KILLED IN ACTION

CLAUD NORIE-MILLER—Drowned on May 4, 1917, while en route to Egypt on a transport which was sunk in the Mediterranean Sea. C. R. SLOAN (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Died at Abbeccourt, May 13, 1917, a prisoner in the hands of the Germans. ROBERT S. BENNIE (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Reported missing early in July, 1917; Reported, August 20, 1917, killed in action. FRANK W. CURTIS (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Killed in action August 14, 1917. FRANK J. FOSTER (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Killed in action August 23, 1917. WILL J. BEATTIE (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Reported October 3rd, as killed in London during an air raid.

MISSING

LORNE SNYDER (Lieut., Hampshire Regt.)—Reported missing May 8, 1917. NEIL J. TAYLOR (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Reported missing September 24, 1917.

WOUNDED

HERBERT M. GARDINER (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Very seriously injured in fall, April, 1917. R. A. McLAREN (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Burned and otherwise injured when machine fell, April, 1917. ROSS LYON (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Broke wrist and ankle when machine fell, May, 1917. M. A. MOSSMAN (Lieut. Berkshire Regt.)—Gunshot wound, left hand, slight, May 5, 1917. G. A. CRUSE (Lieut. Manchester Regt.)—Severely wounded, both legs, by a bomb, May 14, 1917. H. R. BANKS (Lieut. 123rd Bn., C.E.F.)—Gunshot wound, right arm, slight, May 28, 1917. W. I. NURSE—Badly wounded, June, 1917. H. M. BLAKE (Lieut. Dublin Fusiliers)—Reported July 26 as seriously gunshot, left side. O. M. JOHNS (Fl. Lieut. R.F.C.)—Reported July 30 as accidentally injured while flying in England. W. W. COTTON (Lieut.)—Reported July 9, 1917, as wounded. E. H. G. WORDEN (Lieut. Berkshire Regt.)—Seriously wounded about middle of July. C. B. MACQUEEN—Wounded August 8, 1917, remaining on duty. GEORGE E. HOWARD (Lieut. R.N.A.S.)—Wounded in leg, September 3, 1917. M. A. D. DAVIS—Wounded September 5; leg amputated below knee. HAROLD T. FICE (Lieut. 10th Bn., K.R.R.)—Severely wounded, left leg, September 22, 1917. E. H. BURR (Lieut.)—Severely wounded August, 1917. HERBERT W. M. CUMMINGS (Lieut. R.N.A.S.)—Injured October 13, 1917. E. V. DEVERALL—slightly wounded October, 1917. R. H. KING—Severely wounded October, 1917.

The following statistics will indicate the scope of the Company's activities. Of the men at present on our strength 25 are about to leave for England as candidates for Imperial Commissions, 12 are serving temporarily as Musketry Instructors in the School of Musketry and 59 are taking a one month's course at the School of Musketry. Five will leave on November 19th for research work in the Admiralty and 16 will leave in the near future to take commissions in the R.N.A.S. The Company will in future furnish reinforcements to the P.P.C.L.L., N.C.O.'s to the C.E.F. and candidates for Imperial Commissions.
