A., and for the remainder of the year will be a Morning Star. August 17th Venus will be at greatest brilliancy.

♂ MARS.—Until the beginning of February Mars will be a Morning Star. It souths on the 10th 11h. 26m. A. and continues an Evening Star until the end of the year. In January and February Mars will be above the horizon throughout each night.

♃ JUPITER.—On the 1st January Jupiter rises 1h. 40m. after sunset and sets about an hour after sunrise. It will be a Morning Star until about the 24th; after that an Evening Star until the end of July; in conjunction with the Sun on 7th August, and again a Morning Star from 25th August until the end of December. Throughout January and February Jupiter will be above the horizon the whole of each night.

cattle exportation to Europe. An unlimited market thus presents itself, and our Agriculturists may enter upon cattle raising without fear of over-production. To do this successfully and profitably it is necessary to start with good calves. These should be raised from carefully selected cows of good size, and healthy, and crossed by thorough-bred bulls: either Hereford or Devons may be used, but the Short Horn Durhams are preferred before all others, chiefly because their calves reach a great size in a short period. If there is an Agricultural Society in your district the best way is to join it, and obtain the use of its thorough-bred stock; if not you can purchase a young bull from an established breeder at a reasonable price. If your selection is delayed till the spring months you will have to pay a higher price and have a more restricted choice.

When they once begin to fall off, it is up-hill work to attempt to stop it. Barns may be faulty, and the cold is severely felt, the root cellar may be troublesome to get at, and the animals miss an occasional meal, the wells may be frozen and the way to watering places may be so slippery that the cattle cannot reach them without discomfort or positive accident. overcome these and many other difficulties that appear in February, it is a good rule to give extra time and attention to the stock. In feeding grain and meal always mix them into cut hay, moistened, otherwise they do not undergo the second mastication, but pass through the alimentary canal before a large portion of their nutritious material has been absorbed. Cattle should go out every day to water. If kept on the board floors all winter they are apt to become lame, partly from want of exercise, and partly from excessive growth of their hooves, which in spring-time will be found projecting forward like Chinese slippers.

MARCH—This is hot-bed month, and how to make a hot-bed is a secret worth knowing. Select a sheltered spot, protected from animals, lying to the sun, and near a well or water-but. Build on this space a neat pile of manure, of such a size that when the frame is put on top, there will be a clear foot of manure outside all round. Cow manure will not heat at this season. Horse manure will not heat at this season if the animal has not been fed upon oats or some kind of grain. Keeping these facts in view you can select your manure, or make such a mixture, as will give the degree of heat required. Spread over the manure just inside the frame, about four or five inches of very fine soil; this should have been prepared

in the Fall, and kept dry under cover all winter,—otherwise it is likely now to be in a hard frozen mass. The glass sashes are then to be put on and kept close till the hot-bed heats; the steam and heat will start the seeds of weeds, which may be allowed to grow. Air is then given, and, when the heat modifies, weed and rake the surface and sow your spring seeds,—cauliflowers, cabbages, celery, tomatoes, &c., for the kitchen garden; and stocks, verbena, petunias, asters, balsams, and such-like annuals for flower garden ornament. The seeds will bear a good deal of heat before they emerge from the soil, but as soon as the first leaves begin to appear the frame must be aired daily, taking care to avoid cold draughts.

APRIL.—After our long winter, it is cheerful to watch the advent of the early spring flowers and other indications of coming summer. Last year, (1883), the Alder was in bloom on 18th April, frost then out of the ground, and the farmers were busy putting up their fences. Frogs were singing on the 19th and 20th, but there was slight snow of 21st, and frost at night, which quieted the frogs. The yellow crocus bloomed on 22nd, and the white geranium Heather was also in bloom. A few inches of snow again on 25th, with some drifting. Camberwell Beauty (butterflies) were abroad in Halifax City on 27th. At the end of the month the later crocuses came into bloom, but these with Scilla verna and Hepatica were not in full flower till 4th May. Some seasons a good deal of useful spring work can be done in April, but usually we have to wait till May for seed-time, still it is the duty of the farmer to have all his winter's work finished before first of

this month ; to have his tools and horses and men all ready, and his seed and artificial manures (if to be used) at hand. Manure under cover may be carted out on the frozen soil to where it is to be used. In fields seeded down with timothy last fall, it will now be time to sow clover, — a mixture of red and alsyke is best for hay, as the white clover does not grow tall enough for cutting. Where early potatoes are required, the seed should be kept in a warm place so as to start the eyes, and, whenever the ground is dry enough, they may be planted. Peas and broadbeans may be sown at the very beginning of the month. Onions, parsnips and carrots also should be put in as soon as the ground is fit to give them the more delicate seed-bed they require. Beets and manroot wuzzel are usually sown at the end of the month or early in May. All gooseberry and currant bushes should be dressed, dug around &c., apple and pear trees gone over, and generally

depends so much upon the month of May, and the work that can be then accomplished, that every hour should be highly valued. If any ploughing has to be done, let it be done at once; if manure has to be taken out for crops, don't wait for a more convenient season; if the weather is not all that can be desired, proceed nevertheless with your work, vary it to suit the state of the soil and the atmosphere. Men cannot fight against the operations of nature, but they can very often turn them to advantage by consideration and forethought. What has to be sown and planted this month? *Everything* except what has either been already committed to soil, or is too tender to withstand the coldness of the soil, or the probable frosts of June. Such exceptional crops are bush beans, pole beans, corn, tomatoes, cucumbers, squashes; it is only in warm sandy soils that such things can be safely

put out before the end of the month. Turnips also should *not* be sown in May. Finish all top dressing of grass lands, keep down weeds in gardens, give more air to frames so that the plants may grow strong and hardy, see that all fences are secure before you let out any cattle into the pastures, clear out cellars and yards, white-wash buildings, and put the whole homestead into summer order.

JUNE.—One of the most important crops of Nova Scotia is the Potato, and its importance is yearly increasing in consequence of the difficulty of raising it profitably in the United States and Ontario. With us, Potatoes are usually planted locally; in light land the manure is ploughed in, on heavy land it is laid in the drills. Superphosphate and kainit greatly increase the yield, which varies with

different varieties. The following returns were obtained in a field where all were treated alike: Ash leaved Kidney 181 bushels per acre; Beauty of Hebron 200; Early Rose 258; Cattlefeeder 265; Early Ohio 253; Late Rose 308; Jenny Lind 318; White Elephant 422. These figures represent the yield of sound marketable potatoes; the Jenny Lind gave besides 191 bushels of pickings (mostly rotten) so that the total yield of that potato was 509 bushels per acre. It is a sort that should be planted only on dry land, and sparingly manured. Great vigilance is required wherever the Potato Beetle appears in the fields. Remedies: 1. Where the beetles are not numerous they may be picked off by hand and destroyed. 2. Where numerous, take a tin milk-pail, and, walking along the drills, strike the potato vines with a shingle, holding the tin pail so that the beetles will fall into it. They may be killed with boiling water or kerosene. 3. Dust Paris Green while dew

is on the vines. 4. Put one or two teaspoonsfull of Paris Green into a pail of water, stir occasionally, and sprinkle the vines by means of a whisk or small broom. 5. London Purple may be used instead of Paris Green. These poisonous substances should be kept away from animals, children and careless servants. Flowers are now plentiful in the gardens and woods. Last year (1883) the Poets *Narcissus* (pheasants' eye) came into bloom on 1st, the Lady's Slipper (*Cypripedium acule*) on the 4th, Azaleas and apple trees were in blossom on the 9th, and the Double-flowered Cherry on the 11th.

