## EDITORIAL.

It was gratifying to see a little interest awakened in connection with the election. This spirit should grow so that no office from the president down can be secured without keen competition. Our Association will grow stronger if we have men elected who are honored by being selected from a number of capable candidates. We welcome the new members on the executive, and trust they will add the necessary impetus to make the season of 1920 the best ever enjoyed.

We have been pleased with the commendation of last year's illustrated weekly both from our members as well as from people in no way connected with our Island home. Now we want to make this year's fifty per cent. better. One way to do it—and that is for every individual who has photographs of general interest to hand them to the secretary, Mr. Howard. Do this at once, as the issue must be published shortly.

The one great lack of our Association is a new clubhouse. Our sailors are

without quarters. We must meet this need or else we will miss the boys—and our loss will be the gain of those clubs which have suitable accommodations. It can be said that such a move is, at the present time, foreign to the sailing members, as there are some sixty who have agreed to take canoe or dinghy racks, but continued disregard of their wants will naturally drive them elsewhere. This rental would ensure quite a revenue in itself and form the nucleus of a large income.

In addition to the aquatic life, there is our dancing. The shelter is entirely too small for the Tuesday evening attendance. The world, as you know, is dance crazy, and our little Island has not escaped the germ. Almost any evening of the week a number of Wardites wend their way to Centre or Hanlan's. We should satisfy their desire at home. With a large smooth floor, surrounded by wide verandahs, built over the canoe and dinghy racks, we could run a number of dances each week. These would be large revenue makers, even with our small charge. In addition to the dance, we could take care of all other entertainments in a wholesome manner.

Judging from the receipts of our present dance, and taking into consideration the income for rack and locker space, there should be no hesitation on the part of anyone to endorse this proposition heartily. A twelve thousand dollar clubhouse will pay for itself in six years, if not before. It is no bubble chase; it is a certainty.

A modern and up-to-date clubhouse would give new life to our aquatic sports. It would augment our present high standing among the various clubs in the city. Our local water events would increase in interest and become one of the most prominent features of the season. The junior members would

have one more clean and healthy sport at their command, which means our future standing in the athletic world on water. Let us remember that we owe the boys a start towards proper manhood, and it has been proven that healthy exercise is a lad's greatest help in this direction. For the welfare of the Island as well as our Association, let us have a new clubhouse, and let it be erected and ready for use in the spring of 1920.
