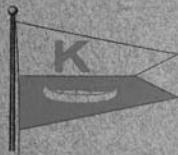

THE KAWARTHA LAKES

(Indian for Bright Waters and Happy Lands)



TOWARD the middle of September, 1615, Samuel de Champlain, having passed up the Ottawa, across to Lake Nipissing, down Georgian Bay and inland to Orillia, decided to lead the Huron Indians on a warlike expedition against the Iroquois of New York State. Accordingly the party, numbering about two hundred canoes, set out. They traversed Lake Simcoe, and, quoting from Parkman, "The Huron fleet pursued its course along Lake Simcoe, across the 'portage' to Balsam and Sturgeon Lake, and down the chain of lakes which form the sources of the Trent River. As the long line of canoes moved on its way no human life was seen, no sign of friend or foe; yet at times to the fancy of Champlain, the borders of the stream seemed decked with groves and shrubbery by the hands of man, and the butternut trees, laced with grapevines, seemed decorations for a pleasure-ground."

The chain of lakes which comprise this region lies north of Peterborough and Lindsay, and is composed of Lakes Katchewanooka, Clear, Stoney, Buckhorn, Chemong, Pigeon, Bald, Sturgeon, Cameron and Balsam, with a magnificent steamer route of 70 miles from Lakefield to Cobocouk. They are situated in the counties of Victoria and Peterborough, and combine the wildest primeval granite mountain and forest scenery with lovely grassy, shrub-and-vine-clad shores. Many of the lakes are dotted with islands, on which pretty and comfortable homes have been erected for their summer tenants, and throughout the chain the tourist is at no point remote from busy town or village, or humble cottage home, and yet is in comparative seclusion.

scenery, the calm pastoral of Sturgeon; the romantic rocky islands of Stony, with their deep shores; the fine bathing of Balsam and Cameron, and the picturesque beauty of the lakes further north, coupled with the unsurpassed fishing and boating along the entire chain, lend to these waters an attraction and a charm.

(The Gem of the Kawartha Lakes)



IT goes without saying that on all counts Stoney Lake is far and away the most picturesque and attractive of this galaxy of earthly paradises. It has been well named the "Miniature Thousand Islands," its eight hundred rocky verdure clad islands that abruptly thrust themselves out of the deep brown waters having an even greater charm than their larger prototypes in the St. Lawrence. The lake itself is about ten miles long by perhaps two miles wide at its widest part, being indented with bays and fed by a number of streams bringing in the overflow of numerous smaller lakes farther back. A writer, in describing Stoney Lake, says :—"Stoney Lake combines all the grandeur, all the intricate beauty, all the luxuriant vegetation of the islands of the St. Lawrence ; and travellers who speak from experience have unhesitatingly declared the scenery of this lake to equal, if not surpass, in its own delightful character, the far-famed beauties of the Swiss and Italian Lakes.

A moonlight sail through the maze of Stoney Lake is one of the most fascinating sights imaginable, and leaves an undying memory of weird and delicate beauty. The matchless glory of a summer sunset, the last rays flooding the silvery water with a ruddy tinge and touching every verdant islet and massive boulder with a wand of gold ; the tree-lined shores, dark and mysterious, rising from the shadowy water ; the intermittent gleam of a camp-fire seen at intervals through the dark trees, with the silhouettes of the campers standing out, sharply defined, against the glow ; the hoarse call of some preying night-bird as it darts, arrow-like, across the darkened sky ; the hush, the mysterious stillness of a twilight on Stoney Lake lifts one far above all thought of the cares and worries of this life, and the soul for one brief hour communes with the very spirit of Nature in all its enchanting loveliness."

the store and pavilion on Juniper Island, McCracken's Landing, Breezes, Julian's Landing, Boshink, Burleigh Falls, at all of which the steamers call.

The great depth of the lake in some parts is a matter of some astonishment, it being said that two hundred feet of line have failed to touch bottom in some places. It abounds with the best game fish, the principal being the lordly muskionge or muskalinge and the gamey black bass. There are also plenty of salmon trout, but these so far do not seem to be capable of allurements by methods adopted elsewhere. In the fall they may be seen in great numbers at "Boshink" upon what are known as the beds or shoals, spawning. The usual "small fry" may be found in great abundance anywhere in Stoney Lake, and whitefish are caught in great numbers when "running" in the full of the October moon. At almost any rocky point or in any secluded spot between the islands, good muskionge or bass fishing may be found.

Few people really know the great beauty and charm of Stoney Lake who have spent merely their summers there. To fully appreciate its grandeur one must see it in the delicate robes of spring, when the myriad hosts of birds of varied plumage make

its shores and shady dells fairly ring with song. Then, too, when autumn has touched into crimson and gold its silent woodland, and the frosty air and azure skies throw into relief the sparkling waters as they are parted by the gliding canoe, and "all the air a solemn stillness holds," the effect is indescribably impressive. Nature in all her moods and tenses may be studied to the very best advantage on this her native heath.

