



PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

was discovered on St. John's Day, 1497. by Sebastian Cabot, who named it in honor of that saint. By an act of the Colonial Legislature it received the name it now bears in 1798, "to perpetuate the grateful remembrance of that peculiarly auspicious and happy period of the island having been under the command of Lieutenant-General H. R. H. Prince Edward," Duke of Kent, who was also at the head of the forces in Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, and Newfoundland. From its fair agricultural capabilities, the island is not unfrequently styled "the garden of British North America." It is about 140 miles long, 30 in average breadth, and contains an area of 1,250,000 acres of land, nearly all of which is capable of cultivation. It is well wooded and watered, largely intersected with roads, and indented with numerous bays and harbors. Scarcely any part of the country is more than 10 or 12 miles from a shipping place. The surface is level or undulating, the highest hill not exceeding 400 feet, and the verdure in summer closely resembles that of Ireland. The soil, a light red loam, is naturally fertile, easily worked, and when properly manured, yields abundant crops. The climate—cold and bracing in winter, warm and pleasant in June, July, August, September, and October-is favourable to health and longevity. Bright clear skies prevail throughout the year. Fogs are all but unknown. As a resort for summer visitors the island offers many attractions. The scenery in many places is very fine. At Rustico, Stanhope, and elsewhere on the north shore, excellent surf bathing may be had. The rivers and harbors abound with mackerel and trout. Salmon, too, are caught at Bedeque, Morell, and Winter Brant, geese, ducks, plover, and snipe are abundant, River. and with partridge, woodcock, and rabbit offer recreation and pleasure for the lover of field sports. An act was passed in 1871, by the Legislature, authorizing the construction of a line of railway from Alberton to Georgetown, with branch lines to Souris (east) and Tignish (west.) The road is 197 miles in length, and became the property of the general government of Canada in December, 1874. The island entered confederation on July 1st, 1873.

CHARLOTTETOWN,

the capital of the island, is pleasantly situated on a short neck of land between the North and Hillsborough Rivers. It contains a population of (say) 10,000 souls, whose civic affairs are managed by a mayor, stipendiary Magistrate, and ten common councillors, with a police force. It is well laid



out, the streets being very wide, and crossing each other at right angles. It has five squares, in one of which stands the Colonial Building, St. Paul's Church, the County Market House, the Law Courts and General Post Office. At the western end of the city is Government House, a twostory wooden structure, fronting the harbor, and Government Farm, containing about 75 acres of land. Georgetown, the capital of King's County, and Summerside, the commercial capital of Prince County, are seaport towns.

PLACES OF INTEREST IN AND AROUND CHARLOTTETOWN.

THE STREETS

of Charlottetown are wide and spacious, and are laid out at right angles. Queen Street and Water Street are the principal thoroughfarcs, and with Queen Square contain most of the Mercantile Establishments.

MARKET, OR QUEEN SQUARE,

facing on Queen Street, between Richmond and Grafton Streets, is in no sense of the word a Park or a place of recreation. On it stands the Market House, a large two-story building, (which is opened daily, (sundays excepted,) for the sale of all kinds of country produce, meats, fish, &c.) The upper story is called the "Market Hall," and is the largest in the city. On the same square are the Post Office, Provincial Building, New Law Courts, and St. Paul's (Episcopal) Church, the latter facing on Prince Street.

KING SQUARE

lies on the line of Kent Street, between Hillsborough and Weymouth Streets. It is fenced in, and many ornamental trees have been planted in it, but it is not used as yet as place of promenade.

HILLSBOROUGH PARK

is in the line of Richmond Street, is much larger than King Square, and like it, lies between Hillsborough and Weymouth Streets. It is laid off in paths which cross it at right angles, and diagonally, and has in the centre a platform for the use of the band.

PROVINCIAL BUILDING.

