



## TOWNS AND VILLAGES.

#### COUNTY OF HALTON.

#### ACTON.

A flourishing post village and station on the Grand Trunk Railway, situated in the Township of Esquesing, in the midst of a good agricultural district. The village is well laid out, and contains three churches, viz:—Canada Presbyterian, Wesleyan Methodist, and Baptist; a good school house and several stores, a first-class flouring and grist mill, Messrs. B. W. & E. Nicklin, proprietors, a tannery, a first-class shingle factory Messrs. Moore Bros., proprietors, whilst in the mechanical trade, Messrs. Michael Speight and James Ryder, are prepared to execute all orders in general blacksmithing; and Mr. John Speight, manufactures carriages of the best description.

There are two hotels, the Exchange is kept by Mr. Clark who has excellent accommodation for the public.

Knox's church Acton, was built in the year 1846, was one of the first ten churches built after the disruption of the Church of Scotland in the year 1843, and shared in the liberal donation of two thousand dollars by the Hon. Isaac Buchanan; prominent among the first Building Committee was the late John Burns, Esq., late editor of the Home and Foreign Record of the Canada Presbyterian church, it was first preached in by the eminent Rev. W. C. Burns, who died recently as a missionary in China, subsequently it was formally opened by the Rev.

R. Burns, D. D., then a minister of Knox's church Toronto, the first minister, Rev. J. McLachlan, was ordained the 20th day of August, 1851, and was succeeded by the present minister, Rev. L. Cameron on the 5th day of Nov, 1862.

The village is distant from Toronto 35 miles, from Guelph 13, and from Milton the County Town 12 miles. Population 700.

C. church—a school house, an hotel, a store and post-office, one wagon and blacksmith shop, population about 80.

#### BRONTE.

A post village and station on the G. W. R. and on the shore of Lake Ontario, at the mouth of the twelve mile Creek in the township of Trafalgar, distant from Toronto twenty-five miles; from Hamilton fourteen and from Milton twelve miles. It contains three churches, the Baptist and two Methodist Episcopal churches, (one being for a colored congregation) one Hotel, three stores, a blacksmith shop and a School House. The harbor is good and rendered safe by Rivers' Cape, which protects it from east and north-east winds; a considerable amount of shipping is carried on at this place. The town was surveyed and laid out by Government in 1834, when it received the name it still bears.

#### CAMPBELLVILLE.

A thriving post village in the township of Nassagaweya, situated on the sixteen mile Creek at the intersection of the stage road leading from Wellington Square to Guelph, distance from Wellington Square thirteen miles; from Guelph eighteen miles, and from Milton the County town seven miles. It is surrounded by an excellent agricultural district, and contains two churches, the Canada Presbyterian, a handsome frame building, erected in 1865 at a cost of \$1,600 having capacity to seat 250, Rev. James Little minister; and the Wesleyan Methodist, a frame, built at the same time, Rev. Mr. Blackstock minister. There is considerable manufacturing carried on here; the large steam saw mill and lath machine of Mr. Smith, conducted by Mr. David Munn, is about the largest in this County, having compliances to cut four millions feet of lumber in the season, and one and half million feet of lath. The woolen mills and factory of Messrs. Davidson & Bros. compare favorably with any other in the County; the large water flouring and grist mills built of stone in 1857, Mr. George Abrey proprietor have the capacity of turning out 50 barrels of flour daily, he has also a good saw-mill. Messrs. Finlay & McGibbons are each engaged in the lumber manufacturing. There are also two blacksmiths, one wagon maker and two shoemaker shops; two stores, a large public hall and two hotels. Population about 200.

Mr. J. Wilson employs a number of hands in the manufacture of cabinet ware, chairs, &c, water power is employed.

The village is situated in the midst of a rich and fertile agricultural section of the country. Population. 1,500.

