# TO THE MAYOR, ALDERMEN AND CITIZENS OF MONTREAL.

GENTLEMEN,-

In conformity with the By-Laws of the Corporation, I have the honor to submit the following General Report in relation to the works in charge of my department, for the civic year ending the 31st January, 1864, and on the works proposed to be carried out during the present year.

The amount of work done during the past year by the Road Department, has exceeded that done by it in any year since the city was incorporated, besides repairs of streets, sewers, &c., &c. The accompanying Schedules show that a great amount of work has been done in sewerage, in paving of streets, in planking and flagging of footpaths, in laying fire-bricks on footpaths, in building new shafts and branch sewers to receive surface water; in grading and macadamizing streets, and in acquiring property to open, extend, or widen streets.

# GENERAL REPORT.

#### SEWERAGE.

3,208 yards of brick sewers, 2 feet in diameter, and 3,087 yards of 2 feet wooden box sewers have been laid during the past year.

I have in former Reports protested against using square wooden boxes for sewers; they cost very little less than a good brick or tile sewer, and unless they have a good fall, soon become choked up.

The Coteau Baron sewer, 6 feet internal diameter in Papineau Road, and 5 feet 11 inches × 4 feet 4 inches oval for the remainder, has been completed (with the exception of some filling to be done on top of it,) from near Dorchester Street on the Papineau Road to St. Denis Street.

The Road Committee completed the McGill Street sewer (after difficulties and delays caused by the different contractors), from below Notre Dame Street to the junction with Radegonde Street sewer, and charged the cost above the contractors' prices to the contractors. The completion of this portion of the sewer (which is to be continued to the city limits by Craig and Bonaventure Streets), has saved the citizens in Craig Street from Victoria Square to Chenneville Street, from flooded cellars after each heavy fall of rain. The extension of this sewer to the city limits will effectually drain the low lands situated between St. Joseph and St. Antoine Streets. This sewer forms part of the scheme of sewerage proposed in 1856; the portion through McGill Street, 6 fect in diameter, being the relieving sewer to the main sewer proposed to discharge into the river below Rousseau Migeon.

Plans, sections and specifications are nearly ready for the drainage of the district lying south of the Lachine Canal, for the extension of the Coteau Baron sewer (through the proposed Ontario St.,) to tap the creek running through the McGill College grounds; for the extension of the McGill Street sewer through Craig and Bona-

venture Streets, to the city limits; for a sewer on Parthenais Street to tap the creeks and discharge them into the river at a point below the foot of that street; and for a sewer from near the Royal Insurance building through Foundling Street and William Street. It is to be hoped that the Road Committee will give the contracts for the above important works to responsible parties, and not to the lowest tenderers, without regard to their knowledge and abilities to perform the works. On the McGill Street sewer much unnecessary trouble and some expense was caused to the Department by the first contractor having too low a price for his work, which was taken from him and given to other contractors at an advanced price; the work had to be taken from the second contractor and finished by the Department. The portion of the work done by the Department, although costing more, was much better done than the portion which the contractors did. The contractor's price for the work of the Coteau Baron Sewer up to St. Constant Street, was below my estimate, and he has lost considerably by his contract.

The By-Law No. 280, passed on the 28th of May 1862, regulating the construction, &c., of sewers, has worked well as far as the construction of new sewers goes, but I would suggest that it be amended where it allows a proprietor to build his private sewer to within 3 feet of the main sewer. Instead of this, I would propose that the Road Department lay down all private or service sewers from the mains to inside of the buildings, and that a trap be put on the service sewer near to and inside of the wall. By doing so, any stoppage that may occur, from solid matters being allowed to pass into the service pipe, would be inside of the building, and the proprietor would be obliged to remove the cause of stoppage, and could do so without opening the street, which at present has too frequently to be done. All service sewers should be of vitrified clay pipe. Parties should be licensed by the Road Department to make the service sewers at a fixed price per lineal foot or yard, and should be bound to uphold their work for a number of years.

I have again to call the attention of the Council to the dangerous state of the sewer in Papineau Square and Monarque Street, and to suggest, as I did last year, the propriety of re-building this sewer from the River to the centre of Craig Street, on a grade to suit the scheme of drainage of 1856, and to repair the side walls, and turn an arch over them from Craig Street to the inlet of the creek near Dorchester Street.