This fine edifice is situated on Queen Square, at the Junction of Great George Street. It was built of Nova

Scotia Freestone, in 1847. Within it will be found the Chambers of the Legislature, the Legislative Library, and many of the Government Offices. The walls of the House of Assembly are adorned with portraits of the speakers and some of the prominent politicians. The Library is well stocked with valuable books, and in the corridor are artistically arranged a superior collection of native birds. From the top of the building a magnificent view of the rivers and surrounding country may be obtained.

THE POST OFFICE

Building is situated on Queen Square. The building is a three-story brick structure, faced with mastic, and is a credit to the city. The internal arrangements are good and modern. In another place the reader will find a table giving the time of closing and receiving the mails to and from the principal points.

THE SAVING'S BANK

is to be found in the Post Office Building, on Queen Square. Open daily, (Saturdays excepted,) from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m.

THE BANK OF P. E. ISLAND.

This edifice was built, by the Stockholders, in 1867, and is of Brick. Capital \$120,000. It was incorporated in 1856. Judge Hensley, President; J. R. Brecken, Cashier.

THE UNION BANK.

The building owned and occupied by this institution, is on the corner of Great George and Richmond Streets. It is built of Brick, and is three stories high. Capital \$146,000. Chas. Palmer, President; George McLeod, Cashier.

THE MERCHANTS BANK


occupies part of the three-story brick building, located on Water Street, between Great George and Queen Streets. It was incorporated in 1871. Capital 150,000. Robert Longworth, President; William McLean, Cashier.

THE MERCHANTS BANK OF HALIFAX

has a branch in Charlottetown, under the management of Owen Connolly. It occupies part of the Brick Building on Dorchester Street, a few doors from Queen Street, which is owned by the agent.

THE NEW LAW COURTS

is situated on Queen Square. It is a fine two-story Brick structure. A few of the local public offices are situated in this



building. The Court Room, in which the *Nisi prius* sittings of the Supreme Court and the sittings of the County Court are held is large and lofty. A large illuminated clock adorns the western end of the building.

THE JAIL,

which is situated on Pownal Square, between Richmond and Sydney Streets, is a three-story wooden building, looking very much in character with the purpose for which it was built. It has lately been enlarged.

THE PUBLIC HOSPITAL


is situated at the entrance to the harbor, about three miles from the city. As contagious diseases are all but unknown on our healthy Island, its use is seldom applied for.

THE LUNATIC ASYLUM.

The building now occupied as a Lunatic Asylum was erected by the Provincial Government, about the year 1845, out of the funds arising from the sale of Crown Lands on the island, granted by the home government. It was at first used as a Lunatic Asylum and Poor House combined, but in 1869 it was found to be too small for the purpose, and the paupers were removed to the building now occupied by them. It is situated on the North River, about one mile and a half from Charlottetown, and commands a beautiful view of the rivers and harbor. One half of the building is devoted to male, and the other half to female patients. "The average number resident is about 68. The building is very oldfashioned and totally unsuited to the use to which it is It has lately been enlarged. The Local Government put. contemplate erecting a large building on the Hillsborough River, about two miles from town; which, when completed will be quite equal to the Insane Hospitals in the sister provinces. Strangers may be admitted at any time by making application to Theophilus DesBrisay, Esq., the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, who is ready at all times to furnish any information in his power.

THE ALMS HOUSE

is situated at Brighton, a short distance from the city, and generally contains about 46 inmates, most of whom are aged men and women who have survived their usefulness, their prosperity and their friends. Sergeant Allen, the Superintendent, is at all times happy to show the premises to any stranger who is attracted thither by curiosity or interest in regard to the condition of the unfortunate and poor.

THE CITIZEN'S SKATING RINK.

This fine building which was erected in 1875 by a Joint Stock Company, is situated on Fitzroy Street. It is 120 feet long and 50 feet wide. In winter it is largely patronized, and in summer is used as a Gymnasium. During the skating season strangers can obtain passes which will entitle them to skate for 14 days, on application to the Secretary or any of the Directors. The cost of the building was \$4,000.