#### MILTON.

The County Town of the County of Halton, was Incorporated by Special Act of Parliament, on July 4th, 1857. It is admirably adapted for the County seat, as the centre of the town has been demonstrated by surveyors to be the exact central point of the County, and the corners of the four Townships, Trafalgar, Nelson, Nassagaweya, and Esquesing, which compose the compact little County, are within a trifling distance of Milton, which is situated in the north-west corner of Trafalgar. Being incorporated as a Town, and divided into three wards, it has a Mayor, Reeve and nine Councillors, being three for each ward. The North ward contains 200 acres, being all north of Main street, consisting of Martin's survey, of lot 15 in the 2nd concession; the East ward consists of 100 acres, being all east of Commercial street, and is called Teetzel's survey; the South ward is also 100 acres south of Main street and west of Commercial street, it is called Foster's survey. The Town is regularly laid out, with streets crossing at right angles, and contains fine County buildings, Town Hall, and many fine private residences built of an excellent description of freestone, quarried in large quantities from the mountain, which is a continuation of the mountain at Hamilton, coming up through Nelson to within a mile of Milton, when it turns off to Esquesing on the north. The County buildings were erected at a cost of \$23,000, and the Town Hall, a more recent structure, cost \$5,000. It contains the offices of John Dewar, Jr., County Attorney, and Matheson & Dixon, Barristers at Law, besides a spacious reading room and Council Chamber; the whole of the upper story is reserved for a public Hall, capacious enough to hold seven hundred, seated. The Mechanics' Institute have also placed an elegant new Piano in the Hall, for their own concerts, and for rental.

The Canadian Champion, published by R. Matheson, every Thursday morning, for \$1 a year in advance, has a very large circulation, and is considered the best advertising medium in Halton. Five Church edifices have been erected by the Episcopalians, Presbyterian Church of Canada, Church of Scotland, Wesleyan and New Connexion Methodists, and Roman Catholics. There are also, an excellent Grammar School, and Central School, besides several private academies.

Messrs. Plewes & Warcup carry on the Milton Flouring Mill. It contains 3 run of stone and has the capacity of turning out 75 barrels daily, the Mill is built of stone and is 4 stories high. A Saw Mill and Planing Factory within the corporation, and a Woollen Factory just without the corporation situated on the Sixteen Mile Creek, a fine stream passing through the centre of the town and thence to Oakville, where it enters Lake Ontario.

An extensive Iron Foundry and Agricultural Works established by Messrs. Brothers & Hatton, who employ about twenty hands and an engine of 20 horse power. The premises are built of stone, two stories high and 40 by 50 feet, having a one story stone building in rear 100 by 25 feet, also a wing of frame 100 by 25 feet. This firm manufactures Ball's Ohio Reaper and Mower, Threshing Machines and Agricultural Implements generally.

Messrs. Lindsay and Miller employ from eight to ten hands and an engine of 15 horse power, in the manufacture of staves, barrels headings, &c.

Two carriage shops, a tannery, and a number of fine general stores, do a large business. Four excellent hotels accommodate the travelling public, and there are stages running twice a day to Georgetown, Hamilton via Carlisle, and twice a day to Bronte station on the Great Western Railway, about 11 miles distant. Milton does a fine local trade, being situated in the centre of a wealthy agricultural district, about 11 miles from the Great Western on the South, and 12 miles from the Grand Trunk on the North; the distance to Oakville is 16 miles, to Hamilton 25, and to Toronto about 40 miles. Population 1000.



#### WELLINGTON SQUARE.

A post village and station on the G. W. R., in the township of Nelson. It is pleasantly situated at the head of Lake Ontario, and surrounded with the most romantic and picturesque scenery. It possesses a very good harbor; a large quantity of lumber and grain is shipped from this port. The village contains some very fine church edifices and other public and private buildings.

The Church of England is a handsome frame building erected in 1835 at a cost of \$2,500, having the capacity to seat 300; the approach to the church is most tastefully decorated with ornamental and shade trees that cannot be excelled; there is in connection with the church a Rectory endowment of 400 acres—Mrs. Kerr, daughter of the late well known Captain Brandt, was the donor of the church site. The Wesleyan, and Episcopal Methodists, and the Roman Catholic churches are built of brick and cost about \$10,000 each; the Presbyterian and Baptist churches are neat frame buildings. The school house is of brick, a large two story edifice, in which there are two teachers engaged, Mr. Bradin and Miss Morrison.