The Papineau Road sewer will soon receive the water from the creek passing through the McGill College grounds, and, unless the Parthenais Street sewer is gone on with this season, will not have sectional area enough to carry the water off in Spring, or after heavy falls of rain; the covering of it from St. Mary Street to the river is in a very dangerous condition, and should be at once removed and have an arch turned over the side walls, in place of the present rotten cedar covering.

#### MACADAMIZING.

The Road Committee has contracted for 1,000 toises of broken Banc-Rouge stones, and for 1,000 toises of broken stones to be quarried from the ground above the Reservoir, belonging to the Corpo-The Committee has also purchased about 1,000 toises of mixed unbroken stones from the Ladics of the Hotel Dieu. The stones contracted for are nearly all delivered, but not all broken. As the contractors have until the 1st of May next to deliver them, I have no doubt that, at the rate they are breaking them, they will be delivered in time. The stones obtained from the Ladies of the Hotel Dieu are still unbroken. I last year protested against using our black and grey limestone for macadamizing purposes, and have again to protest against it. The public complain, and with reason, that our so-called macadamized streets are not as good as the turnpike roads outside the city limits. We could have as good macadamized roads inside the city limits (notwithstanding the far greater amount of traffic there is on our streets,) as there are outside of them, if we used nothing but hard stones, properly broken, and see that the surface water is carried off as rapidly as possible. Many of our streets have had simply a course of from 1 to 2 feet thick of rubbish (old brick, stones and mortar,) from old buildings dumped and broken upon them, and they pass as macadamized streets. Proprietors, especially in new streets, urge the Road Committee to have something done to those streets to render them pass-They say, "give us only some rubbish, and we will be satisfied." The Committee, not having funds enough to properly macadamize the streets, put down the rubbish in them, but do not macadamize them; in many streets a foot or more of this rubbish could, with advantage, be taken off, and eight or ten inches of good broken stone laid on instead.

The city is extending so rapidly, that the Road Department, whose works necessarily increase more rapidly in proportion to the growth of the city than those of any other department, should be allowed more funds in proportion to the extension, to meet its wants, than it has hitherto been allowed. I last year drew the attention of the Council to the desirability of having yards in which to break stones for macadamizing the streets. The Road Committee objected to the cost, as they could find no suitable yards at what they considered a reasonable rent.

#### STONE BLOCK PAVING.

The Schedule of Works shows the amount of stone block paving laid during the past year. The work done is superior to that of previous years, but there is plenty of room for improvement. The stones used were limestones from Bord a Plouffe, laid on a bed of broken stones, covered with a coat of sand, the joints of the blocks being filled in with river sand, swept into them with a broom. During last winter, Syenite was found on the west side of the mountain. This stone is much superior to the Bord a Plouffe, and should be used for causewaying in preference to it. I would recommend that in any street on which it may be decided to lay it, that after the road bed has been properly formed, a coat of broken stones six inches thick be laid upon it, and that coal tar and pitch be run hot into the interstices, that a coat of sand 3 inches deep be laid on this, and on the top of the sand the blocks of syenite of from 8 to 14 inches long, 3 to 4 inches thick, and 8 or 9 inches deep be laid, the joints to be grouted, after which the blocks should be well rammed and again grouted. As to the superiority of syenitic granite paving over any other, I would call the attention of the Council to the following extract, from a letter I lately received from Mr. William Sim, who has for over 20 years paved the streets of Glasgow, Scotland; he says:--" Take for instance Glasgow, in which granite paving has now been used extensively during the last 22 years the first paved streets which have undergone great tear and wear, have required no repair, and are to be seen at the present day in as good order as when first laid down; this is in a great measure owing to the superior quality of the granite employed, more particularly to its uniform character in point of wear, same not being appreciable, the stones being as even and flat on the surface as when they left the quarries; the size in use are somewhat similar to those used in London."

I have specimens of syenite from the back of the mountain in my office, which I believe are equal for paving purposes to those Mr. Sim used in Glasgow; we, however, must take into account the opening up of streets, for repairs to gas or water pipes and sewers, which, on account of the climate and other causes needless to specify, is much more frequent here than there, and that we have no stone-cutters used to dressing this description of stone; it is possible that we may find blocks of syenite suitable for flagging footpaths, should we not, I would recommend that either flagstones from the Potsdam quarries, or English fire brick be used for footpaths instead of Pine cull deals. I am of opinion, that the sooner we abandon the use of Pine cull deals the better; the Potsdam flags which we have tried stand the climate very well, they do not scale off, as it was predicted they would, and they cost about 30 per cent. less than the imported Scotch flags.