THE NEWS ROOM

is located at the corner of Queen and Water Streets. It is well supplied with the leading American, Colonial and English newspapers and periodicals. Mr. McNeill, the proprietor, is always ready to receive strangers and show them all the attention and courtesy in his power.

SHERWOOD CEMETERY

is situated 3 miles and a half from the city, on the line of Railway. The Cemetery Company was incorporated in 1872, and the place was opened for the purpose of interment during the spring of 1873.

FIRE BRIGADE.

The fire brigade is very efficient. It consists of 2 powerful steamers and 4 hand engines, to each of which are attached 35 firemen. A Hook and Ladder Company, of 35 men, was formed in the spring of 1876, and render valuable assistance at fires. Large tanks which are kept filled with water, have been distributed throughout the most populous parts of the city.


GAS.

Charlottetown is well supplied with Gas by a company formed in 1851. The use of this illuminating apparatus is universal throughout the City. The works are situated at the eastern part of the city, on the corner of Sydney and Cumberland Streets.

PLACES OF WORSHIP.

ST. DUNSTAN'S CATHEDRAL (ROMAN CATHOLIC)

is situated on Great George Street. It is 150 feet in length and 75 in extreme width. The Bishop's Palace is a fine edifice of Nova Scotia freestone, and is located close to the Cathedral. Right Rev. ST. PAUL'S CHURCH (EPISCOPAL)

on Prince Street, was built in 1834, but has been frequently repaired and altered and is still a very fine edifice. It is built of wood, and has a lofty spire. Near it, on the corner of Prince and Richmond Streets, is a chool house for the use of the Sabbath School and public meetings. Hours of service, Sunday, 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Week day services, Wednesday, 7 p. m. and Friday, 11 a. m. Rev. David FitzGerald, Rector; Rev. Alfred Osborne, Curate.

ST. PETER'S CHURCH, (EPISCOPAL,)

at the corner of Rotchford Square, is a brick edifice, built in 1869, with a schoolhouse attached. The church will accommodate 400 persons, the seats are all free. Hours of service on Sunday, 8 a. m., 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Daily services at 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. Rev. G. W. Hodgson, Priest Incumbent; Rev. John Ellis, assistant Priest.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH,

in connection with the Church of Scotland, is a wooden edifice, on Pownal Street, built in the year 1826, and will seat 800 persons. Rev. Thomas Duncan, Pastor. Hours of service on Sunday, 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Services every Tuesday and Thursday, at 7 p. m. A new brick church is under consideration.

ZION CHURCH (PRESBYTERIAN)

is situated on Richmond Street, next to Y. M. C. A. building. The edifice will seat 700 persons. Rev. J. McL. McLeod, Pastor. Hours of service, on Sunday, 11 a. m. and 6.30 p. m. Services on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, at 8 o'clock.

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

corner of Prince and Sydney Streets, is a large brick building, capable of seating 1,500 persons. It was erected in 1863. Rev. J. Lathern, Pastor. Hours of service, on Sunday, 10.30 a. m. and 6.30 p. m. Services are held in the basement of the church, every Tuesday and Thursday evenings, at 7.30. This church is the most commodious and best furnished Methodist Church in the Lower Provinces. The Mission House is a fine three-story brick building, situated close to the church.

EUSTON STREET METHODIST CHURCH

directly at the head of Prince Street, will seat 450 persons. Hours of service, on Sunday, 10.30 a. m. and 6.30 p. m. Services every Wednesday, at 8 p. m.

THE BAPTIST CHURCH,

Great George Street, is a wooden edifice; and will seat 400 persons. D. McDonald, Pastor. Hours of service, on Sunday, 11 a. m. and 7. p. m. Service every Monday and Thursday, at 7 p. m.

CHURCH OF CHRIST.

Services are held in the Lower Athenæum, corner of Prince and Grafton Streets. Sunday at 10.30 a.m. and 6.30 p.m. Prayer meetings every Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock.

YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

The building, which is situated on the South Side Queen Square, was erected in 1871, and cost \$14,000. It is a brick structure. three stories high, and is well adapted for the purpose for which it was built. The lecture room occupies the whole of the upper story, and is capable of seating 500 persons. The lower floor contains a parlor and reading room, for the use of the association, and two law offices. The basement contains a gymnasium, and rooms used by the keeper. A public meeting is held in the lecture room every Sunday afternoon, at 4 o'clock, and the weekly prayer meeting is held in the parlor, every Thursday and Saturday afternoons, at 4 o'clock. The bible class meets in one of the rooms in the basement, every Friday, at 8 p. m.

EDUCATIONAL.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.

A two-story building, situated on Weymouth Street. This College succeeded the Central Academy, in 1861. It has been very successful in its career since. The teachers have been men of sterling ability; and the classics and mathematics have been successfully taught. Many young men who have received their education in the Prince of Wales College, have distinguished themselves when they have come into competition with students in the other provinces of the Dominion. The average number of pupils is about 80.

NORMAL SCHOOL,

a two-story structure, situated on Kent Street, near Prince of Wales College. Candidates for teachers in the public schools are educated and trained in this institution. The curriculum embraces all the branches taught in the common and grammar schools.

PROTESTANT ACADEMY.

This excellent institution was erected in 1870, by the Wesleyan Methodists of the city, and retained their name until August, 1876, when it came under the joint auspices of the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, at which time the new name was substituted. It is situated on Haviland Street, at a convenient distance from the crowded part of the city, occupying the most commanding site which the city affords. It is substantially built of brick, three stories high. Its internal arrangements, for adaptation to the work of teaching, leave nothing further to be desired. The rooms are spacious and lofty, and perfectly ventilated. The stair cases are large and well adapted to easy entrance and exit. The building is heated in winter by steam. No pains or cost have been spared by the trustees to make this school very desirable for the youth of our island; where they may successfully prepare for honorable positions in future life. The terms commence, as follows: Summer, August 28th; Autumn, November 9th; Winter, February 1st; Spring, April 17th. A full list of the staff will be found in the educational department of this work.

ST. PETER'S SCHOOL,


in connection with and adjoining St. Peter's Church, is situated on Rotchford Square. In the Boys' School the subjects taught are the English branches, Classics, Mathematics, French and Grammar. Rev. John Ellis, Master; Mr. W. C. Wilson, Assistant Master. In the Girls' School are taught the higher branches of an English education, French and Grammar, Music and Singing. Teachers, Miss Williams and Miss Harris.

ST. DUNSTAN'S COLLEGE.

This institution stands about a mile and a half from Charlottetown, on a very pleasing site, near the Malpeque Road. The building, which has lately been enlarged, is ample and capable of accommodating over one hundred boarders. There are three professors, and a rector. The course embraces all the branches of an English education, Mathematics, Classics, Greek and Latin, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Logic, and Metaphysics. The classes open in September and close in July, with the usual Christmas recess.

CONVENT OF THE CONGREGATION OF NOTRE DAME.

This brick building, four stories high, is one of the most imposing educational structures in the lower provinces. It stands on Sydney Street, on the South side of Hillsborough



Park, in the midst of grounds well laid off. From the Cupola of the building, a magnificent prospect can be obtained of the harbor and surrounding country. The interior is excellently adapted for educational purposes. The corridors are wide and lofty, and the study halls, recreation rooms and dormitories are on the most convenient and improved plans. There is ample accommodation within its walls for about 200 pupils. There are generally more than 12 ladies of the Congregation of Notre Dame in attendance at this institution. The branches taught are English, French, Mathematics, plain and fancy needle work, Drawing, Painting and Music.

ST. PATRICK'S SCHOOL.

This school, three stories high, stands on Queen Square, at the corner of Great George and Richmond Streets. It is under the care of the Christian Brothers, and has a very large attendance of pupils, the average being over 300. There are three grade departments in the school, each under the care of a Brother. The ordinary branches in English, Arithmetic and Mathematics are taught. The upper story is occupied by a spacious hall, which is frequently used for concerts, lectures and public meetings.