JULY.—The thrifty farmer will have got nearly all his seed into the ground before the first of July, but Turnip sowing may still be done. Some even prefer to

sow their Swedes this month, and the soft Turnips for immediate feeding need not necessarily be sown till the end of July. The ground should have undergone a thorough pulverization. Light sandy soil is the best for Turnips. They start best after the ground is warm, but the bulbs swell most rapidly during the cool dewy nights of Autumn. The soil cannot be worked too deep or made too fine for Turnips. Town manures are valuable for this crop; and crushed bones have been applied with the best effects, either when covered in the drills in the manner of ordinary dung, or when sown by machine along with the seeds, so as to be in immediate contact with the latter. Guano has been largely used of late years. Superphosphate is very efficacious. One point of Turnip culture that is often neglected in Nova Scotia, although well understood elsewhere, is that the seed

should be put in the moment the soil is prepared. If the earth of the prepared drills gets dried up in the sun before the seed is committed to it, how can the latter be expected to germinate. Hoeing and weeding of all drill crops should be carried on actively this month and completed before haying time.

AUGUST—Our farmers, at least those in the best farmed districts of the Province are working into a mixed husbandry, so that cattle may not feed on hay all winter and pasture in the summer, but feed in winter on straw and roots and coarse grain and in summer partially or wholly on green fodder in-doors. This is the only way to enrich a farm, or to attain to anything like high farming. We therefore

<p>recommend our readers to note at this season how convenient it is to have a field of tares or green oats or barley or Indian corn or rape, or any other green eatable thing for the cattle to grow or fatten upon when the pastures are all burnt up. After hayting there will be work in the garden and especially in the orchard. Look after the ripening of fruit, destroy caterpillars, if any still remain; pick the early August apples and send them into market. When the rains come, beds of strawberries may be made up. See that the ground is well drained and enriched with old manure. Mushrooms now appear in the horse pastures. The calving of cows for the season will now be over. All thorough-bred calves should be at once registered in the official Stock Register of the Board of Agriculture. to estimate what stock should be kept during the ensuing winter so that any surplus may be sold off, either in present condition or after being fattened off with some extra feed, which is easily accomplished at this season on waste material, when grain is being cleaned and roots taken up. Sheep should be dipped or washed with some suitable sheep dip, if there is any appearance of ticks, as the eggs hatch out in winter time and the young ticks are very troublesome to the sheep, causing loss not only of wool, but of condition and health. It is a good plan to wash or smear twice a year, in Spring when the wool is taken off, and in Fall when the eggs are being laid in the wool. A good smear may be made with butter and sulphur.

OCTOBER.—The harvesting of root crops is one that requires great attention, and, as the culture of them is extending throughout the Province, we would impress upon all who have not had long experience the necessity of attending to the points noted below:—To take up and store roots successfully is a simple art when properly understood, but the frequent destruction of roots in the cellar shows that it is not always understood or carried out. Potatoes should be dug in dry weather, and allowed to dry completely on the surface before being put together in heaps or in the cellar; the best way is to put them on a barn floor and

exclude the light, otherwise they will become green and acquire a bitter taste and poisonous qualities. Mangels, turnips and carrots should be topped and the fine root fibres cut off. Before storing they should, in like manner, be exposed to dry air that the wounds may heal over; if put at once into the cellar, the wounded tissues will begin to ferment, and a large portion of the roots will be rotted by contact. If facts such as these are kept clearly in view, no farmer need lose his roots. Of course the cellar must be kept well aired, cool and dry, and frost carefully excluded.

NOVEMBER.—The improvement of cattle has at length taken a secure hold of the people of Nova Scotia. This improvement is being carried out principally through the agency of Agricultural Societies. These Societies are apt to forget that their arrangements for the ensuing season, in regard to animals, are most profitably made at this time of year. Every Society keeps, or ought to keep, a sufficient number of male animals for the use of members. If the selection and purchase of these be deferred till Spring time, large prices have to be paid, and the demand is usually so great that suitable animals cannot be obtained. For beef cattle the Short Horn Durham breed is the best; their growth is more rapid than that of any other kind. For milk alone, Ayrshires are to be preferred, Devons make the best working oxen, are quick, active, and easily fed, and soon fatten in the wild pastures for beef. For domestic cows in the city the creamy Alderneys or Jerseys

are most suitable. As soon as the root crops are all cleared off the fields, and the weeds and potato vines are put in heaps to rot, the farmer should employ his whole strength of man and beast in fall ploughing. Whether on old or new land, fall ploughing is a most important operation. Without it a farm cannot be worked to advantage. After ploughing, do not forget to go carefully over the water furrows to make way for the exit of the floods of rain and melting snows that are sure to soak your fields before seed time. A well ploughed, well drained field may be sown in Spring as soon as the frost is gone, whilst one that is irregularly ploughed, or has no water furrows, may long remain a puddle, defying every attempt to improve its condition. The best part of what is too often left to be "Spring work" can be done in the month of November. All land intended for oats, peas, and horse beans should be effectively worked this month.

The Supreme Court has both original and appellate jurisdiction—Original, as to (1) *habeas corpus* in criminal and extradition cases; (2) judicial opinions to the Crown; (3) private bills and petitions therefor referred by the Senate or House of Commons; and (4) civil suits in which the validity of a Dominion or Provincial Act is questioned. Appellate, in appeals (1) from the Exchequer Court; (2) from the Provincial Courts; (3) in *habeas corpus* cases; and (4) in election cases.

THE EXCHEQUER COURT OF CANADA.

The Exchequer Court has original jurisdiction (1) in revenue cases, (2) in civil suits when the Crown for the Dominion is plaintiff, (3) controversies between the Dominion and the Province, or between two Provinces. The Judges and officers are the same as the Supreme Court.

In using a Dominion Measure of capacity the same shall not be heaped, but either shall be stricken with a round stick or roller straight and of the same diameter from end to end, or if the articles sold cannot from its size or shape be conveniently stricken, shall be filled in all parts as nearly to the level of the brim as the size and shape of the article will admit.

Every contract, bargain, sale or dealing made or had in the Dominion of Canada for any work, goods, wares or merchandise, or other thing which has been or is to be done, sold, delivered, carried or agreed for by weight or measure, shall be deemed to be made and had according to one of the Dominion weights or measures ascertained by this Act, or to some Multiple or part thereof, and if not so made or had shall be void, except only when made according to the metric system; and all tolls and duties charged or collected according to weight and measure, shall be charged and collected according to one of the Dominion Weights or Measures ascertained by this Act, or to some multiple or part thereof.

No local or customary measures in the use of the heaped measure shall be lawful.

Any person who sells by any denomination of weight or measure other than one of the Dominion weights and measures or some multiple or part thereof, shall be liable to a fine, not exceeding twenty dollars for every such sale.

Every weight, except when the small size of the weight renders it impracticable, shall have the denomination of such weight stamped or engraved on the top or side thereof in legible figures and letters. Every measure of capacity shall have the denomination thereof stamped or engraved on the outside of such measure in legible figures and letters. Every beam, steelyard or weighing machine shall have marked upon some essential part of it the maximum weight which it is constructed to weigh, and also on the weights or poises used with it their actual weight when truly adjusted, in parts or multiples of the avoirdupois pound. A weight or measure not in conformity with this section shall not be stamped with such stamp of verification under this Act, as is herein mentioned.