THE CANOE RACE



IN AND ABOUT STONEY LAKE



FOR pleasure and sport one does not require to go beyond Stoney Lake itself. There are a dozen points of interest that may be made objects of special expeditions. At the head of the lake will be found "Jack's Creek," a rivulet emptying into Stoney Lake after a sinuous course from Jack's Lake, some twenty miles north; while on the north shore, not so far east, may also be found Eels' Creek, another stream which, like Jack's Creek, may be navigated for some distance up by canoe. Both are favorite spots for picnic parties and well worth the paddle, the "shore dinner" finding ready appetites after the exercise.

On the south shore is Gilchrist's Bay, at the further extremity of which is another creek leading into White Lake, where excellent black bass fishing will be found. A short, easy portage is made from Stoney Lake to the creek, below the falls. One day

is sufficient for any of these trips, an afternoon for the last. If the sportsman is keen and does not mind a little trouble, he will find his way to Lake Koshkabogamog, a little beyond White Lake, but he will need a guide. A favorite spot for bass fishing is just below Burleigh Falls, which is about two miles west of Juniper Island, or Perry's Chute, a few minutes' paddle beyond where the Burleigh Locks open into Stoney Lake. From Winsor's Landing, just west of Mount Julian, a portage of three miles over a good road will land the canoeist at Big Cedar Lake, where a splendid day's bass fishing may be enjoyed, and return made to Stoney Lake the same evening. Above Burleigh Falls are Lovesick Lake and Deer Bay, the best fishing ground for maskinonge in the district. A day spent here is well worth while. Guides may be obtained at Burleigh Falls. A canoe trip not often

taken, but full of adventure, is from Long Lake down through Deer Bay Creek into Deer Bay and back to Stony Lake. The canoes are transported easily from Julian's Landing by wagon to Long Lake, about 20 miles. Starting with Long Lake the passage is made through Loucks Lake, Slop-log Lake and Deer Bay Creek. The trip is not a very arduous one although there are one or two long portages. When the water is good it is all right, but in extremely dry weather the trip is not

very inviting. There is good paddling to Lovesick Locks (2 miles from Burleigh Falls) or to Buckhorn (8 miles), and the enthusiast will find Chemong or Bobcaygeon none too much for his muscle if he is inclined to do a little camping out.

A favorite trip is to the Blue Mountain, at the head of Stony Lake, where are situated the mica mines, combining a climb with a good paddle.

A stage connects daily at Julian's Landing with Apsley, Coe Hill and a number of inland lakes.

OBJECTS AND AIMS

THE objects sought by the formation of the Association are protection of property and the comfort and pleasure of its members while on the lakes.

The first of these objects is attained by the prosecution of offenders who interfere with property.

The others are attained by arranging for church and other services, regattas, bonfires, concerts, dances, etc.

The protection and propagation of fish and game have had the attention of the Association. Parent fish have, on several occasions, been placed in the lake by the Provincial Government, on the solicitation of the Association, and it is proposed to follow up what has already been done in this direction still more vigorously.

The Association has also used its influence in having the transportation facilities conform to the conveniences of the members. It has also used its influence with the municipal authorities in order to have a proper tax rate for non-residents imposed.

The building and the maintenance of wharves at headquarters, and the providing of clergymen for conducting services on the Lord's Day, are also arranged for by the Association.

All visitors, whether property-owners or not, are requested to register their names, together with the names of their party, the name of their cottage and the name of their yacht, if they possess one.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

Cottagers and others are respectfully requested to give diligent attention to the following suggestions and regulations. Only by courteous and prompt recognition of the obligations and assistance in promoting the mutual welfare can the comfort and profit of all concerned be secured and conserved.

Divine Service.—Service will be held at the Pavilion, Juniper Island, every Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. The service will be made as interdenominational as possible by the selection of officiating clergymen from the various evangelical denominations.

Loitering or talking outside the pavilion, or in other ways interfering with the decorum of the hour and place will not be tolerated.

A song service will be held each Sunday evening at the Pavilion at 7.30 o'clock. Please do not take away the hymn books.

HELPFUL SUGGESTIONS

FLAGS

This is a British country and the British flag should be flown at the top of the flagstaff on shore and where a foreign emblem is displayed it is a matter of national courtesy and good taste that it should be below the flag of the Country. When flown from a vessel the British flag should always be flown from the stern, and when a foreign flag is used it is only proper to fly it from the bow, thus indicating the nationality of the owner.

A flag flown upside down always indicates distress and a call for assistance.

A flag flown any distance from the top is at "half-mast," and indicates death.

The proper flag to be flown on all ordinary occasions is the Canadian red ensign.

A white flag at the topmast is a signal for the boat to call and should only be used for this purpose.

CONCERTS AND HOPS

All are invited to make these as enjoyable as possible by participating and by keeping them as free as possible from objectionable features. The pavilion will be closed at 11 p.m., except by special permission.

