#### AGRICULTURAL.

Envertion forms and perfects the mind. It commences with the first dawn of intellectual light, and is not completed till the senses are paralysed by age or destroyed by death. The early instructions of parents, the influence of associates, the accomplishment of labor, and the observations and experiences of daily life, all help form the individual character and educate the man. A small part of the sum total of education is derived from books; it is received from all sources where the senses communicate.

The early education of children is under the direction of their parents, who are naturally their teachers. As is the parent, so to some extent will be the child. He forms the same habits, adopts the same ways of thinking, has the same kind of ideas and the same opinions. If the parents are unlearned and stupid, thinking little and reasoning less, there is but little prospect of the child being otherwise. Early teachers and associates exert a powerful influence, and according to the effects of such influence will be the child's future destiny. In this sense "the boy is father of the man,"

"A man is known by the Company he keeps," and equally as well by the paper he takes, or the book he buys. We do not expect to find an intelligent family where there are no papers or books, neither do we expect that farmer to keep up with the times, who does not read his agricultural journal. The various agricultural books and papers now published, have a wide spread influence, and may be considered as great and efficient helps in accurring an education, and as such, are not to be neglected.

Number of Plants Eaten by dispersive Animals.—It has been calculated that the Cow eats 276 plants, and rejects 218; Good eats 449, and rejects 126; Sheep cuts 387, and rejects 141; Home eats 262, and rejects 212; Hog 71, and rejects 271.

With the stouth Ewes years —The period of pregnancy in the sleep is five months. For flocks which are kept chiefly for word, it is generally preferred to have the lambs dropped about the time the cross starts, so as to afford sheep a "good bite." The advantage of this is, that grass causes the ewes to give a supply of milk for the lambs, (which Merino sheep will not have without grass, unless great attention is paid to their feeding,) and the lambs are reased with more certainty and less trouble. Where lambs are designed for the butcher, it is best to have them dropped as early as Morch; and by feeding the ewes with good hay and plenty of societent food, as carrets, turnips, &c., the lambs will grow rapidly.

Bones as Manuar.—The use of bones as manure was commended in England, about 1776. It was then common to apply from 60 to 70 and even 100 bushels to the acre, they being ever-sely broken by hammers. Experience has proved, however, that so large a quantity, does not produce effects in proportion and 10 to 12 bushels are now thought to be sufficient in more

cases. The annual value of bones used in England for manure, is estimated at £880,000 or \$4,400,000.

THE PRESERVATION OF MANURE.—I am fully of the opinion that Manure ought to be well rotted, to be applied to the greatest advantage ou sandy soils. For that purpose, therefore, the Manure of the farm should be secured, either under sheds for the purpose, or in yards so plauned as to prevent loss by drenehing rains, or leaching off, and made one year to be applied the next. The heaps should be covered with dirt or plaster of Paris, in order to prevent the escape of ammonia.

PLOWING SANDY SOILS.—So far as my experience goes, I have found six inches the best depth to plow sandy soils and loams. I am aware it is very fashionable to say "plow deep," and I think this is said too much, without any discrimination. In clay soils, there is little fear of going too deep, but there seems to me no reason in plowing a soil to a great depth, that is already too porous. Even sandy loans are not benefitted by too deep plowing, and as to subsoiling any light soil, except, perhaps, for the purpose of raising root crops, I think it ruinous."

SEED POTATOES.—In communications in the November and January numbers of the Caltivator, on the subject of seed potatoes—the first by Mr. Murray, of Ohio, the other by Mr. Gold of Connecticut—it is claimed that those of the smallest size are equal, if not superior to large ones for seed. Now this is a subject, as Mr. Murray says, of great importance to the farmer; for if from small and indifferent seed, can be produced fair and large potatoes, as he remarks, it is time it was known.