Every trader, manufacturer, carrier, public weigher, gauger, measurer, surveyor or other person, who uses, for any purpose of buying, selling or charging for the carriage of any goods, wares, merchandise or thing, or of measuring any land, goods, materials or other thing, for the purpose of charging for or ascertaining the price to be paid, or the charge to be made therefor, any weight or measure, or weighing-machine which has not been duly inspected and stamped according to this Act, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act; and shall, on conviction, incur a penalty of not more than fifty nor less than five dollars for each such offence; and every such unstamped weight, weighing-machine or measure so used, found in his possession, shall, on being discovered by the inspector, or his assistant, be forfeited and forthwith seized and broken by him, without suit or other authority than this Act:

Except that the manufacturer of or dealer in weights, measures or weighing machines who has in his possession for sale any weight, measure or weighing machine, shall not be bound to have the same inspected and stamped according to this Act, so long as the same remain in his manufactory or warehouse; but no such weight, measure or weighing machine shall be removed from his premises, sold or taken into use for trade without having been inspected and stamped:

Any trader not being a manufacturer of or dealer in weights, measures or weighing machines, having in his possession any unstamped weights, measures or weighing machines, shall be liable to a penalty of twenty-five dollars for the first offence, and for each subsequent offence to a penalty of fifty dollars; and the inspector or his assistant shall forthwith seize such weights, measures or weighing-machines which shall be forfeited.

If any person forges or counterfeits any stamp used for the stamping, under this Act, of any measure, weight, balance or weighing-machine, or ~~uses~~ before the commencement of this Act for the stamping of any measure, weight, balance or weighing-machine under any enactment repealed by this Act, or willfully increases or diminishes any weight or measure so stamped, or in any way alters, or tampers with any balance or weighing-machine which has been so stamped, so as to cause it to weigh unjustly, he shall be liable to a penalty of forty dollars for the first offence, and for each subsequent offence he shall incur a penalty of one hundred dollars and two months imprisonment:

Any person who knowingly uses, sells, utters, disposes of, or exposes for sale, any measure, weight, balance or weighing-machine, with such forged or counterfeit stamp thereon, or any weight, measure, balance or weighing-machine so increased, diminished, falsified or tampered with, shall be liable to a penalty for the first offence not exceeding fifty dollars, and for each subsequent offence one hundred dollars.

Any person, not being a manufacturer or dealer in weights, measures or weighing-machines, who refuses to produce for inspection, when required to do so by any inspector or inspector's assistant appointed under this Act, all weights, measures and weighing-machines in his possession, and used for any purpose of trade, or—

Any manufacturer or dealer in weights, measures or weighing-machines, who refuses to permit the inspection, when required in the manner herein provided, of any weights, measures or weighing-machines about to be removed from his premises to be used for purposes of trade, or who permits any such weights, measures or weighing-machines to be so removed without having been first inspected and stamped as herein required,—shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty dollars for the first and forty dollars for the second or any subsequent offence.

All forfeitures and penalties imposed by this Act, or by any regulation made under its authority, shall be recoverable, with costs, before any civil court of competent jurisdiction, or before any Justice of the Peace for the district, county or place in which the offence was committed, if such forfeiture or penalty does not exceed fifty dollars, and before any two such justices, or any magistrate having, by law, the power of two such justices, if it exceeds fifty dollars, upon proof by confession, or by the oath of one credible witness.—and may, if not forthwith paid, be levied by execution of distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender, by warrant, under the hand and seal of such justice, justices or magistrate—by whom also any imprisonment to which the offender is liable may be awarded: and to all such cases the Act passed in the session held in the thirty-second and thirty-third years of her Majesty's reign, and entitled, "*An Act respecting the duties of Justices of the Peace out of Sessions in relation to summary convictions and orders,*" shall apply, subject to the provisions of this Act:

One half of any penalty so recovered shall belong to the party suing for the same, not being an inspector, or an inspector's assistant, and the other half, or (if the party suing is an officer acting in pursuance of this Act) the whole penalty shall belong to Her Majesty for the uses of the Dominion:

Every such suit shall be instituted in the name of the inspector acting in pursuance of this Act, who shall account for the penalty to the Department of Inland Revenue.

Any person aggrieved by the use of any weight or measure, or weighing-machine, which has not been duly inspected and stamped according to this Act, or which may be found light, deficient or otherwise unjust, may recover treble damages and costs.

No action or prosecution shall be brought against any person for any forfeiture or penalty imposed by this Act, unless the same is commenced within three months after the offence is committed.

CUSTOMS TARIFF.

Corrected to September, 1883, by W. A. Garrison, H. M. Customs, Halifax.

4.—*Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that the value of all Bottles, Flasks, Jars, Demi-johns, Carboys, Casks, Hogsheads, Pipes, Barrels, and all other Vessels or Packages manufactured of Tin, Iron, Lead, Zinc, Glass or any other material, and capable of holding Liquid; Crates, Barrels and other Packages, containing Glass, China, Crockery or Earthenware, and all Packages in which goods are commonly placed for home consumption, including cases in which Bottled Spirits, Wines or Malt Liquors are contained, and every Package, being the first receptacle or covering, enclosing goods for purpose of sale, shall in all cases not otherwise provided for, in which they contain goods subject to an *ad valorem* duty, or a specific and *ad valorem* duty be taken and held to be a part of the fair market value of such goods for duty, and shall be charged with the same rate of *ad valorem* duty, as is to be levied and collected, on the goods they contain, and when they contain goods subject to specific duty only, such Packages shall be charged with a duty of Customs of twenty per cent, *ad valorem*, to be computed upon their original cost or value; and all or any of the above Packages described as capable of holding Liquids when containing goods exempt from duty under this Act, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per cent, *ad valorem*; but all Packages not hereinbefore specified, and not herein specially charged with or declared liable to duty under regulations, and being the usual and ordinary Packages in which goods are packed for exportation only, according to the general usage and custom of trade, shall be free of duty.

EXPORTS PROHIBITED.

The export of deer, wild turkeys and quail in the carcass or parts thereof, is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited, and any person exporting or attempting to export any such article shall, for each such offence, incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be exported shall be forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export the same, be seized by any officer of the Customs, and if such intention be proved shall be dealt with as for breach of the Customs laws.

Post Bands are for sale at the rate of \$1.25 per hundred.

On Books and Printed Matter generally, the rate of postage is 2c. per 2 oz.; on Commercial Papers addressed to Postal Union Countries where the *double letter rate* is required, the minimum prepayment of 5c. upon a packet will cover a weight of 5 oz., 6c. for 6 oz.; and 2c. for every additional weight of 2 oz. or fraction thereof.

On Samples and Patterns the postage is 2c. for 2 oz. or fraction thereon.

List 3.

The limit of weight of Books, Printed Matter, Commercial Papers, Documents &c., AS WELL AS FOR NEWSPAPERS, is 4 lbs. 6 oz. avoirdupois, and the limit of size 24 inches in length by 12 inches in breadth or depth. The limit of weight for Samples and Patterns is 8 oz., and the limit of size 8 inches in length, 4 inches in breadth, and 2 inches in depth. These apply to all Postal Union destinations. The limit of weight, however, for Book Packets, &c., to the United Kingdom is 5 lbs. Matter exceeding the limit of weight cannot be forwarded.

It will be observed that all classes of matter can be registered to the United States and all Countries named in Lists I. and II.

Letters containing gold or silver money, (excepting such addressed to the United States) jewels, or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, will not be forwarded, *registered or unregistered*, to any place beyond the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

Newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication or news agency, at the rate of 1 cent per lb. to regular subscribers or news agents in Newfoundland, the United Kingdom, or the United States.

