, at the same time. Their late Agent, Rev. Mr. McGlashan,

having passed away, *matters* are in an *unsettled state*. Some are in favour of *dissolving* the *connection* with said *Society* and *joining* in with *us*, —to put themselves in *communication* with our *Central Committee*, through their Agent; the Christian Churches *pledging influence* and *support*.

A *Bethel*, at *Lock* No. 18, on the *WELLAND CANAL* is in course of *erection*, and will undoubtedly be *completed*. Funds *principally* obtained from the *seamen*.

The *importance* of furnishing *religious instruction* and *reading matter* to the *seamen* of our *inland waters* is *obvious* to all *reflecting minds*. We cannot do without them, therefore ought to provide for the *culture* of their *higher nature*.

Your Agent strongly recommends to the Central Committee, that *action* be taken in this *matter* at once, and *provision* be made for the *demands* of the *coming season*.

This *Field* may be considered the most *important* of any that we have visited, lying in our own *country*; and we have *ample ability* to *perform* the *work*, *independent* of *Foreign aid*.