There is no crop the farmer raises, that requires so much seed, or the seed of which costs so much to an acre, as potatoes, ranging from eight to twenty bushels, the difference being one quarter in large or small seed; or if it takes sixteen bushels, which is about the average of fair sized potatoes, to plant an acre, the same might be done with four very small ones, making a difference of twelve bushels, no small item at present prices, or fifty cents per bushel, which would be six dollars in favour of small

seed in planting one acre.

Not doubting the correctness of either of your correspondent's statements, for I have heard similar ones, from respectable sources, I still am in doubt as to any good resulting from the practice; on the contrary, my experience and observation having led me to a different conclusion. For six years I have planted both large and small seed, sometimes from necessity, but have always carefully noted the difference, which has been uniformly and decidedly in favour of large seed.

I will specify two cases. In the spring of 1849, I planted two acres of potatoes, a portion of which was planted with small seed. Where I planted large seed, I had good potatoes, but where the small seed was planted I had very small, poor potatoes, the whole

being new ground.

The past season I planted the same number of acres, but re-

served a quarter of an acre, which I planted with small seed, from the size of a walnut up to that of a hen's egg. The result was as all former crops had been with me, they were all small and worthless, besides being more affected by the rot than where large seed was used.

The difference in the vines, was perceptible as far as my potato patch could be seen. Those vines where I planted small seed, being not half the length of the others, besides having a slender and sickly appearance from the time they were out of the ground till they were harvested.

Animal Heat.—The necessity of a certain degree of heat in animals, in order that life may be supported, is well known; but the process by which this heat is produced, and the importance of supplying the materials for its production, is not sufficiently known and regarded. The cause of animal heat may be said to be the same as that which is called into play in ordinary combustion, that is a union of carbon and oxygen. All animal food must contain carbon, and after the food has undergone a proper change by the action of the digestive organs, the carbon is carried by the blood to the lungs, where, by the process of respiration, it is united with oxygen, and produces heat.

DESTRUCTION OF THE GREEN FLY IN PLANT HOUSES.—The funigating of plant houses and frames is a troublesome matter, especially to amateurs, and hence the following plan, which we have practised lately, may prove interesting to some.

Provide a strong solution of nitre in water, in which soak some sheets of strong brown paper, and afterwards dry it slowly, and cut into lengths of convenient size, the largest eighteen inches by twelve inches; then get some strong tobacco and strew it thinly over the paper, and with a coarse pepper box, dredge in a good coat of common Cayenne pepper; wrap the whole up loosely like a "cigarette," paste the end over, and when dry it is fit for use.

Two or three of these suspended by a wire under a green-house stage, and lighted at each end, will quickly settle the accounts of the green fly and thrip, and that with comparatively little trouble. Indeed, if a quantity of these "cigarettes" are kept ready made, a few plants may be put into a pit or small room, and be cleaned, at least have their insect pests destroyed in a very short time. By using Cayenne much less tobacco is required, and the two combined is most deadly, for as the "cigarettes," will burn for a considerable time, say an hour or more, it is impossible for insects to live in an atmosphere so thoroughly impregnated with elements of suffocation.

GERMINATION OF CLOVER STED.—It is a well known fact the with old lands which have undergone a continued course of cultivation for a number of years, grass seed, especially clover, is not apt to take well. To remedy this, take a very light one-hors iron toothed harrow with the teeth protruding about three inche below the under side of the frame or bars; let this follow direct after the sower. The frame should be made as light as possible

with the teeth a little closer than the ordinary large harrow. It should be hinged in order to avoid scraping or rubbing out the wheat on the ridges and also to lap in the furrows. There need be no fear of injuring the wheat, but on the contrary it would be of benefit to it.

New Mode of Planting Apple Trees.—A horticulturalist in Bohemia has a beautiful plantation of the best apple trees, which have neither sprung from seeds nor grafting. The plan is, to take shoots from the choicest sorts, insert them in a potato, and plunge both in the ground, having put an inch or two of the shoot above the surface. The potato nourishes the shoot while it pushes out roots, and the shoot gradually springs up and becomes a beautiful tree, bearing the best fruit, without requiring to be grafted.