Further information in regard to the rates of postage to British Colonies and foreign countries, via England, or the United States, inland and foreign mail connections, the rules governing letters, newspapers, books, periodicals, samples and parcel post, and the transmission of post cards, ships letters, dead letters, franking and free matter, &c., may be obtained at any Post Office.

Rates of Postage within the Dominion.

LETTERS.

To places within the Dominion of Canada, 3 cents per half oz. each. Letters paid less than one rate will not be forwarded. Other short paid letters will be taxed with double the amount of the deficient postage.

On letters posted at an Office to be delivered from it, commonly known as Local or "drop letters," the rate will be 1 cent per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.; to be in all cases prepaid by Postage Stamps affixed to such letter when posted.

Re-directed Letters will be forwarded without any additional charge if not taken from the office or if handed back at the moment of their delivery, but if taken from the office and subsequently re-posted they become subject to a new rate of postage, in default of which they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent by Post from the Office of publication to regular subscribers in Canada free.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, will be sent at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces, which must be prepaid by postage stamp. Newspapers and Periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, prepaid by postage stamp, one half ct. each.

MISCELLANEOUS MAIL MATTER.

Periodicals, Books, Pamphlets, and occasional Publications, Books and Newspaper Manuscript, Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Music, Packages of Seeds, Cuttings, Roots, Scions, Grafts, Botanical Specimens, etc., and patterns or samples of merchandise.

To any place in Canada, 1 cent per 4 oz. each packet, Books, Circulars, Music, etc., must be put up open at both ends.

Prepayment of Matter of the above description is in all cases compulsory.

PARCELS.

To any place within the Dominion 6 cents per 4 ozs., which must be prepaid. Parcels must not exceed 5 lbs in weight, excepting those addressed to British Columbia or Manitoba, the weight of which is limited to 2 lbs. 3 oz.

REGISTRATION FEE.

To places within the Dominion, 2 cents each letter or post card, and 5 cents each parcel or packet of sample.

LIGHT HOUSES.

On the Coasts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

GEORGE'S ISLAND, west side of Island, Halifax Harbor, lat 44° 38' 30" N., lon 63° 33' 20" W., two fixed white catoptric lights, vertical, 20 feet apart, 50 and 30 feet high, drab square building, 21 feet high. Lights show seaward on the S., and into harbor on N. side; on W. side the upper light only can be seen. Vessels going into Halifax Harbor, passing Meagher's Beach, will keep the light on starboard bow. The light is for the purpose of guiding vessels in and out of the Harbor, through the channel west of the Island. These lights open to westward of Meagher's Beach, clear the westward of Thrum Cap Shoal.

EAST FROM HALIFAX.

MEAGHER'S BEACH, Sherbrook Tower, east side of entrance to Halifax Harbor, lat 44° 36' N., lon 63° 31' 50" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 58 feet high, building white with red roof, granite, height 48 feet. When Sambro light bears W. S. W., this light should not be brought to the westward of north, which clears the Thrum Cap Shoal. A fog bell here, strikes 7 times in each minute.

DEVIL'S ISLAND, on south point of Island, at the eastern entrance to Halifax harbor, two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontally, E. & N., and W. & S., 175 yards apart, visible 13 miles, the light E. 59 feet high, W. light 52 feet, both buildings white, octagonal, wood, height E. 63 feet, W. 45 feet, lat 44° 34' 50" N., lon. 63° 27' 15" W. The eastern light opens to the southward of western, clears to southward of the Thrum Cap Shoal. Pilots are stationed here.

JEDORE ROCK, on summit of rocks about 22 miles east of Halifax, lat 44° 39' 45", lon 63° 0' 22" one fixed red light, visible 12 miles, white, square, wood, dwelling attached, 86 feet high.

Bibles, Prayer Books, Hymn Books—MacGREGOR & KNIGHT, Halifax.

EGG ISLAND, centre of Island, lat 44° 39' 50" N., lon 62° 51' 32" W., catoptric light, alternate red and white, revolving every minute, visible 15 miles, 80 feet high, octagonal building, black and white vertical stripes on seaward side, height 45 feet. Visible around horizon. A bell buoy about 200 yards south of the Brig Rock, W. by S. from the light house, about 2 miles.

POPE'S HARBOR, on west point of Harbor Island, lat 44° 47' 40" N., lon 62° 38' 50" W., fixed red light, catoptric, visible 9 miles, 45 feet high, tower white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, height 37 feet.

SHEET ROCK, at the entrance to Sheet Harbor, lat 44° 49' 55" N., lon 62° 29' 40" W., revolving red light every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles. White, square, wood, with dwelling attached. 75 feet above high water mark.

BEAVER ISLAND, S. E. part of East Beaver, or William Island, lat 44° 48' 10" N., lon 62° 20' 30" W., white catoptric light, revolving every 2 minutes, visible 12 miles, 70 feet high, white building with two black balls to seaward, S. S. W., 35 feet high.

LISCOME, on island, lat 44° 50' 20" N., lon 61° 57' 50" W., red and white catoptric light, alternating every two minutes, visible 15 miles, 64 feet high, white square wooden tower, with dwelling attached.

WEDGE ISLAND, mouth of St. Mary's River, lat 45° 0' 35" N., lon 61° 62' 35" W., one revolving red light, shows 1 minute in 3 minutes, visible 12 miles, white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, catoptric.

HOLY POINT, west side of entrance to Isaac's Harbor, lat. 45° 10' 0" N., lon 61° 39' 12" W., two fixed white catoptric lights vertically, 20 feet apart, visible 9 miles, 80 feet high, square white building, 20 feet high.

COUNTRY HARBOUR, on Green Island, Guysboro' County, lat 45° 6' 15" N., lon 61° 32' 30" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 14 to 16 miles, 51 feet high, white square wooden building, height 23 feet. Coast light, and to guide vessels frequenting Country and Fisherman's Harbors.

TOR BAY, on eastern point of Barry Head, W. side of entrance to Bay, Guysboro' County, lat 45° 11' 37" N., lon 61° 18' 35" W., fixed catoptric light, red to seaward, white northward into Bay and towards Molasses Harbor, visible 10 miles, square wooden building, white with vertical red stripes, top of lantern painted black. Height of lantern 51 feet, tower 36 feet.

THREE TOP ISLAND, on the south-east point of Three Top Island, Whitehaven, Guysborough County, Nova Scotia, lat 45° 12' 40" N., lon 61° 9' 40" W. The light is fixed white catoptric, elevated 48 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 11 miles. The building is a wooden one painted white, and consists of a square tower 62 feet high from base of building to vane on lantern, with keeper's dwelling attached. This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels into Whitehaven, and in order to point out the dangers on the northern side of the Western Passage is obscured when bearing to the eastward of N. E. by E. It is visible from all other points of approach except when intercepted by the high land of Whitehead Island.

WHITEHEAD ISLAND, S. W. extremity of Island, Guysboro' County, lat 45° 12' N., lon 61° 8' 15" W., white catoptric light, revolving every 20 seconds, visible 11 miles, 55 feet high, pyramidal wooden building, 35 feet high, octagonal lantern. Light not totally obscured during eclipses; 10 seconds duration of flash, and 10 seconds eclipse.

