The Grange contains a notable permanent collection of works of art; and in addition there are nearly always to be found exhibits from the hands of Canadian or foreign artists.

Museum


If you are interested in the outline of human activity, from pre-historic times to the post-bellum period, visit the Royal Ontario Museum on Bloor Street. The collection there represents for the intellectually curious an almost complete survey of civilization. The Chinese section is of particular interest.

Hart-House

Because Hart House is unique, both in function and form, it is well worth the attention of out-of-town visitors. In elaboration of equipment and beauty of architecture, it is scarcely to be surpassed on the American continent. This beautiful Gothic building, the men students' union of the University of Toronto, was the gift to Toronto of The Honorable Vincent Massey, Canadian Minister at Washington.









GOLF

For those who have brought their golf clubs and would like a round of golf there are 20 courses available. The private courses require introduction by a member, but on the others you may pay as you play.

PRIVATE COURSES

Toronto, Lakeview, Mississauga and Lake Shore, on Hamilton Highway; Lambton and Islington, on Dundas Highway; Oakdale, Weston and Thistletown, at Weston; York Down's, up Bathurst; Rosedale, Thornhill, Bayview, Uplands and Summit, up Yonge Street; Scarborough, Cedarbrook and Hunt Club, out Kingston Road.

SWIMMING

Excellent accommodation for swimming can be had at Sunnyside Beach and if the lake is too cool, there is a heated pool. Other pools are located at St. Clair Ave. (Crangs) and Bloor W. at High Park (High Park Swimming Club).

BASEBALL

The baseball stadium is situated on Fleet Street just west of Bathurst. The best approach is over the Spadina Bridge or via Fleet Street from Bay Street. If the professional team is out of town, there is a semi-professional league at Hampden Park on Shaw and good amateur games can be seen at Viaduct, Greenwood and Willowdale Parks. Nearly every evening at Sunnyside one can see the Ladies' Soft Ball League in action, where some fast and interesting games are played.

LACROSSE

The Canadian National Game can be seen practically every Saturday afternoon, either at Hampden Park or Weston. This would be especially interesting to visitors who have never seen a game of lacrosse.

SOCCER

Some very exciting games of Soccer can be seen usually on Saturday afternoon at the Varsity Stadium on Bloor St., or at Greenwood Park.

BOATING

Canoes and Row Boats can be rented at Sunnyside Beach, at the Humber, and the Island. Those interested in Yacht racing will occasionally see some very interesting races on Toronto Bay, the home of the Royal Canadian, Queen City and National Yacht Clubs. There is speed boat racing very frequently in the evening at Sunnyside.









Toronto, according to statistics, is one of the healthiest places in America.



INFORMATION FOR VISITORS

Tickets for Sight-Seeing Tours can be obtained from Ryrie-Birks, and the buses stop at the door.

Street cars stop at white poles. Street car fare 7 cents cash, 4 tickets for 25 cents. Night fare 10 cents.

Automobiles must stop behind street cars, and observe parking regulations. Speed limit in city 20 miles per hour, in country 35 miles per hour.

Postage rates are as follows:

To the United States or in Canada: post cards and letters, 2 cents.

Canadian stamps must be used. Letters with American stamps are sent to Dead Letter Office.

Canada Steamship Docks at foot of Yonge St. Ferry Docks at foot of York St.

The United States Consulate is located on the 4th floor of the Bank of Hamilton building, corner of Yonge and Colborne Sts.

The Board of Trade is in the Royal Bank Building at King and Yonge Sts., and the Ontario Motor League is in the Lumsden Building, Yonge and Adelaide Sts.

The Toronto Convention and Tourist Association is located at the Hotel Waverley, 488 Spadina Ave.