There is a large brick Temperance Hall in which a division of the Sons of Temperance meet regularly. The Masonic Order has a Lodge here, viz., Burlington Lodge, No. 165, which meets at W. Square on the Wednesday on or before full moon in each month, William Kems, W. M. The Loyal Orange Lodge, No. 1182, has its regular meetings on the second Thursday of each month, Joseph Langrie, W. M.

# COUNTY OF HALTON.

The County of Halton is bounded on the North by the County of Wellington, on the South by Lake Ontario, on the East by the County of Peel, and on the West by the County of Wentworth.

By the census returns of 1851-2 the County of Halton contained a population of eighteen thousand three hundred and twenty-two, embracing the following nationalities: of England and Wales 1930, of Scotland 1538, of Ireland 3438, natives of Canada 9767, natives of Canada of French origin S18, United States 673, and of other countries 158. The census returns of 1861 give the population at 22,794: native of England and Wales 2142, of Scotland 1820, of Ireland 3102, natives of Canada 14694, natives of Canada of French origin 55, United States 701, and of other countries 280. From the same returns (1861) we find the county contained 1877 occupiers of land, holding in acres 203,727, of which 131,109 acres were under cultivation, 83,739 under crops, 44,988 under pasture, 2,482 under gardens and orchards, 73,518 under wood and The entire cash value of farms \$8,245,080, cash value of farming implements \$278,947, produce of gardens, orchards, &c., \$41, The number of acres under wheat 33,774, producing 601,998 bushels. The total value of live stock was \$989.180.

The County contains four townships, viz: Esquesing, Nassagaweya, Nelson and Trafalgar. It is traversed on the South by the Great Western Railway and on the North by the Grand Trunk Railway. There are a number of fine streams draining the County, which supply an abundance of hydraulic power which is taken advantage of to a very large extent.

# TOWNSHIP OF ESQUESING.

The township of Esquesing, County of Halton, is bounded on the north by the township of Erin, County of Wellington, on the south by the township of Trafalgar, on the east by the township of Chinguacousy County of Peel and on the west by the township of Nassagaweya. The township of Esquesing is well settled, and contained in 1850 three thousand three hundred and forty inhabitants, three grist and eleven saw mills, and produced from the crop of 1849: Eighty thousand bushels of wheat, thirty-two thousand bushels of oats, fifteen thousand bushels of peas, twenty-two thousand bushels of potatoes, eighteen thousand pounds of maple sugar, fourteen thousand pounds of wool, and fifteen thousand pounds of butter.

From the census returns of 1860 it appears that there were 57,989 acres held, 33,804 of which were under cultivation, and 24,185 wood and wild lands, the whole having a cash value of \$2,034,320. The crops of 1861 produced 183,601 bushels of wheat, being an average of over 19 bushels to the acre; 21,336 bushels of barley; 41613 bushels peas, 82,272 bushels of oats, 73,397 bushels of potatocs, 55,539 bushels of turnips, 18,037 pounds of maple sugar, 20,031 pounds of wool, 293,200 pounds of flax and hemp, 127,989 pounds of butter and 13,305 pounds of cheese.