PRIZE METHOD OF CURING HAMS.—The Hams of Maryland and Virginia have long enjoyed a wide celebrity. At the last exhibition of the Maryland State Agricultural Society, four premiums were awarded for Hams. We are informed by those who had the opportunity of examining them, that they were of first-rate quality. The following is the Recipe by which the Hams were cured that obtained the first premium.

To every 100 lbs. of green Hams, take 8 lbs. of ground Alum Salt; 2 lbs. brown Sugar, (or Molasses equivalent,) 2 ounces Saltpetre; 2 ounces Pearlash, and 4 gallons water. Dissolve well, skimming off the skum arising on the surface. Pack the Hams compactly in a tight vessel or cask, rubbing the fleshy part with fine salt as you put them down, and be sure to stand them on the small end, when you place them in the barrel. In a day or two, pour the above pickle over the meat, taking care to keep it covered with the pickle. In four to six weeks, according to the weight and size of the Hams, (that is to say, the longer period for heavy Hams,) hang them (hock up) to dry, Let them remain for three or four days, and then smoke with green hickory wood, or corn cobs. Smoke, until the rind becomes a dark brown. The meat should be perfectly cool before packing.

WASH FOR SORE EYES IN ANIMALS.—Take of White Vitriol, two Scruples; Sugar of Lead, one Drachm; Water, one Pint. Mix. Wash the eye with this twice a day.

The Horse—Cure for Stiffness and Lameness.—It is stated by a correspondent of the Farmer and Gardener, that a horse made stiff and lame by driving on the roads, may be cured or prevented, by washing it with brine.

A horse, says this writer, that is driven on hard roads is liable to get stiff in his joints. In 1833 I had an animal, after driving three or four days, got quite lame. An old Baltimore teamster told me to wash the mare's legs with a tolerable salt brine, which was done accordingly three times a day for the balance of the journey. The stiffness disappeared in a few days, and I drove the mare 1,400 miles afterwards, and there was no more trouble on that account. What pleased me most was, that the mare had a very poor foot to hold a shoe, when I started. It was very

brittle and hard; and would break out whenever a nail was put in, but it grew together at every shoeing. A blacksmith in New England remarked to me that her foot had a singular appearance; when he cut it, it was soft and tough. I account for it in this way; salt will attract moisture from the atmosphere, which keeps the foot moist all the time; and salt has nearly the same effect that grease has on the foot or a piece of timber. The drippings of salt on the floor, if continued long, cannot be got off; the wood becomes moist and tough.

EXTRAORDINARY Cow.—The Hereford cow which won the first prize at the last Birmingham show, was slaughtered a few months since, and her weight, as given in an English paper, was as follows: Live weight, 2,354 lbs.; Dressed weight, four quarters, 1,695; tallow, 198; hide, 85; total, 1,978 lbs. The heart weighed 7 lbs., and the head 32 lbs.

Shanghae Fowls.—We have received from Dr. E. Wight, of Boston, a pair of these fowls, bred from stock imported by him from Shanghae. They are entirely white, and of good size. Dr. W. informs us that though they are not quite a year old, the cock weighed, a few weeks since, nine pounds.—Cultivator.

HYDRAULIC RAM.—J. J. Conet states in Moore's New Yorker, that he creeted a water-ram which sends water 62 rods, at the rate of 15 gallons per hour, to his house and barns, elevating it 100 feet.

STRENGTH OF A BULL.—The Massachusetts Plowman states that a Bull, three years old, drew a cart loaded, up a hill, with three tons of stone, and fifteen men on the top of it, the whole equal to four tons two hundred and fifty pounds. It was a load on which the working oxen had been tried, which were exhibited at the show of the Essex county Agricultural Society. The bull was hitched to the end of the tongue.