I have again to recommend that chain stones and paved water courses should be laid on all streets where not already done; in streets in the suburbs where the footpaths are from 6 to 12 feet wide, chain courses with paved channels might be laid down with 3, 4 or 6 feet of Potsdam flags or fire brick placed in the centre of the sidewalk, with gravel or engine ashes on each side, the cost would be a little more at first, than for footpaths of Pine cull deals, but there would be a saving in a very few years; the chain courses should be of syenite.

# OPENING OF NEW STREETS, WIDENING AND EXTENSION OF STREETS.

The Streets ordered to be opened, extended or widened during the ensuing season, are: Craig Street to be extended from St. Antoine to St. Bonaventure Street, the necessary land for this improvement has been purchased; Ontario Street to be extended from St. Dominique Street to Bleury Street, and from Aylmer Street to Union Avenue; for this improvement, some of the properties have been acquired, and the Road Committee is negociating for the balance; Notre Dame Street (if the amendment to Act of incorporation passes the Legislature) to be widened in 4 years to 44 feet,

French measure throughout; St. Catherine Street, St. Lawrence Ward, to be widened on S. E. side from St. George Street to St. Laurent Street; most of the properties required have been purchased, and the Road Committee is endeavouring to arrange amicably with the proprietors, whose lands have not been purchased; St. Catherine Street, St. Mary's Ward, to be extended to Fullum Street; the greater portion of the land required for this improvement has been ceded gratuitously to the corporation. A new Street (Albert Street) to be opened from Chaboillez Square to Mountain Street, to give more facilities to the Grand Trunk Railway Company at the Bonaventure Street Depot; the plans for this are ready. Dorchester Street (widening of below the St. Lawrence Market), the plans and estimates for this improvement will be made as soon as the work previously ordered to be done in the department is sufficiently advanced to allow it. To carry out the agreement entered into between the Corporation and the Harbour Commissioners to form a Terrace, build revetment walls, &c., near the Military Hospital; the Road Department has acquired all the grounds necessary (with the exception of that occupied by the Military Hospital, which cannot be acquired at present) for the improvement, as the Council has been at considerable expense in acquiring nearly the whole of the lands requisite; the Harbour Commissioners should be asked to carry out their part of the agreement so far as it can be done, till the grounds of the Military Hospital are acquired by the Corporation. There are several other Streets proposed to be opened, extended and widened, but I think it unnecessary to allude to them at present, or until the amendments to the Act of Incorporation pass Parliament.

#### MAP OF THE CITY.

On the 17th June, 1863, the Council adopted a report of the Road Committee, recommending that a Map of the City on certain conditions should be made; an agreement in accordance with the resolution of the Council was entered into with the parties mentioned in the report, and the work is being proceeded with; this agreement was concluded before the amendments proposed to the Act of Incorporation were drafted. If the amendments to the Act pass the Legislature, much work will require to be done, which was not contemplated

when the agreement for the making of the map was made. This extra work, in my opinion, should be done by the department, and if it is found necessary, extra assistants should be allowed.

#### CLEANING STREETS.

I believe that if a contract for keeping the streets clean for 3 or 5 years was given to responsible parties at a fair price, we should have cleaner streets than we have had hitherto, but so long as works are given to the lowest tenderer, without regard to qualifications, I am of opinion that the department should do the work, and allow more foremen to look after it; to do the cleaning and sweeping properly, more money should be allowed, whether the work is done by the Department or by contractors.

