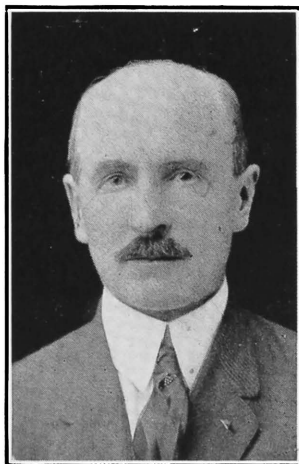
While as an Executive Committee we have no

*Rules adopted at the General Meeting
held at Centre Island*

1. A batted ball alighting within the diamond between home-plate and first, or home-plate and third, then rolling into foul territory, to be declared "Foul Ball."

A muffed fly to be judged entirely by the spot the player stands in making the attempt.

2. Infield fly with runners on first and second—batter is out.

3. Runners may attempt one base only for any overthrow into foul territory.

4. Players must be Island residents for at least two weeks prior to any game in which they participate.

5. Pitching box to measure 40'; bases 60'.

6. Batter out if catcher misses third strike providing the bases are full and no more than one out.

7. Foul strike shall be called when batter is hit by batted ball while in box.

8. When runner leaves base too soon he shall be sent back, the ball considered dead and the play reverting back to the same position as before.

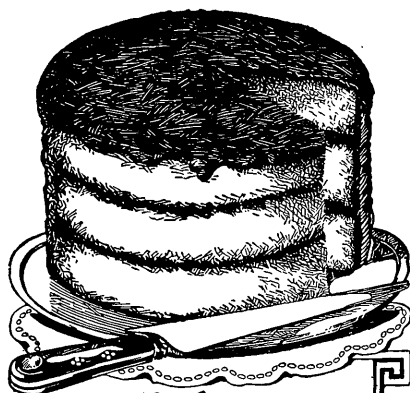

$\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter, 1 cup sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 2 eggs, mix $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon soda with $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sweet milk, mix $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons cocoa with 4 teaspoons hot water, 1 teaspoon vanilla, pinch of salt. Mix yolks, butter and sugar; add milk, soda, flour and salt; beaten whites of eggs last. Use a cocoa or colored icing for filling and cover cake with same.