Potsons.—Ve sels of copper often give rise to poisoning. Though the metal undergoes but little change in a dry atmosphere it is rusted if moisture be present, and its surface becomes covered with a green substance—carbonate, or the protoxide of copper, a poisonous compound. It has sometimes happened, that a mother has, for want of knowledge, poisoned her family. Sour-krout, when permitted to stand sometime in a copper vessel, has produced death in a few hours. Cooks sometimes permit pickles to remain in copper vessels, that they may acquire a rich green colour, which they do by absorbing poison. Families have often been thrown into disease by eating such dainties, and may have died, in some instances, without suspecting the cause.

MUSTARD PLASTER.—Mustard Plasters often fail of doing any good, by not being made right. The proper way to make them is as follows: Seald some Corn Meal in a pan, or cook it a little, so that it will not crumble, then spread it of the required size upon a cloth. Grease the surface of the poultice with a little lard, and sprinkie over it powdered Mustard, then apply it directly to the skin. After it has been on for fifteen or twenty minutes, if it does not burn or redden the skin sufficiently, remove it, and sprinkle on more Mustard. If it acts too sharply, lay a thin cloth between the poultice and the skin. You should spread the poultice at least half an inch thick.

CHOLERA MORBUS, DYSENTERY, BILIOUS COLIC, &c.—Take best Turkey Rhubarb Root, powdered; Sal. Eratus, or Bicarbonate of Powash, pulverised; Peppermint plant, pulverised, and ground Cinnaman, of each one teaspoonful. Put upon them half a pint of boiling water, and steep in a covered vessel one hour or more. Strain well, and add sufficient Loaf Sugar to sweeten. When icool, if there is no fever, add two tablespoonful of best French Brandy. Of this preparation give a tablespoonful every hour, funtil the passages are changed in their appearance and consistence.

If there is much pain, griping, or bearing down in the lowels, the following injection may be administered: Take one tea-cupful of mucilage of Slippery Elm, or thin Starch, and add to it one teaspoonful of Loudanum, Mix, and let it be introduced warm,

and as often as the patient complains of pain.

Where there is much vomiting, in addition to the above remedies, apply strong Mustard Plusters to the pit of the stomach. When the pain, and vomiting, and urgent symptoms are somewhat relieved, administer a small table spoonful of Caster Oil, combined with twelve or fifteen drops of Laudanum.

ASIATIC CHOLERA, THE SUN'S RECKIPL.—Take Laudanum:
Tincture of Cayenne Pepper. (treble strength): Tincture of
Rhubarb: Essence of Peppermint, (treble strength): and Spirits
of Camphor: of each one teaspoonful, shake it well before using.
"Dose: From five to thirty drops, repeated every ten or fifteen
minutes until relief is obtained.

The above receipt was first published in the N. Y. Daily Sun, during the Cholera season of 1849, and has probably been the

means of saving more lives, than all other prescriptions of the same nature put together. When given as soon as the person is first attacked, it may be said to be an almost infallible cure.

If the patient has cramps, or is in much pain, he should be rubbed vigorously with Camphor Spirits, and flannel cloths wrung out of hot vinegar and pepper, or hot whiskey and pepper, should be applied warm to the abdomen and extremities, and hot bricks put to the feet. A large bag of Haps simmered in Vinegur may be laid hot over the bowels. The patient may drink warm Mint Tex, Slippery Elm, or Flax Seed Tea, and hot bricks or jugs of water may be placed around the body, to get it in a warm porspiration. By commencing in this manner, and then calling in a Doctor as soon as possible, every one will be safe that may be attacked.

Additional Receipts for Cholera, &c .- Take Spirits of Camphor, Spirits of Turpentine, and Laudanum, of each four teaspoonful; Oil of Peppermint, fifty drops Shake it well before using. Dose: One tenspoonful in some hot Brandy and Sugar every half hour, for four or five times in succession, or until the patient is relieved. Or, Half a pint of best French Erandy; twelve drops Oil of Peppermint; twenty-four drops Landanum. Dose: A tablespoonful every ten minutes, until relieved.

These two last receipts are not considered as effectual as the foregoing, because what will cure one, will not always ours another; and if the former fail, these may be tried. We wish to put every family in possession of that information, which will enable them to act promptly in cases of emergency, and thus save the lives of their households. For often, when a Physician is called in, it is

too late to do any good.