The Special Police have been active during the past year, in looking after the removal of ice and snow from the footpaths, and in looking after builders and others, encumbering the Streets; many parties have been fined in the Recorder's Court for infringing the By-Laws relating to the same, but the By-Law relative to the removal of ice and snow is defective, and should be amended so as to compel occupiers to cut the ice and snow on the water courses and footpaths to such depths as they may be ordered to do. doubt the New Committee on Roads and Improvements will report to As no action the Council on it, as they are aware of its defects. has been taken by the Council in regard to what I suggested last year on the alteration of By-Law No. 14, defining the duties of the City Surveyor, I beg to repeat what I then suggested, and respectfully request the Council to take some action in the matter. "The Fire Inspector is bound to see that any new building which is put up, is built to his satisfaction, but the City Surveyor is held responsible for any accident which may occur from the building having been improperly constructed; I think it but reasonable to ask that the Fire Inspector, over whom I have no control, be held responsible for work done under his supervision, and that it should be his duty to see that buildings dangerous to the public are pulled down or made secure. By the By-Law No. 14, the City Surveyor is bound to take charge of all real Estate belonging to the Corporation, and to report thereon annually. It is known to many of the members of the Council, that at present, and for a long time previous to my appointment as City Surveyor, the Fire Inspector has had charge of all buildings belonging to the Corporation, (Markets, City Hall, &c., &c.,) and that the duty of attending to the real Estate of the Corporation has been done by the Fire Inspector."

#### PUBLIC PARKS.

The necessity of our rapidly growing City having one or more Public Parks, has been frequently urged in Council and through the Press, the questions to be considered are admitted to be simply, the location of one or more Parks, and the funds at the disposal of the Corporation for such a purpose. I may mention some of the places proposed, one is the ground South West of the Hotel Dieu, one the Priests' farm, another is the top of our mountain. Three years ago, the Road Committee received a proposition from Mr. John Redpath, to cede a portion of his property on the mountain for a Public Park, that Committee examined the ground to be conceded; Mr. Redpath's terms were not considered advantageous; since then nothing has been done towards acquiring his property, or any other for the above purpose. The time is fast approaching when something more must be done towards throwing open to the public, places where they can enjoy fresh air; by passing through a small portion of Mr. II. B. Smith's and through Mr. Redpath's property an easy access can be had to the top of the mountain; Major Stevenson proved that, by taking his field battery up on the 10th of November, 1862, and again on the 10th of March, 1863, through Messrs. Redpath's and Smith's property, and firing salutes from the cliffs on Mr. Redpath's; any one who has been on the top of the mountain, will admit that the view from some points on it is magnificent, and that a Park could be laid out on it equal, if not superior to any in North America.

#### PUBLIC SQUARES.

The only Square requiring any remark is Viger; in that Square a conservatory was erected last year; parties in the neighborhood subscribed \$1,200 towards the cost of it; the Corporation paid the balance.

### PUBLIC URINALS.

In previous reports I have brought the necessity of Public Urinals before the Council, and have lately shewn the Road Committee designs for them; the expense would not be great; in the vicinity of the markets and wharves, their want is complained of.

#### HORSE RAILWAY.

The Montreal City Passenger Railway Co., are by their charter bound to construct, before the first of June next, lines in St. Catherine, St. Denis, St. Laurent, Bleury, Mountain, McGill and Wellington Streets. I would recommend the Council to raise the grades of St. Denis Street at the swamp, and St. Catherine Street below St. George Street, before the track is laid; I would also request them to consider the propriety of the Railway Company's laying their track in Guy and St. Charles Borrommée Streets, instead of Mountain and St. Laurent Streets.

## STREET NAMES AND NUMBERS.

A contract was entered into for the placing of boards with the names of Streets at the corners of the same, and for the numbering of houses and lots in the City. The contractor failing to do the work properly was protested, and the numbering of the Streets was taken from him and given to another party. The names of the Streets have nearly all been put up, and the contractor for the numbers of lots, &c., will, I have no doubt, complete his work in time.

# SCHEDULE OF WORKS

EXECUTED IN THE

## VARIOUS STREETS OF THE CITY OF MONTREAL,

During the Year ending 31st January, 1864.

#### EAST WARD.

Barrack Street .- Has been slightly repaired.

Bonsecours Street.—Frequently cleaned; repaired at intervals with broken stone; footpaths repaired, and 75 lineal feet of new footpath laid down.

Champ de Murs Street.—Cleaned several times; water-course formed; footpaths repaired, and 590 lineal feet of new footpath laid. The brick sewer has been cleaned and repaired, from the Donegana Hotel to J. G. Sims' lumber-yard, and one shaft re-built.

Commissioners Street.—Frequently cleaned; repaired with broken stones between Victor Street and Jacques Cartier Square; footpaths repaired, and 943 lineal feet of new footpaths laid. The brick sewer has been opened, cleaned and repaired between Victor and Market Streets.