CANSO CAPE, north part of Cranberry Island, lat 45° 19' 50" N., lon 60° 55' 20" W., two fixed white lights in one tower, vertically, 35 feet apart, upper visible 15, lower 9 miles, 75 and 40 feet respectively,

A steam fog whistle, about 100 yards south of the light-house, in thick weather sounds a blast of 8 seconds in each minute. An automatic signal buoy in 20 fathoms, $\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. S. E. of Grimes Rock, taken up about December. A temporary light is now in operation.

CASSO HARBOR, on Hart or Cutler Island, lat $45^{\circ} 21' N.$, lon $60^{\circ} 58' 30'' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 42 feet high, white square wooden building, height 23 ft.

GUYS-BORO' HARBOR, W. side of entrance, near Peart Point, Chedabucto Bay, lat $45^{\circ} 22' 50'' N.$, lon $61^{\circ} 29' 10'' W.$, fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 30 feet high, white square wooden building, height 20 feet.

CROW HARBOR, on Rock Island, Chedabucto Bay, lat $45 21 5 N.$, lon $61 16 W.$, fixed white light, visible 22 miles, 50 feet high, white square wood building, 40 feet high. Harbor light.

SAND POINT, or Eddy Point, south entrance, lat $43^{\circ} 31' 30'' N.$, lon $61^{\circ} 14' 40'' W.$, two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontal, 24 feet apart, visible 8 miles, each 25 feet high, white square wooden building, with a black diamond. Lights in window at each end of building.

POINT TUPPER, Ship Harbor or Port Hawkesbury, lat $45^{\circ} 36' 40'' N.$, lon $61^{\circ} 22' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 7 miles, 44 feet high, white square building, height 24 feet. In consequence of the intervention of the land on the south side, can only be seen three miles in that direction.

CREIGHTON'S HEAD, on the north extremity, lat $45^{\circ} 30' 40'' N.$, lon $61^{\circ} 6' W.$, white catoptric light, revolving every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles, 29 feet high, square white wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into Little or West Arichat. Three buoys placed to mark the dangers of the harbor.

JERSEYMAN ISLAND, Arichat Harbor, lat $45^{\circ} 30' 20'' N.$, lon $61^{\circ} 3' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 11 miles, 39 feet high, white square wooden building, height 28 feet. This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels through Crib Passage, in and out of Arichat Harbor. There is also a Range Beacon on the S. E. Point of Jerseyman's Island, that marks Hautfond Shoal, off the entrance to Arichat Harbor. When the beacon and spire of the Roman Catholic Chapel in Arichat are in range, it leads over the West Part of the shoal in 10 feet of water. Vessels bound into Arichat, Cap- Breton, should pass to the west of the shoal, or bring the beacon in range of the cupola on the Convent, which stands 130 yards east of the R. C. Church, which will lead in clear of the shoal. Only those well acquainted should pass to the eastward of the shoal, or bring the beacon to bear to the N. of N. E. An Iron Can Buoy painted red has been placed about one cable's length S. W. of the shoal in six fathoms of water. The buoy will be placed on or about the 1st of May in each year, and taken up about the 10th December.

ARICHAT, Marache Point, south entrance to Madame Island, lat $45^{\circ} 29' N.$, lon $61^{\circ} 1' 50'' W.$, fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 34 feet high, square white wooden building, height 25 feet.

PETITDEGRAT, on Big Arrow Rock, south-east of Madame Island, lat $44^{\circ} 29' 25'' N.$, lon $60^{\circ} 57' 50'' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 38 feet high, white square tower, with dwelling attached, height 31 feet.

GREEN ISLAND, summit of Island, lat $45^{\circ} 28' 50'' N.$, lon $60^{\circ} 53' 40'' W.$, red and white catoptric light, revolving alternately every 45 seconds, visible 14 miles, 70 feet high, white square wooden building, height 31 feet. Light, centre of keeper's dwelling. Visible around horizon.

CAPE LA RONDE, west side of entrance to St. Peter's Bay, lat 45° 34' 45" N., lon 60° 53' W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 14 miles, 92 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels into St. Peter's Bay.

OURTIQUE ISLAND, on south point, lat 45° 36' 40" N., lon 60° 57' 15" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 9 miles, 78 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels through Lennox Passage.

Pole lights in course of erection on Glasgow Point, Seal Island, Grand Degree Ferry, in the Lennox Passage.

JEROME POINT, east side of St. Peter's Bay. A fixed red light, visible 8 miles. Square wooden tower, with dwelling attached, painted white.

SAINT ESPRIT ISLAND, south end, lat 45° 37' 30" N., lon 60° 29' 20" W., one revolving white catoptric light, flash at intervals of 30 seconds, building white, with two red bands, square, wood, with dwelling attached. Height of building 55 feet, of light 78 feet. Bad Neighbor Shoal, S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile from this light is not more than 12 feet below water.

A Bell Buoy off Fourchie Head.

GUION ISLAND, about 230 yards from west end of Island, lat 45° 46' 10" N., lon 60° 6' 20" W., red revolving light, catoptric, attains its greatest brilliancy every 30 seconds, visible 12 miles, 74 feet high, tower white, square, with dwelling attached, height 54 feet.

LOUISBURG, north side of entrance to harbor, 120 yards inshore of point, lat 45° 54' 30" N., lon 59° 57' 15" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 16 miles, 85 feet high, building white, with a black vertical stripe on dwelling, height 35 feet.

An Automatic Signal Buoy in 30 fathoms $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. from light-house.

From this buoy a course N. W. by W. will clear the Broad Shoal, and lead to the fairway of Louisburg Harbor. Taken up about December.

MAINADIEU, on south side of west point of Seaboard Island, lat 46° 0' 30" N., lon 59° 47' 35" W., fixed red catoptric light, 90 feet high, white square wooden building, height 40 feet.

SCATTERIE, north-east point on Trap Rock, lat 46° 2' 15" N., lon 59° 40' 15" W., white catoptric revolving light, visible a minute, eclipsed half a minute, visible 15 miles, 90 feet high, white octagonal building, height 70 feet. The light should never be brought to bear to eastward of N. N. E., or to southward of S. S. W., nor approached nearer than $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile. Visible half minute, eclipsed one minute. A boat is here to render assistance.

Fog Whistle near the light-house. Sounds two blasts of 5 seconds, with intervals of 10 seconds, in every minute.

FLINT ISLAND, on island, lat 46° 11' N., lon 59° 46' 56" W., white catoptric light, revolving every 15 seconds, visible 12 miles, 65 feet high, white octagonal building, height 43 feet. Visible around horizon.

LINGAN HEAD, north side of entrance to Bridgeport Harbor, lat 46° 47' 10" N., lon 62° 2' 40" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 50 feet high, white square wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into Bridgeport Harbor.

W. by N., and in no other directions. It should be visible 4 miles. The tower is a wooden building, painted white, and consists of a square tower 42 feet high from base to vane on lantern, with a keeper's dwelling attached.

An Automatic Buoy, painted red with letter L, in 13 fathoms, east of the Larcher Rock.

It can also be seen on Stanwood's Beech, when bearing from S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. to S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., but cannot be run for on these bearings, the only entrance to the harbor being through Yarmouth Sound and round East Cape.

TRINITY LEDGE, an Iron Bell Buoy, painted red, has been moored to the westward of Trinity Ledge, off Cape St. Mary.

CAPE ST. MARY, east side of Bay, lat $44^{\circ} 5' 20''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 12' 40''$ W., red and white catoptric light, revolving alternately every 30 seconds, visible 17 miles, 103 feet high, octagonal white building, height 43 feet.