ST. JOSEPH'S SCHOOL.

This school, for girls, is in charge of the ladies of the Congregation of Notre Dame. It is situated on Pownal Street. The attendance is over 200. The usual branches are taught. The building in which the school is held was at one time St. Andrew's Church, and was brought to its present situation on the ice from St. Andrews, a distance of 20 miles.

COMMERCIAL COLLEGE,

is situated at the corner of King and Queen Streets, in Welsh & Owen's brick building. All branches connected with a first-class business education taught. No vacation. Masters and Mates prepared for the Marine Board Examinations. T. B. Reagh, Principal.

HOTELS.

THE RANKIN HOUSE, a most popular and well managed hotel, is located on Pownal Street. Miss F. J. Rankin, Proprietress.

REVERE HOUSE, at the head of the Steamboat Wharf, a fine hotel, is a very popular place of resort. Mrs. McNeill, Proprietress.



ST. LAWRENCE HOTEL, on Water Street, is a large wooden structure, and conveniently located for the steamboats. Miss Street, Proprietress.

OSBORNE HOUSE, on Water Street, a comfortable and well managed hotel. James Davis, Proprietor.

CAPEL HOUSE, Great George Street, is a good large hotel and well kept by its proprietress, Mrs. Capel, who has had considerable experience in this department.


NORTH AMERICAN HOTEL, on Kent Street, is a comfortable hotel. Robert Crabbe, Proprietor.

DOMINION HOUSE, Great George Street, near Malpeque Road, is a large and comfortable hotel. H. B. Smith, Proprietor.

ROCKLIN HOUSE.—This long established house is located on Kent Street. It has recently been refitted. S. D. Fraser, Proprietor.

SUMMER RESORTS.

The pleasure seeker who wishes enjoyment will do well not to confine himself too closely to the City. There are many pleasant drives and walks which will amply repay him for the triffing expenditure of the time and money they will cause. First, may be named the drive to Rustico. This place can be reached by Rail to Hunter River, at which place one of Bagnall's coaches is always in readiness to transfer the tourist to the Seaside Hoted, Rustico, a distance of about 7 miles. If the traveler prefers it, however, he can procure a team at one of the livery stables, and leave the City by the Malpeque Road, and after passing through "Curtisdale," and other pretty villages, he will arrive at Rustico Beach, after a beautiful drive of two and a half hours, where he may safely surrender himself unto mine host of the "Seaside Hotel," Mr. John Newson, who will make his stay pleasant and agreeable. The Mackerel and Cod fishing at the "Seaside Hotel" are unequalled,-Boats leave for the Mackerel grounds daily. This Hotel offers superior in-ducements to the tourist. Delightful surf bathing may be indulged in, together with boating, fishing, and the usual sports calculated to make a stay at this place of the most pleasant character. The Hotel is open from May to October. "The Island Park Hotel," situated on an Island, opposite Summerside, has but one superior in the Lower Provinces. It was erected by Jas. L. Holman, at an enormous ex-



pense, and has been furnished in grand style in the most modern manner. The Island Park is a picturesque spot, a sort of place like the one of which Tom Moore said :--

"If there's peace to be found in the world, A heart that was humble might hope for it here."


The steamer "Frank" plys constantly between Summerside and the Island Park. We cannot close this brief notice of this excellent hotel without requesting the visitor to our Island not to neglect visiting the Island Park.

A drive to Vernon River is indispensable. After crossing the ferry to Southport, and travelling about 9 miles, we pass through Pownal, a very pretty village,—and a short distance further on we see Cherry Valley, a most fertile portion of the country. After a drive of about 2 hours we arrive at the "Half-way House," Vernon River, and are at once taken charge of by the Proprietor, Mr. George O'Neill, who is at all times only too happy to make his guests comfortable. If the tourist desires he can drive on two miles and call on Mr. Peter Edmunds, of the "Summerville Hotel." This House is beautifully situated in a grove, and will be found very agreeable.

