CHIEF PETTY OFFICER HUGH HENDRY, H.M.S. "Margaret." Born in Aberdeen, Scot-land, aged 42 years; married, leaving widow, 45 Furniss Ave., Toronto, Was killed in Halifax disaster, December 6th, 1917. His little girl lost her life at the same time.

PRIVATE JAMES M. RANKINE, "F" Company, 4th Reserve Battalion; nephew of Mr. and Mrs. William Jack, 159 Munro St., Toronto. Born in Scotland; aged 21 years; single. Wounded in April, 1917, at Vimy Ridge. Killed instantly from bursting shell, January 27th, 1918, while with the Engineers doing some repair work.

LIEUTENANT JOHN A. GIBSON, 116th Battalion, Canadian Infantry; son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles M. Gibson, 235 Dundas St., Woodstock, Ontario; aged 28 years. Died from gun-shot wounds, April 3rd, 1918, at clearing station behind the lines in France.