METEBHAN RIVER, at entrance end of Breakwater, lat $44^{\circ} 13' 43''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 8' 12''$ W., fixed green catoptric light, visible 6 miles, 23 feet high, building vertical, red stripes on seaward side, 21 feet high, lantern painted black. Beacon for guiding vessels into river. Must be left on starboard hand and passed close aboard. Tide leaves breakwater one hour before low water.

CHURCH POINT, east side of St. Mary's Bay, Digby County, lat $44^{\circ} 19' 55''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 7' 35''$ W., fixed red catoptric light, visible ten miles, 36 feet high, square white wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding against dangers in vicinity of Church Point.

SHESBROO, south side of entrance to river, lat $44^{\circ} 26' 30''$ N., lon $65^{\circ} 1' 15''$ W., fixed white dioptric light, visible 8 miles, 36 feet high, white wooden building, pyramidal, height 33 feet.

WESTPORT, Peter's Island, entrance to Grand Passage, lat $44^{\circ} 15' 30''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 20' 20''$ W., 2 fixed white catoptric lights, horizontal, 24 feet apart visible 10 miles, each 40 feet high, square white building, height 15 feet. Visible from the northward between the bearings of S. by W. and S. S. W., and from the southward between the bearings of S. by E., by E., and N. N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

A red Can Buoy off Dartmouth Point, and a black Can Buoy off Cow Ledge.

A red Beacon on Cow Ledge.

BRIER ISLAND, north-west Point, lat 44° 14' 57" N., lon 66° 23' 30" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 13 miles, 92 feet high, white octagonal building, height 55 feet. A steam fog whistle on N. W. of Brier Island, south side of light house, sounds during thick and foggy weather and snow storms as follows: Blast of four seconds, interval four seconds, blast of four seconds, interval of four seconds, blast of four seconds, interval of forty seconds—making sixty seconds.

BOAR'S HEAD, 17 yards from edge of cliff, lat 41° 24' 16" N., lon 66° 13' W., red and white catoptric light, revolving alternately every minute, visible 14 miles, 70 feet high, white square building. On south entrance to Petit Passage.

POINT PRIM, south point of entrance to Annapolis Basin, lat 44° 41' 34" N., lon 65° 47' 20" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 13 miles, 76 feet high, square tower, vertical red and white stripes, height 22 feet. Fog whistle on Prim Point sounds in snow storms and in thick or foggy weather 8 seconds in each minute, making an interval of 52 seconds between each blast.

MARSHALL COVE or **PORT WILLIAMS**, south shore, lat 44° 56' 52" N., lon 65° 16' W., 2 fixed white catoptric lights, vertical, 20 feet apart, upper 60 feet high, visible 10 miles, white square building, height 22 feet. Lantern on top of dwelling; lower light in low window, visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

MARGARETVILLE, on extremity of point, south shore, lat 45° 2' 57" N., lon 65° 4' W., two fixed red catoptric lights, 30 and 27 feet high, visible 8 miles, square building, horizontal white and black stripes, height 22 feet. Visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

BLACK ROCK, south shore, lat 45° 10' 10" N., lon 64° 46' W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 45 feet high, square white building, height 35 feet. Light on top of dwelling, visible from all points of approach. A fog whistle on the extreme point of Cape d'Or, on the opposite side of the channel from Black Rock, sounds during thick weather, fogs and snow storms, twice in each minute, each blast being of six seconds duration, with intervals of 24 seconds between. The whistle will probably be heard in calm weather, or with the wind, at a distance of 20 miles, and in stormy weather, or against the wind, from 5 to 8 miles, according to the state of the atmosphere.

HORTON, on bluff, west side of Avon River, lat 45° 6' 15" N., lon 64° 13' 30" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 20 miles. Square tower with dwelling attached.

WALTON HARBOR, Basin of Mines, Hants County, lat 45° 14' N., lon 64° 0' 45" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 19 miles, 60 feet high, square white wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into Walton harbor.

BURNCOAT, Basin of Minas, north-west extremity of head, south shore lat 45° 18' 40" N., lon 63° 48' 30" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 13 miles, 75 feet high, square white building, height 35 feet. On dwelling. Visible from all points of approach.

CAPE D'OR. A steam whistle has been erected at Cape d'Or, Cumberland County. Sounds 6 seconds in every 30 seconds.

PARRSBORO', or Partridge Island, west side of river, lat 45° 23' N., lon 64° 19' W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 9 miles, 37 feet high, white square building, height 32 feet. Lantern on dwelling.

SPENCER POINT, on north shore, Cobequid Bay, lat 45° 23' 30" N., lon 66° 57' W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 6 miles, 35 feet high, window in building 20 feet high.

The following clauses of the Medical Act (Chap. 28, Revised Statutes, 4th Series,) are here published for the information of the profession and public:

8. Subject to the exceptions hereinafter made, no person shall practice physic, surgery or midwifery in Nova Scotia, unless his name shall be registered in the Book of Registry of the Provincial Medical Board, and unless he shall have received from such Board a license to practice.

16. Any person entitled to be registered under this chapter, but who shall neglect or omit to be so registered, shall not be entitled to any of the

rights or privileges conferred by the provisions of this chapter, so long as such neglect or omission shall continue.

17. No person, otherwise fully qualified under this chapter, shall be refused registration or a license to practise on account of his adopting or refusing to adopt the practice of any particular theory of medicine or surgery. In case of such refusal by the Board, the party aggrieved shall have the right to appeal to the Governor in Council, who, upon due cause shown, shall issue an order to the Board to register the name of such person and to grant him a license to practice.

21. Every person who shall be registered under the provisions of this chapter, shall be entitled according to his qualification or qualifications to practise Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery, or either or any of them, as the case may be, in Nova Scotia, and to demand and recover in any court of law reasonable charges for professional aid, advice and visits, and the cost of any medicine or other medical or surgical appliances rendered or supplied by him to his patients.

22. No person shall be entitled to recover any charge in any court of law for any medical or surgical advice or for attendance, or for the performance of any operation, or for any medicine which he shall have both prescribed and supplied, unless he shall prove upon the trial that he is registered under this chapter.

24. No person shall be appointed as medical officer, physician or surgeon in any branch of the public service, or in any hospital or other charitable institution, unless he shall be registered under the provisions of this chapter.

25. No certificate required by any Act now in force, or that may hereafter be passed, from any physician or surgeon, or medical practitioner shall be valid, unless the person signing the same shall be registered under this chapter.

26. If any person not registered or licensed under the provisions of this chapter, or not being actually employed as a physician or surgeon in Her Majesty's naval or military service, practises Physic, Surgery or Midwifery for hire, gain, or hope of reward, he shall thereby forfeit a sum of twenty dollars for each day on which he so practises.

27. Any sum forfeited under the next preceding section shall be recoverable with costs, and may be sued for and recovered in the same manner as a private debt, by the Provincial Medical Board or any member thereof; and being recovered, shall belong to the Board for the use thereof under this chapter. Provided that, where the information leading to such recovery shall have been given by any person unconnected with the medical profession, such person shall be entitled to receive one-half of the sum so recovered.

28. Upon the trial of such cause, the burden of proof as to the license or right of the defendant to practise Physic, Surgery or Midwifery in Nova Scotia shall lie upon the defendant.

EXPLANATION OF SIGNALS.

Made on Main Signal Staff at Citadel Hill, when Vessels are seen from the Citadel or reported from an Outpost.

When Sailing Vessels are reported from an outpost, the following signals are made on the lower yard:

BY DAY.