BLACK SALVE-A most excellent Salve for Burns, Scalds, &c. Take of Olive, or Sweet Oil, One Quart; of common Rosin and Beeswax, each one Ounce. Melt these articles together, and raise them almost to boiling heat; then gradually add of pulverized Red Lead, three quarters of a pound, if it be in winter, and a little more if it be in summer. In a short time after the Lead is taken up by the Oil, and the mixture becomes brown, or a shining black, remove it from the fire; and, when nearly cold, add of finely pulverized Camphor, one and a third Drachms.

It should remain on the fire, until it forms a proper consistence for spreading, which may be known by dipping a knife in it from

time to time, and suffering it to cool.

It should be spread thin, on a piece of linen, and renewed

once or twice a day.

For very slight burns, this Salve alone is sufficient to remove all the pain and inflammation. Every family should keep it by them in the house. It is useful for all kinds of bad sores.

To prevent swelling from a Bruise.-Immediately apply a cloth, five or six fold, dipped in cold water, and new dipped when it grows warm. Or, immediately apply Molusses spread on brown paper.

REMEDY FOR WORMS.—Take Spirits of Turpentine and Honey, of each a tablespoonful. Mix them well, and give to a child 3 years old, a teaspoonful of this mixture, for three mornings in succession. Then, on the fourth day, give a dose of Cistor Oil. Wait three days, and if necessary, repeat the above course, which will almost always be successful.

AN EXCELLENT PILE OINTMENT.—Take of pulverized Opium, two Drachms; of clean Tar, one Ounce. Mix them thoroughly, and anoint the Piles with it twice a day. Or,

Take pulverized Nutualis, two Drachms; Hog's Lard, one Ounce. Mix thoroughly, and use as above.

Warts.—Dissolve as much common Washing Socia as the water will take up. Wash the hands or warts with this for a minute or two, and allow them to dry without being wiped. This repeated twice a day, for a few days in succession, will gradually, but certainly destroy the most irritable warts.

Some Throat.—Take twenty drops of spirits of turpentine on loaf sugar every night till cured. Black current jelly hastens the cure.

FRENCH ROLLS.—One ounce of butter, one pound of flour, one gill of home-made yeast, one egg, milk enough to make a dough. Rub the butter through the flour, beat the egg and stir in, then add the yeast, milk, and a little salt. Knead the dough, when it is light mould it out into large biscuits, and bake them on tins.

To keep Preserves.—Apply the white of an egg with a suitable brush to a single thickness of white tissue paper, with which cover over the jars, overlapping the edges an inch or two. No tying is required. The whole will become, when dry, as tight as a drum.

TRAVELLER'S BISCUIT.—Two pounds of flour, three-quarters of a pound of sugar, a quarter of a pound butter, one terspoonful of dissolved salwratus, milk sufficient to form a dough. Cut up the butter in the flour, add the sugar, and put In the salwratus and milk together, so as to form dough. Knead it till it becomes perfectly smooth and light. Roll it in sheets about the eighth of an inch thick, cut the cakes with a cutter or the top of a tumbler. Bake in a moderate oven.

Liquid Giun.—A strong liquid glue, that will keep for years without changing, may be made by placing in a glazed vessel a quart of water and about three pounds of hard glue. This is to be melted over a gentle fire in a glue-pot, and stirred up occasionally. When all the glue is melted, drop in gradually a small quantity of nitric acid, when effervescence will take place. The vessel is then to be taken off the fire and allowed to cool. Liquid glue made in this manner has been kept for more than two years in an uncorked bottle, without any change. It will be useful for many trades, where a strong glue is required, without the trouble of melting.

For Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year forever.

FORMED BY DR. HERSCHELL, AND REVISED BY DR. ADAM CLARKE. This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun aud moon, in their several positious respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail

Observations. -1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till

two next morning.

3. The nearer to midday or noon, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forencon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as

is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
