



INTER-ISLAND

During the last week end a meeting of the Inter-Island League was held in the Casino at Centre Island. Representatives from the three Islands attended, together with President A. Inglis, Honorary Presidents F. Ward, and Mr. Jackson, F. Reed, Secretary-Treasurer. The following officers were unanimously elected for the season of 1921: Hon.-Pres., Frank Ward (Ward's); Hon.-Pres., Mr. Jackson (Centre); Hon.-Pres., A. P. Inglis (Ward's); Pres., Geo. Williams (Hanlan's); Vice-Pres., R. W. Clewlo (Ward's); Secy.-Treas. (Pro-Tem.) Mr. Jackson (Centre).

Plans for the season were discussed during which Fred Reed as Secretary ventured the suggestion that more teams should be secured in order to avoid byes and provide Saturday games for the many players now available but forced to remain idle for lack of accommodation, all of which has a tendency to create some dissatisfaction and a loss of interest. An attempt was then made to form a six team league composed of two teams from each Island, but a motion to that effect failed, Hanlan's and Centre dissenting, claiming insufficient material. With players for a Four Team League at both Islands the actions and arguments of their representatives at this meeting appear somewhat inconsistent to facts, Mr. Ward then moved to have a second team entered from Ward's where there is an abundance of material to form a Four Team League, but this met with very strenuous opposition from the two other Islands. We hope, however,

to have more favorable news for you on the subject before the next issue.

The entrance fee was this year increased to \$15.00 which each team is required to deposit with the Secretary-Treasurer before the League opens.

Your representatives put forth every argument possible to secure accommodation for the talent in excess of one team available on this Island, and while we regret to report little success to date will continue their efforts until satisfactory arrangements are completed.

HOME BREWS

The week ending June 24th has furnished many surprises and a few changes in our League standing with Sam Clark's Tigers in the lead, and Otazell and Iron Dukes trailing close. Bart. Wright's Brownies still favor the cellar position, and had it not been for his win this week over Elks (also in the cellar) we might have ventured the thought that he was training for the drought to follow July 18th. 

Considerable outlay has been made by the Association to date in the purchase of bats, balls and other equipment while a very small percentage of the players have so far joined the Association. Your executive representative has therefore been obliged to ask the Captains to report that each member of his team has joined the Association, this report to be filled not later than the 9th of July. Efficiency Flags will be presented the team captains as soon as all their players are registered.

Equipment: Heretofore, bats, balls, etc., have been under the direct care of the Baseball Manager, requiring that he or some member of his family remain at home at all times in order that the boys may be furnished with equipment whenever required. This arrangement has not always worked satisfactorily, and in order to place the equipment at the disposal of the players at all times, a locker has been secured, the location of which will be announced later. This will be padlocked with a key furnished each Captain and the Baseball Manager. Your Captains have agreed to assume responsibility for the return to the locker of all equipment after a game or practice and solicit the co-operation of each and every player to give the new system a fair trial.

We have endeavored to arrange the players, games, etc., in a manner that will furnish the best sport for the players and entertainment for the spectators. If, however, you feel any one player or feature of the game is being overlooked or neglected, please do not hesitate to bring it to the attention of the Baseball Manager. He will welcome any suggestion you have to offer for the improvement of the game in general.

Bob Clewlo has requested that we convey his appreciation of co-operation received to date from all concerned in baseball. He is endeavoring to give us the best baseball season we have ever had.

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