- For 1 Square Rigged vessel, 2 balls close up, one on the outer halliard and one on the inner halliard.
- " 2 Do, 1 ball hoisted on the outer halliard and one close up on the inner halliard: outer ball dropped.
- " 3 Do, 2 balls close up, one on the outer and one on the inner halliard.
- " 4 Do, 2 balls separated, and one close up on the inner halliard.
- " 5 Do, a penant of any colour on the outer halliard, and one ball close up inside.
- " 6 Do, a penant under a ball close up on the outer halliard, and a ball at the inner halliard close up.
- " 7 Do, a penant over a ball close up on the outer halliard, and a ball close up on the inner halliard.
- " 8 Do, a penant under two balls close up on the outer halliards with a ball close up on the inner halliard.
- " 9 Do, a penant between two balls close up on the outer halliard with a ball close up on the inner halliard.
- For 10 Do, a flag of any colour close up on the outer halliard, with a ball close up on the inner halliard.

The above balls, &c., are hoisted on the east or west yard arm, according to the *quarter* the vessel first appears in.

A Ship, a large ball at the end of the yard, with a small one at inner halliard.

A Barque, a large do at the end, with a small one dropped at inner halliard.

A Brig, a small one at the end of the yard, and a large one at the inner halliard.

A Brigantine, a cross close up at the outer halliard. Two or more do, a cross half hoisted.

A Topsail Schooner, or Schooner wearing a Merchant's Private Signal, a cross close up at the inner halliard.

Two or more schooners, a cross inner, half hoisted.

The upper yard of the Ship Staff is used solely to designate Steam Vessels thus:

Two large balls close up, one at the outer and the other at the inner halliard. E or W, a steamer reported in that quarter.

A small ball at the outer, and a large one at the inner halliard, a very small or regular coasting Steamer.

A large ball at the outer, and a small one at the inner halliard, a large or ocean going Steamer.

Steamers or Sailing Vessels showing owners' or agents' private signal flags, are denoted on the private Signal Staff with a small descriptive penant underneath the private signal.

**DIRECTIONS TO MARINERS WITH REFERENCE TO CANADIAN
STORM WARNINGS, ISSUED FOR QUEBEC AND THE
MARITIME PROVINCES.**

**Explanation of Signals made off on the Storm Signal Staff at
the Citadel.**

I.—Cone, hoisted with the apex downwards, indicates "moderate gale is expected," probably at first from an easterly direction.

II.—Cone, with apex pointing upwards, indicates "moderate gale is expected," probably at first from a westerly direction.

III.—Drum, with Cone underneath, the apex pointing downwards, indicates fresh to heavy gale is expected, probably at first from a easterly direction.

IV.—Drum, with Cone above, the apex pointing upwards, indicates fresh to heavy gale is expected, probably at first from a westerly direction.

The Cone, when hoisted by itself, indicates that it is expected that the wind will obtain a velocity of 30 miles an hour, but will not exceed 40 miles; and it is not intended that an ordinary well found vessel should stay in port, but simply as a warning to mariners that strong winds are expected from the quarter indicated.

The Drum will always be hoisted when the velocity of the wind is expected to exceed 40 miles an hour.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 1 and 3, is two white lanterns hanging perpendicular.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 2 and 4, is two white lanterns hanging horizontally.

NOTES.—Mariners will be able to obtain further information from Drum Agents, or by consulting the daily probabilities. Mariners must always bear in mind that the storm signals are merely cautionary, and do not necessarily mean that a storm will occur at the place where the signal is displayed, but that one is expected either there or within such a distance that vessels leaving port would be liable to be caught in it.

The storm warnings issued for Nova Scotia, are received from the Central Office, Toronto, Ont.

The City *Civil Court*, presided over by the Stipendiary Magistrate, (having jurisdiction of sums up to \$80), is held in the City Court House, Market Square, on the *second* and *fourth* Wednesday of every month.

The City *Criminal Court* meets on the *first* and *third* Wednesday of each month, and is also presided over by the Stipendiary Magistrate, having jurisdiction in all statutable offences, except treason, homicide, burglary and arson. *Clerk of the above Courts*, the City Clerk or Assistant Clerk.

The Police Office is open every week day, from 10 to 3 o'clock, (except on Saturday, when it closes at 1 P.M.) The administration of Police and all executive powers of the corporation is vested in the Stipendiary Magistrate.

MASTERS AND MATES.

Regulations Respecting Coasters, Steamtugs, etc.—Qualifications Necessary for Licenses—Who are exempt.

Fine Leather Goods: Purse, Card Case, &c.—MacGREGOR & KNIGHT, Halifax.

At last session of the House of Commons an act was passed rendering it necessary that masters and mates of vessels employed in the navigation of inland waters and on coasting voyages should hold certificates of competency. For the benefit of those interested we give the following information as to the requirements of the law, who it effects and who are exempt from its operation.

Examinations shall be held for persons residing in Canada for at least three years, who intend to become masters or mates (meaning first or only mate) of ships trading on the Inland waters of Canada or coasting voyages, (including a voyage between Canada and Newfoundland or the United States) or who wish to procure certificates of competency or certificates of service as masters or mates of such ships. Persons serving in ships registered in Canada and British subjects serving in foreign ships in like trade shall be deemed to be domiciled in Canada while so serving.

Applicants for examination shall pay, previous to such examination, a fee of eight dollars for a master's certificate of competency and four dollars for a mate's certificate. In the event of failure on the first examination the applicant shall be entitled to a second examination without additional fee; but, in the event of a second failure, he shall pay the same fee for the third and every subsequent examination as he paid for the first. Having passed the examination the applicant shall be entitled to a *certificate of competency*.

Certificates of service in vessels employed in coasting or inland waters navigation, differing in form from the above mentioned certificates of competency, may be granted as follows:—

1. Every person who, before the first of January 1883, served as master in a ship trading on the inland waters of Canada, or on coasting voyages, or being a British subject served in foreign vessels in like trade, and who has produced satisfactory evidence at such examination of his sobriety, experience, ability and general good conduct aboard ship shall be entitled to a certificate of service as master for ships trading on the inland waters of Canada, or on coasting voyages, on payment of a fee of four dollars.

2. Mates, (first or only mate) having giving evidence of service experience, &c., as aforesaid, shall be entitled to certificates of service on payment of a fee of two dollars.

*After the first of January, 1884, no vessel over 100 tons registered tonnage, nor steam ship registered in Canada, shall go from any port or place in Canada, on a voyage to any other part of Canada, or Newfoundland or United States, or be licensed or allowed to ply on any Canadian water unless the master thereof has obtained and possesses a valid certificate of competency or service as above provided, or valid certificate of competency or service as master of sea going ships from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries of Canada, or from the Board of Trade in the United Kingdom, or a certificate granted in any British possession and declared by her Majesty's Council, published in the *London Gazette*, under the Merchants Shipping Act of 1869, or by any act of Parliament*

of the United Kingdom, containing such provisions, to be of the same force as a certificate of competency.

Nor shall any ship registered in Canada and over 200 tons register, nor any steamship so registered and allowed by law to carry more than forty passengers, go from any port or place in Canada, to any other port or place as above mentioned, unless such ship carries also a mate who has obtained a valid certificate of competency or service, granted by some such authority as aforesaid.

The penalty for engaging to serve as master or mate of any ship, the master or mate whereof is by this act required to have certificate, or going on a voyage as above described, without being at the time entitled to and in possession of a certificate; or any person who employs any person as master or mate of any such ship on any such voyage, without first ascertaining that he is at the time entitled to and in possession of the required certificate, shall for each offence incur a penalty of \$100.