LAUNCHES AND BOATS

Launches, yachts or boats must not tie up to the landing wharf, but must be moored or anchored elsewhere. The canoe wharf is for canoes and boats, and a passage of at least three feet must be kept at the water's edge. All launches are required to carry regulation lights and whistles. It is suggested that launches may promote attendance at services, regattas, etc., by offering to tow boats and canoes from a distance.

UNSEEMLY CONDUCT

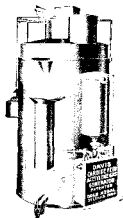
Attention is called to the fact that the discharging of firearms is strictly contrary to the municipal regulations and subject to fine. So also is the blowing of horns or the making of disturbing noises at night, and the police authorities are instructed to prosecute offenders to the utmost. Screaming or disorderly conduct of any kind will not be tolerated, and those interested in the good name and well-being of the community are asked to co-operate in putting down everything that is unseemly.

SANITATION

Stoney Lake is one of the most healthy and pleasant places in this fair Dominion. With many people the only water supply must necessarily be the lake itself. Let it be kept free from any contamination of every kind. Garbage and refuse should be burned. Closets overhanging the water and sewage drained into the lake are contrary to the Public Health Act. Please assist in promoting the abolition of unsanitary conditions.

ROWING AND PADDLING RULES

1. The word "boat" in these rules shall include boat and canoe, and the word "Committee" shall mean the Regatta Committee.

2. The Committee may handicap any boat or contestant, or place the same in a position for starting in rear of the starting line, at whatever distance he sees fit.

3. All entries must be handed to the Secretary of the Committee within such time before the race as the Committee directs.

4. All canoe races, unless otherwise specified, shall be paddled with single blades only. No outriggers or sliding seats shall be allowed in boats.

For the open single canoe race, canoes shall not be more than 16 feet long, nor less than 28 inches beam, and 10 inches deep. No limit on weight.

For canoe fours, canoes must not exceed 20 feet in length, nor be less than 30 inches wide, and 12 inches deep, and must weigh not less than 70 pounds.

For the paddling upset race, no special appliances shall be used, and the race shall be run as follows: On a signal being given during the race, the canoe must be turned completely over, and the contestant must cross the finishing line paddling in his canoe. Any variation from the above by a contestant shall disqualify him.

Combination race shall be run as follows: Contestant to start paddling with both knees down;

on first gun to stand up and paddle; second gun, to jump out and swim, towing canoe; third gun, re-enter canoe and finish race paddling on gun-wale.

5. In case at the time a race is called there shall not be more than one entry, the Committee may cancel such race, or postpone the same to such time as it may announce.

6. A first prize shall be given in each race, and a second prize in each regular event when more than two start; but no contestant shall be eligible to compete in any further event after winning two races, unless otherwise decided by the Regatta Committee.

This rule shall not apply to open races.

7. Races shall be started by the starter asking "Are you ready?" On receiving no answer, a shot shall be fired. If the starter considers the start unfair, he may recall the boats, and any boat refusing to start again can claim no position.

8. A boat's own water is the straight course assigned it at starting. Any boat leaving its own water does so at its peril, but if the stern of one boat is a boat's length ahead of the bow of another, the former may take the water of the latter, which

then becomes its own water, and it shall only leave it at its peril.

9. All races of more than a quarter mile shall be held with a turn, and stake boats or buoys will be left on the port hand, i. e., the rower's right hand, and the paddler's left hand.

10. No direction from any boat, or from the shore, will be allowed, and anyone accepting such assistance may be disqualified.

11. A boat touching a buoy or other boat, unless wrongfully compelled to do so by another boat, may be disqualified.

12. If a boat, in consequence of a violation of any rule, shall foul another boat, or compel another boat to foul any boat, buoy or obstruction, or to run aground, it shall be disqualified.

13. Every boat shall abide by its own accidents.

14. The Committee shall, without protest, disqualify any boat which, to its knowledge, has committed a breach of these rules.

15. In the event of any case arising which is not covered by these rules, the rules of the American Canoe Association and the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen shall respectively govern.

FISHING REGULATIONS

FISHING SEASON OPENS JUNE 16

Fishing.—Ont. Stat. 63, Vic. Ch. 50, prohibits catching Bass less than 10 inches, Maskinonge 30 inches, Pickerel 15 inches, Brook Trout 6 inches. Undersized fish must be returned to the water.

Tourists or summer visitors may only take when leaving the Province, after obtaining permit from Inspector, the lawful catch of two days.

Penalties for violation of the law, not less than \$10, or more than \$50. Imprisonment in default of payment.

Fires.—Making fires from May 1st to October 1st, render parties liable in damages arising from negligence. When leaving camp, carefully extinguish fire.

Trees.—Cutting trees on islands or lands of others is trespass and renders trespasser liable in damage.

Yachts must carry lights at night and should be equipped with whistle or loud horn for signals.

One Day's Fishing.—8 Bass, 12 Pickerel, 4 Maskinonge, Brook Trout, 10 lbs., or 30 fish.

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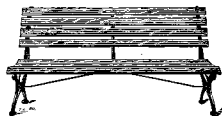
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
