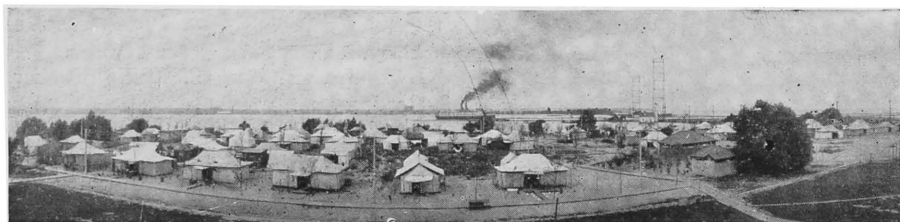

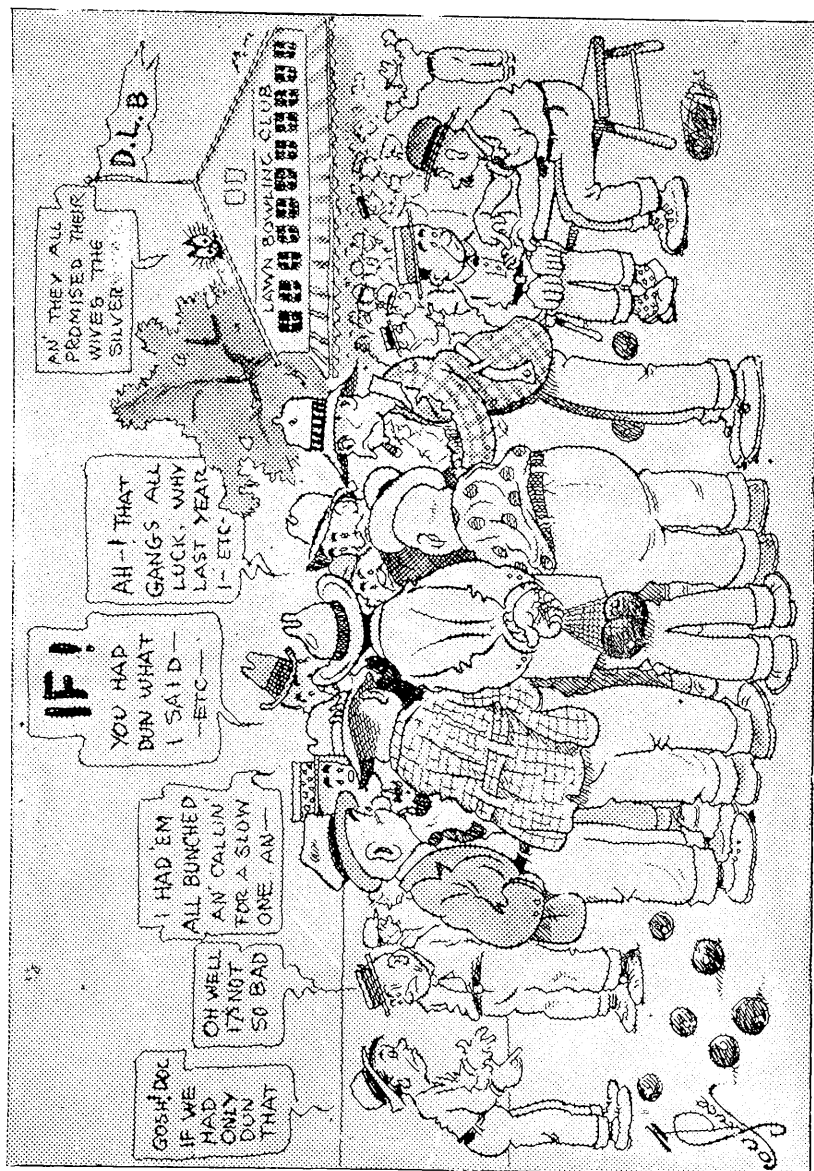
Gentle reader, we admit that we came to rather an anticlimax. Yes, this edi-