Other very pleasant drives may be indulged in by visiting Mount Stewart, Stanhope, Tracadie, and numerous other places,—hence we deem it unnecessary to particularize when so many places of interest abound. Any one of them will well repay the tourist the trouble of a visit.

TO SPORTSMEN.

The different Rivers of the Island abound in Fish. There are three kinds of Trout-Sea, Gulf and River. The Gulf Trout are abundant in June, July and August, and the fresh water (or River) Trout may be taken all the year round. The Sea Trout have a fine flavor, very much like Salmon, and are taken in large numbers in the Dunk, Morell and Trout Morell River is in King's County, and accessible Rivers. by rail, distant from Charlottetown 26 miles-Dunk River lies in the opposite direction, is 36 miles from Charlottetown, and 10 from Summerside, accessible by rail to Freetown from which place it is 3 miles distant. Trout River is in Prince County, 30 miles west of Summerside, and can be reached by rail. Salmon fishing is prosecuted extensive y at St. Peter's Bay and Tignish. During the Summer months a large number of the inhabitants are engaged in shore fish-The principal fish taken are Mackerel, Herring, Cod, ing.

Hake and Halibut. The Bays and Rivers abound in Shell fish. The Oysters taken at Bedeque are the finest, and are not excelled on the Continent. March brings us Geese and Brant in large numbers. The favorite resorts for Sportsmen are Tracadie, on the North shore, distant from Charlottetown 14 miles; St. Peter's Island, on the South side, lying outside of the harbor, and distant from Charlottetown 10miles; St. Peter's Bay on the North side, distant from Charlottetown 30 miles; Richmond Bay, 5 miles from Summerside, and Lennox Island, 16 miles west of Summerside, which is accessable by rail. During the months of August and September we are visited with large flocks of Land Plover, which are found principally on pasture and barren ground, not far from the water. Malpeque (near Summerside) is a favorite resort for Sportsmen in search of Plover. In the rivers and inlets during the months of September and October are found Black Duck in large numbers. During the Autumn months our Partridge and Snipe shooting is considered the finest in America.

INFORMATION FOR TRAVELERS.

The steamers of the Prince Edward Island Steam Navigation Company afford daily communication with the other Maritime Provinces. These boats are first-class in their equipments, and are commanded by men who fully understand their duty, and always render the trip agreeable.

Steamer "M. A. Starr" plys between this port and Halifax weekly, leaving Charlottetown every Thursday, and Halifax every Monday evening.

The boats of the International S. S. Co. leave St. John every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 8, a. m., arrive at Eastport at 12, m., and leave Eastport at 1, p. m. Arrive at Portland early next morning, and reach Boston same evening. Steamers returning leave Boston same days as above at 8 a. m., leave Portland at 6, p. m., Eastport next day at 9, a. m., and arrive at St. John at 1, p. m.

The "Carroll" and "Worcester," of the Boston and Colonial S. S. Line, sail as follows: Leave Charlottetown every Thursday, at 5, p. m., Port Hawkesbury next morning; leave Halifax for Boston at 4, p. m., Saturday, arriving at Boston Monday morning.

Returning, leave T Wharf, Boston, for the above ports, every Saturday at 12, m., arrive at Halifax at daylight Monday morning; leave Halifax for Port Hawkesbury & Pictou at 12, m.; arrive at Pictou at 4, p. m., Tuesday, and Charlottetown at daylight Wednesday morning.

The Canadian Steamers, (seven in number,) ply between Montreal and Charlottetown, calling at intermediate ports.

EXPLANATION OF THE Principal Articles of the Calendar.

ON THE LEFT HAND PAGE will be found the day of the Month, day of the Week, Time of Sun's Rising and Setting reduced to Mean Charlottetown Time, the Equation of Time, (usually called "Sun Fast or Slow of Clock") which is given for the instant of *Apparent Noon at Greenwich*, and in the next column at the right, the hourly change or variation of same.

