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BASEBALL.

With the Grand Opening of the baseball season all set for the last Friday in June—June 29th—we will soon be able to sing, "Happy Days Are Here Again."

And if the players and fans all get pulling together, and back up the Baseball Committee, it's going to be a bigger and better season than ever—even surpassing the good old days, 'way back when, etc., etc.

Bill Wickett was elected last Fall as Baseball Chairman of the W.I.A. for 1934—and immediately got busy. Plans are coming along rapidly and he has put Ken Barnes and Reg. Abraham (better known as "Walter") on his Committee. Bill is Managing Director, and his past record in Island Baseball has proven him to be one of the best. Ken is keeper of the "Strong Box," and will see that all the equipment, bases, bats, etc., is arranged for at every game. Walter will compile the batting and fielding averages from the official box scores, and write up the baseball column for the "Weekly." An official scorer is being appointed — announcement shortly.

Mr. Potter, of the Parks Department, who has long been a good friend of ours, has agreed to look after the grounds, and guarantees we will have one of the fastest diamonds in Toronto or vicinity. The whole playing field will be gone

over—the diamond resurfaced and the outfield raised and graded, to prevent "puddles" after heavy rains. City surveyors will measure out the infield, thus eliminating all arguments as to distances. Every Wednesday and Saturday the first and third base foul lines will be freshly chalked out, and every afternoon before a game, seats placed along first and third base lines for the fans. A new screen backstop cannot be secured this year, as it has not been included in the Park Board's estimates, but the present one is being repaired and put into first-class condition, making it one of the best in Toronto district. Altogether, it's a big order, but Mr. Potter stands ready to give baseball on Ward's Island a big boost.

Four teams will again operate—Otazel, Dingbats, Osoeze and Brownies. Jack Smith and Harry King, good old reliables, are with us again, ready to lead teams in the race for the Island championship. Bob McGinnis cannot get to the Island this year, and Phat Millar feels pressure of business will not permit his again acting as captain. We regret these two, who have so faithfully captained teams for years past are unable to continue. But Ossie Moore has been chosen to captain Dingbats, and Ad Hillock has been chosen for Otazels. Jack Smith again leads the Osoeze team, and Harry King

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claims the Brownies are his forever.

The schedule for the season will soon be released, and after each game will appear the names of the umpires to officiate. All players and umpires should place these schedules in their mirrors—and resolve to be on duty every time as scheduled.

Batting and fielding averages will be kept on every player—the leaders, such as the Big Six—published every week, and awards, possibly a cup, made at the end of the season—one to the leading batter, one to the leading fielder.

All who wish to play are requested to hand in their names, stating the position played, to one of the committee, as noted below. All names handed in will be drawn for when the Captains and Committee meet this week. We want all with us who would like to play. We will find a team for you, and then you go to it, and work for a regular berth. Young players will be given every opportunity to make good.

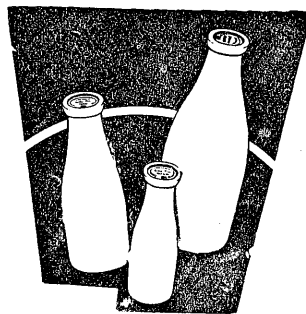
Inter-Island baseball will again proceed—let Ward's Island set out to retain the cup lost last year. Details should be ready to announce shortly.

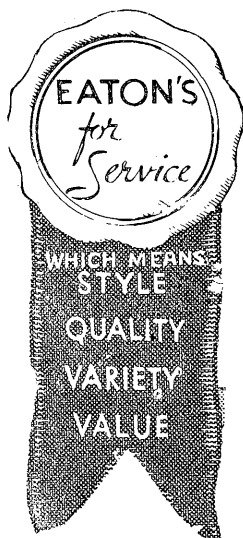