After January, 1st, 1884, the master of every ship required to have a license under this act, must produce the same to every officer of the Customs in Canada to whom he applies for a clearance, or for a *transire* coastwise, or for a license for the season in respect of such ship; and if such ship is also required to carry a mate with certificate, the master shall at the same time produce such mate's certificate.

No officer of the Customs shall clear any such ship, or grant a *transire* coastwise, or license, without the required certificate or certificates being produced; and if any master of any ship for which such clearance, *transire*, or license is required, attempts to sail after the date mentioned, without the requirements of this section (Sec. 8) being complied with, he shall incur a penalty of \$100 for each offence.

The master of any *steam tug* or *other steamer*, required to have a certificated master, but so employed as not to require such clearance, as aforesaid, shall whenever required by any officer of the Customs, produce his certificate as master, and for any refusal or neglect to do so shall incur a penalty of \$100; and if any steam tug or other steamer required by this act to have a certificated master, plies on Canadian waters without having such certificated master on board and in charge, the owner thereof shall incur a penalty of \$100 for every day on which such offence is committed.

Provision is made for obtaining a copy or duplicate certificate, on proof being given to the satisfaction of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries that the original is lost. A fee amounting to one half the cost for the original shall be paid for such duplicate.

Certificates may be cancelled or suspended upon investigation in cases of incompetency, want of care, or other misconduct; or if it is shown that such certificate was granted on false or erroneous information.

Copies of this act have been lodged in all the principal custom houses in the Dominion, with the names of the various ports where Boards of Examiners have been appointed, together with a copy of the rules made by the Governor-in-Council for the guidance of such examiners.

The following are the qualifications necessary for certificates of competency for masters and mates employed in the coast-trade between Quebec and any of the lower ports; or in the coasting trade between Canada and Newfoundland, or between Canada and any port in the United States, or in the coasting trade of British Columbia:

1. All candidates must pass the examination in colours.

2. A *Mate* must be 19 years of age, and have served at least two years at sea.

3. *In Navigation.*—He must write legibly, and be able to work a day's work, find the latitude and longitude by inspection, find his latitude by a meridian altitude of the sun, must be able to work a case in parallel sailing, and find the course and distance from one position to another by Mercator's method. He must understand the use of the quadrant, be able to take a bearing by compass, and determine his position by cross-bearings on the chart. He must be able to shape a course, and determine the distance run from any given departure.

4. *In seamanship.*—He must possess a thorough knowledge of the "Rule of the Road," as regards both steamers and sailing vessels, their regulation lights, fog and sound signals; he must know the signals to be made if in distress, he must understand both the lead and the log, knotting and splicing, rigging, and stowing a cargo. He will be examined in seamanship generally, either for "square rig," "fore and aft" or "steamer," as the case may be. If in the latter he must have a knowledge of the fittings for fire purposes, the bulk-head allices, if any, and the "engine room telegraph," the securing and lowering of "life boats" and "life rafts." The examiner will ask any other questions he may think fit relating to the duties of a mate.

5. A *Master* must be 21 years of age, and have been at sea at least three years, one of which he must have been as mate.

6. *In navigation.*—In addition to the qualification for a mate, he will have to explain how he would shape a course to counteract the effect of a given current, and find the distance made good towards a given point in a certain time.

7. *In seamanship.*—In addition to the qualification for a mate, he must know the principal lights upon the coast; he will be required to explain how he would lay out an anchor in case of stranding, and be able to rig a temporary rudder should the steering apparatus become disabled. He will be questioned as to his knowledge of Protests, Invoices, Charter Party, Bottomry Bonds, and Bills of Lading. The examiner will ask him any further questions he may think fit relating to the duties of a master.

Then follow the special regulations for navigators of inland waters, and the following miscellaneous regulations applicable to coasters and inland navigators, alike:

23. Testimonials of character and of sobriety, experience, ability and good conduct on board ship, will be required of all applicants, and without producing them no person will be examined. As such testimonials will have to be closely examined by the examiners, for verification, before any certificates can be granted, candidates are to lodge them as early as possible. The testimonials of servitude of foreigners and British seamen serving in foreign vessels, must be confirmed either by the Consul of the country to which the ship in which the candidate served belonged, or by some other official authority of that country, or by the testimony of some credible person on the spot, having personal knowledge of the facts required to be established. Upon application to one of the examiners, candidates will be supplied with a form, which they will be required to fill up and lodge with their testimonials in the hand of the examiner.

24. Candidates are required to appear at the examination room punctually at the time appointed.

25. Candidates are prohibited from bringing into the examination

room books or paper of any kind whatever. The slightest infringement of this regulation will subject the offender to all the penalties of a failure.

26. In the event of any candidate being detected in defacing, blotting, writing in or otherwise injuring any book or books belonging to the Board, the papers of such candidates will be detained until the book or books so defaced be replaced by him. He will not, however, be at liberty to remove the damaged book, which will still remain the property of the Board.

27. In the event of any candidate being discovered copying from another, or affording any assistance or giving any information to another, or communicating in any way with another, during the time of examination, he will subject himself to a failure and its consequences.

28. No candidate will be allowed to work out his problems on a slate or on waste paper.

29. No candidate will be permitted to leave the room until he has given up the paper on which he is engaged.

30. Candidates will be allowed to work out the various problems by the method and tables they have been accustomed to use, and 'will' be allowed six hours to perform the work. At the expiration of six hours they will, if they have not finished, be declared to have failed, unless the Board of Examiners see fit to lengthen the period in any special case. If, however, the period is lengthened in any case, the special circumstances of that case and the reasons for lengthening the period must be reported to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries by the Examiners at the time they send in the report.

31. The correction by inspection, from tables given in many works on navigation, will not be allowed.

32. Candidates are expected to bring their answers to all problems within, or not to exceed, a margin of one mile of position from a correct result.

33. In finding the longitude by chronometer, the logarithms used in finding the hour angle should be taken out for seconds of arc.

34. In all other problems the logarithms, to the nearest minute will be sufficiently correct for Mates. From Masters a degree of precision will be required, both in the work and in the results, beyond what is demanded from mates.

35. In every case where problems are required to be worked out, examination for master is to commence with the problems for mate.

36. In all cases of failure the candidate must be re-examined *de novo*. If a candidate fails he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of six months' service afloat, on the inland waters or sea coast, as the case may be, to give him time to gain experience.

37. As the examinations of Masters and Mates are made compulsory, the qualifications have been kept as low as possible, but it is distinctly to be understood that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries may raise the standard from time to time if deemed advisable.

EXEMPTIONS, ETC.

It is especially provided that the foregoing regulations as to masters and mates shall not apply to *pleasure yachts* not carrying passengers or goods for hire, or ships *employed solely in fishing*, or barges, or other vessels having neither masts, sails nor rigging, and not being steamships.

The word "steamship" or "steamer" includes any ship impelled wholly or in part by steam or other motive power than sails or oars; the word "voyage" includes passage or trip.

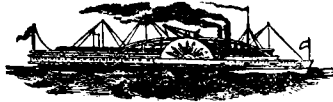

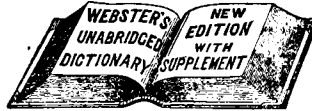

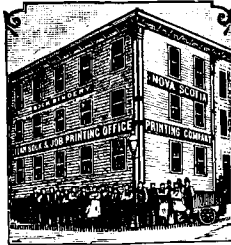