The Sun's Declination is given at Apparent and Mean Noon at Greenwich, and is the same as the quantities given in the Nautical Almanac Pages I and II, while at the right of the two columns the Hourly variation is also given.

On the right hand page are given the Sun's semi-diameter for each day, the Moon's Rising and Setting, (Approximately) the Time of High Water Morning and Afternoon at Charlottetown and London Bridge, and the Moon's Transit as given in the Nautical Almanac; see Tides and Tidal Constants Page 29.

The Equation of Time, Sun's Declination, &c., are given for the use of Seamen, and as care has been taken in compiling these quantities, which are intended to be used exactly as though taken from the Nautical Almanac, Seamen will find them sufficient for obtaining the Latitude, Longitude, Amplitude, Azimuth, Tides, &c., while being easier of access than the larger and somewhat clumsy Nautical Almanac, it is hoped it will be found sufficiently accurate for nearly all purposes.

ECLIPSES.

There will be Five Eclipses during the year 1877, three of the Sun and two of the Moon.

1st. Feb. 27th: A Total Eclipse of the Moon invisible at Charlottetown; visible as a Partial Eclipse at Greenwich. 2nd. March 14 and 15: A Partial Eclipse of the Sun not visible on this Island.

3rd. August 8th: A Partial Eclipse of the Sun invisible at Charlottetown.

4th. August 23rd: A Total Eclipse of the Moon visible as a Partial Eclipse at Charlottetown: The Moon will rise eclipsed, and the phase of greatest obscuration will be at about sunset.



TIDES AND TIDAL CONSTANTS.

The Times of High Water, morning and afternoon are given in the Calendar for Charlottetown and London Bridge; the times at Charlottetown, it must be understood are merely APPROXIMATELY TRUE, there being many causes which affect the time of High Water, such as *storms*, &c.

The following Table gives a Constant, to be applied to Charlottetown times to find the High Tide at the places mentioned; but it is suggested that the better way to find the Time of High Water at places quite distant from Charlottetown, is to proceed as directed hereafter for Foreign Ports, and the Times at London Bridge are given for this purpose. The process is as follows:---

Get the Longitude of the required Port from the Epitome, (Norie, Bowditch or Raper) and take from the Calendar the Times of Moon's Transit on the following and given days if in West, or the preceding and given days, if in East Longitude: with the difference of Transit on these days, and the Longitude of the Port, enter (Table XVI Norie, XXVIII Bowditch, 28 Raper) and with the minutes at the top and Longitude in side column will be found a correction which is to be applied to the Tide Hour on full and change days as directed; *i. e.* added in *West*, subtracted in Then take from (Table LVII Norie, LV East Longitude. Bowditch, 13 Raper,) the Time of High Water, on full and change days, and apply the correction as directed; if the time thus found exceeds the London Tide Hour on full and change days (1h. 58m.) subtract the latter from the former and the Constant, *additive*, is found; but if London Bridge Tide Hour exceeds it, it is to be subtracted from London Hour, and the Constant so found is *subtractive*; then to the time of High Water at London Bridge given in the Calendar for the day, apply the Constant thus found, and the time of High Water at the required Port is obtained.

ROSE VALLEY, QUEEN'S CO.—Distant from Summerside 18 miles, from Charlottetown 20 miles, from Georgetown 50 miles. Population about 200.

RUSTICO, QUEEN'S CO.—Adjacent to Rustico Bay, one of the principal fishing stations in the Province. The Farmers Bank of Rustico is located here. Distant from Charlottetown 16 miles. Population about 250.

SCOTCHFORT.—On the north side of the Hillsborough River, in Queen's County. Distant from Charlottetown 15 miles, from Georgetown 20 miles, from Summerside 55 miles. Population about 100.


SEARLTOWN.—Parish of St. David's, County of Prince. Distant from Georgetown 6 miles, from Charlottetown 34 miles, from Summerside 13 miles. Population about 80.