Court House Square —A number of trees have been planted in place of those dead or broken.

Craig Street.—Has been cleaned several times; water-courses formed; footpaths repaired, and the roadway lightly repaired with broken stone.

Dalhousie Square.—Has been cleaned twice a-week, and footpaths repaired.

Friponne Street.—Cleaned; water-course formed; roadway repaired, and a large hole filled in near Commissioners Street.

Gosford Street.—Several times cleaned; roadway lightly repaired with broken stone; water-courses formed and the footpaths repaired.

Jacques Cartier Square.—Frequently cleaned; metalling renewed on north-cast side, between Notre Dame and St. Paul Streets; footpaths repaired, and 73 lineal feet of new footpath laid. Trees have been planted in place of some which were dead and broken.

Market Street.—Cleaned several times; footpaths repaired and roadway repaired with stone.

Notre Dame Street.—Cleaned twice a-week; paved, and wooden footpaths repaired, and 483 lineal feet of footpath have been laid down

St. Amable Street.—Cleaned several times.

St. Claude Street.—Cleaned several times, and footpaths repaired.

St. Francis Street.—Formed and graded; water-courses cleaned and formed.

St. Gabriel Street.—Cleaned twice a-week; brick footpaths repaired, and cobble paving of the roadway repaired between Notre Dame Street and Fortification Lane.

St. Louis Street.—Several times cleaned; footpaths repaired; two brick shafts cleaned, one repaired, and a stone one taken down and re-built; 159 lineal feet of new footpath laid.

St. Paul Street.—Has been cleaned twice a-week; stone and brick footpaths repaired, and some parts of the latter renewed.

St. Therese Street.—Cleaned several times; roadway lightly repaired, and footpaths repaired.

St. Vincent Street.—Several times cleaned; roadway repaired with macadam, and footpaths repaired.

Vaudreuil (late Little St. Denis) Street.—Several times cleaned; roadway lightly repaired, and footpaths repaired.

Victor Street.—Roadway cleaned and repaired with stone; foot-paths repaired, and one new shaft built.

#### CENTRE WARD.

Capital Street.—Several times cleaned, and roadway paved with cobble stone, from St. Sulpice Street to St. Francois Xavier Street.

Commissioners Street.—Cleaned several times; re-metalled from St. Gabriel to St. Francois Xavier Street, with a heavy coat of stone from the Jail; footpaths repaired; two shafts repaired, and the roadway raised opposite the Royal Insurance Buildings.

Craig Street.—Several times cleaned; roadway lightly repaired, and one shaft cleaned and repaired; footpaths repaired.

Custom House Square.—Cleaned twice a-week; one shaft cleaned and repaired.

Fortification Lane.—The roadway has been cleaned, and repaired with broken stone from St. Gabriel to St. Urbain Streets.

Little St. James Street.—Cleaned twice a-week, and paved footpaths repaired.

Notre Dame Street.—Cleaned twice a-week; both paved and wooden footpaths repaired, and a quantity of new brick footpaths laid.

Place d'Armes.—Cleaned twice a-week; new wooden curb laid on the north-east and south-east sides, and the walks repaired in the Garden.

St. Jean Baptiste Street.—Several times cleaned; roadway lightly repaired, and the footpaths repaired between Notre Dame Street and St. Paul Street.

St. Lambert Street.—Cleaned twice a-week; water-courses repaired and footpaths repaired.

St. Paul Street.—Cleaned twice a-week; paved footpaths repaired; new flag footpath, 10 feet wide, laid in front of Nun's Buildings (Victoria Barracks); the roadway formed and re-paved, and a shaft removed to suit the increased width of the street.

St. Sulpice (late Little St. Joseph) Street.—Cleaned several times; chain stone set back and a new brick footpath laid along the south-west side from Notre Dame Street to Ascher's, and the roadway re-formed to suit the increased width; new sandstone flag footpath laid on south-west side from St. Paul Street to Darling's, and also on north-east side along end of Nun's Buildings.

#### WEST WARD.

Calliere Street.—Cleaned and macadamized; old sidewalks repaired; 51 lineal feet of new footpath made.

