## FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

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The Managers of the House of Industry beg to present herewith their Fifty-First Annual Report. After an existence of half a century, they do not consider that the charitable public of Toronto need be informed of many particulars over and above what have already appeared in previous reports. The care of the poor is everywhere attracting increased observation; and the Managers have endeavoured to avail themselves of such alterations in the mode of dispensing relief as seemed warranted by their own experience and by the experience of others. While it is some guarantee that so long a term of existence has been spent in affording relief on a plan somewhat their own, they hope to add to their usefulness by learning from the workings of other institutions.

With this view, some changes not quite so radical as may appear on paper, have been made during the past year, the principal being the division of the management into Committees, viz: a Committee on the Casual Poor, one on Associated Charities, and the Executive Committee. The reports of these Committees are incorporated herewith, and it is to be seen how far this sub-division of labour and responsibility will serve the general good. An important change has been the substitution of a daily distribution of relief from the House, instead of the former mode of relief by the weekly committee, on two days only.

A Committee was appointed last year to suggest amendments to the Act incorporating the House so as to put beyond doubt its capacity to take lands by devise, and in order that its work might be in harmony with its charter.

The amendment of the Session of 1887, did not, however, put the House in a much better position than it had been

as to the holding of land, and it failed to secure the main purpose for which the House petitioned. While power was properly given for the establishment and maintenance of an "infirmary and dispensary," there was added a power to grant "assistance to the casual poor," a work which has been a feature of this House for years. Almost every year some person approving of the work done by the House remembers it in his will; but it is extremely doubtful whether a legacy of lands or one in the shape of a mortgage could be availed of by the House as its Charter now stands.

Early in the year a Committee was appointed to revise and consolidate the By-laws, Rules, and Regulations of the House, and the convenience of having these in an available form will be appreciated. The matters upon which the general public may need to be informed are—the persons eligible for admission to the House, and for out-door relief, and the regulations as to the casual poor. These are as follows:

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#### I. PERSONS ELIGIBLE FOR ADMISSION INTO THE HOUSE.

(1) Persons whose age and infirmities render them incapable of providing for themselves, and who have no friends able and willing to support them.

(2) Persons in so weak a state of health (certified to by the Medical Officers of the House) as to unfit them for earning their own living.

(3) Orphans, deserted children, and children of persons who from poverty or sickness are unable to support them.

#### II. PERSONS INELIGIBLE FOR ADMISSION.

(1) Persons depraved in their morals, and whose general characters are bad.

(2) Persons who can support themselves with some assistance from the Institution.

(3) Persons with contagious disorders, or who require constant medical treatment or nursing.

(4) Persons affected in their minds, unless the Med-

ical Officers are of opinion that they may be received without inconvenience or danger.

(5) Strangers belonging to other municipalities.

### III. RELIEF TO CASUAL POOR.

(1) All persons who may apply at the Institution for the first time, or who shall present a request from the Mayor, or from any member of the Board, shall be received into the building erected for the shelter of casuals, and shall be furnished with a night's lodging and breakfast.

(2) The relief may be extended under the rules laid down by the Standing Committee of the House on Employment and Casual Poor.

### IV. PERSONS ELIGIBLE FOR OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

(1) Old and infirm persons, without any means, or friends able and willing to keep them.

(2) Persons in distress, who are unable to obtain sufficient employment, particularly widows with young families.

As regards the outdoor relief, nearly 200 families have been assisted during the past year, more than in the previous. A largely increased expenditure for coal, wood, bread, and groceries, has thus been required, as will be seen by the Treasurer's Report. The Managers have heretofore referred to the hardship of requiring the poor to come to the House for bread; they now have the satisfaction of reporting a successful arrangement in that matter. There are three "bread divisions," and the bread is distributed by ticket. The House itself takes the centre division, from the west side of Sherbourne Street to the east side of Spadina Avenue; east and west of those limits Mr. William Coulter, either by delivery or at his store—211 Gerrard Street—provides for the applicants. The Visitors are also supplied with bread tickets and orders for large or small packages of groceries for the sick poor. Visitors, under a regulation of this year, can grant "*immediate*" relief as follows;



(d) The duly appointed Visitors of the House shall have power to grant relief to applicants in their respective districts to the extent only of 600 lbs. of coal, or quarter cord of wood, and a weekly allowance of bread in the proportion of two pounds for each adult or child belonging to the family of such applicant, on their being satisfied that immediate relief is necessary, or that it is impracticable for the applicant to attend personally at the House ; also, in cases of sickness, the usual allowance of groceries. Further relief in such cases to be at the discretion of the Executive Trustee.