SKINNER'S POND, PRINCE CO.—Distant from Alberton 15 miles, from Charlottetown 100 miles, from Georgetown 130 miles, from Summerside 52 miles. Population about 100.

SOMERSET, PRINCE Co.—Distant from Summerside 12 miles, from Charlottetown 25 miles, from Georgetown 55 miles. Population about 35.

SOURIS.—A flourishing town in King's County, and the eastern terminus of the P. E. I. Railway. The Souris river runs through the centre of the town, dividing it into two parts, that on the east side of the River being known as Souris East; and that on the opposite side as Souris West;

the larger portion of the town is on the eastern side. The depth of water on the bar is $8\frac{1}{2}$ feet at high water. A breakwater has just been completed, which adds very much to the efficiency of the harbor, and makes it one of the best on the Island. SPRINGFIELD, QUEEN'S CO.—Distant from Charlottetown 24 miles, from Georgetown 54, from Summerside 15 miles. Population about 50.

SPRINGTON, QUEEN'S Co.—Distant from Charlottetown 14 miles, from Georgetown 44 miles, from Summerside 20 miles. Population about 250.

ST. ELEANORS.—The capital of Prince County, and on the line of the P. E. I. Railway. Distant from Summerside 21 miles, from Charlottetown 40 miles. Population about 450.

ST. FELIX.—In the parish of Tignish, Prince County. Distant from Summerside 50 miles, from Charlottetown 90 miles, from Georgetown 120 miles. Population about 150.

ST. MARGARET'S.—Situated in Township No. 13, parish of St. Margaret's, King's Co. Distant from Charlottetown 46 miles. Population about 60.

ST. PETER'S BAY, KING'S Co.—A telegraph station (St. Peters) of the P. E. I. Railway, and a principal rendezvous for fishing vessels. Distant from Charlottetown 33 miles. Population about 90.



SUMMERSIDE.-The second town of importance on the Island is situated in Township No. 17, Parish of Richmond, County of Prince. It is a seaport town, has a good harbor, being the third best on the Island, though the channel is crooked and narrow, and has a large export trade. Shipbuilding is also carried on to a considerable extent. This is a principal station of the P. E. I. Railway. The Supreme Court holds its sessions here on the second Tuesday in June and the First Tuesday in October. The Steamers of the P. E. I. Steam Navigation Company ply daily between this port and Shediac, N. B., (connecting with the I. C. R. to St. John and all other points.) Two weekly newspapers are issued in the town. Summerside was incorporated 10th September, 1875, and is governed by five Wardens and a Stipendiary Magistrate. Two policemen are sufficient to preserve good order, who constantly parade the streets uniformed. The "International," one of the best hotels on the Island is situated on Central Street, and is extensively patronized by travellers. The "Island Park Hotel" is beautifully situated on an Island directly opposite Summer-This Hotel is second to none in the Lower Provinces, side. having all the modern improvements necessary to make guests comfortable. Distant from Charlottetown by rail 50 miles, by post road 40 miles, by steamer 60 miles, from Alberton 40 miles, from Shediac 45. Population about 2000.

TIGNISH.—An important village situated in Townships Nos. 1 and 2, North Parish, County of Prince, and is the most important fishing station on the Island. This is the Western terminus of the P. E. I. Railway, and a telegraph station. Population about 200.



WARBLINGTON — A settlement in Township No. 28, Parish of St. Davids, Prince County. Distant from Summerside 20 miles, from Georgetown 60 miles, from Charlottetown 30 miles. Population about 75.

WELLINGTON, PRINCE Co.—A telegraph station of the P. E. I. Railway. Distant from Summerside 12 miles, from Alberton 28 miles. Population about 75.

WEST CAPE, PRINCE Co.—Distant from Summerside 47 miles, from Charlottetown 90 miles, from Georgetown 120 miles. Population about 100.

WEST POINT.—Situated in Township No. 8, Parish of Halifax, County of Prince. This being the nearest point on the Island to the mainland is likely to become a place of importance.