Commissioners Street.—Cleaned frequently; cobble paving from St. Peter Street to McGill Street repaired; holes filled up with metalling; the low place between St. Nicholas Street and the market filled up with gravel; 2 grates repaired; old sidewalks repaired and 36 lineal feet of new footpath laid down.

Common Street.—Cleaned frequently; macadamized; watercourse paved from Port Street to Youville Street; 48 lineal feet of new sidewalk, and 48 lineal feet of crossing made.

Craig Street.—Cleaned frequently; macadamized; the sewer from Victoria Square to St. Charles Borromee Street, cleaned; 5 new man-holes built.

Dollard Street .- Cleaned frequently.

Fortification Lane.—Cleaned; holes filled with broken stone; old sidewalks repaired between St. Peter Street and Victoria Square; 2 new brick shafts built; 1 old one cleaned and repaired.

Foundling Street.—Cleaned; holes filled with gravel; 74 lineal feet of crossing constructed.

Great St. James Street.—Cleaned twice a-weck; sidewalks repaired with old planks; 73 lineal feet of new brick sidewalks laid near St. Peter Street.

Hospital Street .- Cleaned.

LeMoyne Street.—Cleaned; repaired with broken stone; watercourses between St. Peter Street and McGill Street paved; 4 new brick shafts and branches built.

McGill Street.—Graded from St. Ann's Market to Common St.; macadamized from College Street to Common Street; holes filled with broken stone; 3 shafts cleaned and repaired; Tunnel completed from near Recollet Street to Craig Street; man-holes built 150 feet apart; old sidewalks repaired; 720 lineal feet of new footpath, and 78 lineal feet of crossing put down.

Notre Dame Street.—Cleaned twice a-week; plank sidewalk near Dollard Street repaired; 2 new brick shafts and branches built.

Port Street .- Cleaned; sidewalks repaired.

Recollet Street .- Cleaned.

St. Alexis Street.—Cleaned; flag sidewalk near St. Sacrament Street re-laid.

St. Eloi Street .- Cleaned.

St. François Xavier Street.—Cleaned twice a-week; sidewalks repaired.

St. Helen Street. - Cleaned; holes filled up with broken stone.

St. John Street.—Lowered to grade; sidewalks repaired between Notre Dame and Hospital Streets; 180 lineal feet of double crossing constructed.

St. Paul Street.—Cleaned twice a-week; a new brick drain constructed from Mr. Lomer's to the old drain.

St. Peter Street.—Drain examined; the roadway from Notre Dame St. to St. Paul Street paved with block stones; on the east side, between LeMoyne St. and Notre Dame Street, and on the west side from Notre Dame Street to Recollet Street, chain stones taken up, dressed, and re-set, new chain stones put in where required; portions of the sidewalks paved with fire-brick; several gateways paved with block stones; a new brick drain (2 feet in diameter) put in from Notre Dame Street to the Mechanics' Institute, and gravel laid on roadway; from Mechanics' Institute to Craig Street, all ruts filled in with broken stone; 1 brick shaft built; one repaired and a new grate put on; 108 lineal feet of sidewalk constructed.

St. Nicholas Street .- Cleaned.

St. Sacrament Street .- Cleaned twice a-week.

Victoria Square.—West side cleaned; macadamized; water-course, from St. Bonaventure building to Craig Street, paved; chain stone re-laid; gateway at St. Bonaventure building paved with block stones; 90 lineal feet of sidewalk; 101.88 square yards of Scotch flagging, and 186 lineal feet of crossing constructed.

Youville Street .-- 400 lineal feet of sidewalk constructed.

#### ST. ANN'S WARD.

Ann Street.—Beyond Wellington Street graded, and the street generally repaired with broken stones.

Barré Street.—Graded and generally repaired; a large quantity of stone rubbish broken and spread on it; a new brick sewer put in, extending from a short distance East of McCord Street to Versailles Street; 4 new shafts built.

Basin Street.—The creek from Seigneurs Street across the common was cleaned.

Bellevue Row.—240 lineal feet of sidewalk, and 30 lineal feet of double crossing laid down.

Colborne Street.—The ruts filled in; from Common Street to St. Joseph Street metalling laid on; the footpaths in front of the new houses, raised with scrapings from other streets; 1 shaft cleaned and repaired; the old crossings raised; 240 lineal feet of sidewalk constructed.