Of the \$16,000 applied by this House to the cause of the poor, some \$4,000 has been expended on bread, and \$6,000 on coal.

The Managers have this year tried the experiment of having one of their number in attendance at the House every day from two o'clock till five in the afternoon in order to distribute out-door relief to the applicants with as little delay as possible. This change from the Weekly Committee sitting twice a week for the whole day, is a decided improvement, and there is now very little chance of complaints as to delay in supplying coal and wood.

The homeless vagrant is still a problem for the ingenuity of the charitable. Notwithstanding what is occasionally seen in the newspapers to the contrary, the tramp takes kindly to the House of Industry :

The large number of tramps is not to be traced to the absence of any regulations made in their regard, but rather to the fact that we have experienced a long and exceptionally bitter season.

The House, in order to admit only proper persons, took the precaution this year to station a man at the gates to gain and report any information that might be of use. It may be said that very little has been thus gained, and the precaution

was tested only temporarily. The Managers do not see that they can do better than admit all comers who are sober and well behaved—leaving the test of the wood pile and the five-night limit to be renewed under other circumstances.

The Committee appointed in regard to the casual poor, had this subject of employment of casuals brought under the notice of the City Board of Works in the beginning of winter, and subsequently the matter was referred to the Board of this House, with the above result.

The Managers cannot say that the labor test has had a fair trial, because the House of Industry has not the facilities for such a test. It is not intended for such a purpose; and it is not equipped with such an object in view. In order to free the city from the great number of tramps seeking its hospitality, the Managers must either be enabled to engage these unfortunates at some continuous undertaking and keep them at it, or empowered to take the necessary proceedings to lodge them in the Central Prison, where they will be compelled to work.

The number of inmates in the House continues much the same. The comfort of the female portion has been increased by a substantial and thoughtful donation of the Treasurer, Mr. Scott, of thirty good feather pillows.

The Executive Committee has provided a new dietary, and under it the inmates will have no reasonable ground of complaint. Arrangements have also been made by this Committee as to religious services in the House.

The Consumers Gas Company have sent their usual donation of 1,000 bushels of coke—a gift which is always welcome.

The Managers, while desiring to remember those who are mindful of this House in their charity, regret that in mentioning the name of Mr. James Fleming, they recall one whose death has occurred since the last report—one who was an earnest and charitable member of their Board. Mr. Fleming left the House \$500 by his will, and the Managers record their

appreciation of his thoughtfulness. A like gift of \$500 has been generously bestowed upon the House in a Charitable bequest of the late Mr. Bowman.

No building of any kind has been done this year. The sanitary condition of the premises is excellent, and is reported by the Health Officer as highly creditable to this institution.

The project of our Infirmary has been referred to a Committee, but as yet nothing has been definitely reported.

The appeal made in the last report for more reading matter for the inmates has been met in some degree by a number of Magazines from a Member of the Board, but as yet the newspaper on file has not received any addition.

The thanks of the Managers are due to Mrs. and Mr. North, and Miss North, for their care in the management of the House.

The comparative relief in this and last year is shewn in an accompanying table; also the reports of the other Officers of the institution.

**MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT, 1887.**

There has been a good deal of sickness in the House during the past winter, consisting of severe colds, and diseases incident to old age and broken constitutions, but very little if any, attributable to unsanitary conditions of the Institution.

Thirteen persons have died in the House up to date, and three among the casuals; all from chronic diseases of very long standing. Those in the House averaged  $73\frac{1}{4}$  years of age, while the three casuals averaged 57 years each.