# TOWNSHIP OF NASSAGAWEYA.

This township is bounded on the north by the township of Eramosa, County of Wellington, on the somth by the township of Nelson, on the east by the township of Esquesing, and on the west by the township of Flamboro' East, County of Wentworth. The township is about the size of the towship of Nelson, and in 1850 contained 1868 inhabitants. The land in the township is of excellent quality, and the timber, hardwood intermixed with pine. From the crop of 1849 there were produced 46,000 bushels of wheat, 27,000 bushels of oats, 20,000 bushels of potatoes, 17,000 bushels of turnips, 22,000 pounds of maple sugar, 8,000 pounds of wool, and 22,000 pounds of butter. In 1861 the township contained a population of 2800. From the census returns of the same year there appears to have been 343 occupiers of land. number of acres held 36,402, under cultivation 19,943, under crops 10-978, under pasture 8,652, under gardens and orchards 313 and wood and wild lands 16,459. The cash value of farms was \$887,204, of agricultural implements \$36,679. The number of acres under wheat 4,-441, producing 96,360 or nearly an average of 20 7-10 bushels to the acre, barley, 4,636 bushels, Rye, 17 bushels, peas, 28,407 bushels, oats, 52,686 bushels, buckwheat, 558 bushels, pot itoes, 47,620 bushels, turnips, 134, 526 bushels, hay 2,233 tons, Maple sugar 13,846 pounds, wool 11,710 pounds, flannel 4,251 yards, flax and hemp 3,701 pounds hutter 95,248 pounds and cheese 8,629 pounds.

#### TOWNSHIP OF NELSON.

The Township of Nelson is bounded on the North by Nassagaweya, on the South by Lake Ontario, on the East by Trafalgar, and on the West by the Township of Flamboro' East, County of Wentworth.

The Township commenced settling in 1807, and in 1817 it contained 68 inhabited houses and 476 inhabitants, two grist and three saw mills; in 1850 the population had increased to 3,792, and contained five grist and seventeen saw mills, and produced from the crop of 1849: 114,000 bushels of wheat, 13,000 bushels of barley, 35,000 bushels of oats, 16,000 bushels of peas, 16,000 bushels of potatoes, 9,000 bushels of turnips, 18,000 pounds of wool, and 41,000 pounds of butter.— From the census returns of 1861, the population had increased to 4,559. There were 374 occupiers of land, holding 43,302. produced 119,943 bushels of wheat, 30,070 bushels of barley, 467 bushels of rye, 39,126 bushels of peas, 58,472 bushels of oats, 7,279 bushels of buckwheat, 8,944 bushels of Indian corn, 49,493 bushels of potatoes, 74,250 bushels of turnips, 16,059 bushels of carrots, I1,455 Mangel Wurzel, 229 bushels of beans, 4,333 tons of hay, 15,649 pounds of maple sugar, 21,923 pounds of wool, flannel and fulled cloth, 5,642 yards, 4,985 pounds of flax and hemp, 152,066 pounds of butter and 4,488 pounds of cheese.

# TOWNSHIP OF TRAFALGAR.

This township is bounded on the north by Esquesing, south by Lake Ontario, east by the township of Toronto, and west by the Township of Nelson.

The township of Trafalgar commenced settling about the year 1807, when wild land was selling at seven shillings and six-pence per acre.—
In 1817 it contained 548 inhabitants, one grist and four saw-mills, and land had risen in value to twenty-two shilling per acre. In 1850 the population had increased to four thousand five hundred and thirteen; it contained three grist and nineteen saw-mills, and produced as per return of census 1860: 197,609 bushels of wheat, 54,451 bushels of barley, 1,570 bushels of Rye, 65,345 bushels of peas, 144,913 bushels

hels of oats, 20,090 bushels of buckwheat, 7,576 bushels of Indian corn, 70,886 bushels of potatoes, 20,511 bushels of turnips, 16,747 bushels of carrots, 2,773 bushels of mangel wurzel, 5,740 tons of hay, 7,136 pounds of maple sugar, 14.269 gallons of cider, 31,056 pounds of wool, 1,172 yards of fulled cloth, 7,716 yards of flannel, 15,536 pounds of flax and hemp, 151,511 pounds of butter, and 11,516 pounds of cheese.

The land through the township is generally rolling, of excellent quality, and the timber a mixture of various kinds of hardwood and pine.

There were in 1860, 595 occupiers of land, holding 64,909 acres, under cultivation 47,221, under crops 31,386 acres, under pasture 14,960 acres, under gardens and orchards 929 acres, and under wood and wild lands 17,688 acres. Population in 1860, 5846.
