

# north york public library



### **REPORT 1972**

Growth - that is the word to describe the history of the North York Public Library, From its suburban beginnings shortly after World War II the Library has grown from an institution serving a predominantly middle class English community to a complex system in contact with people from a variety of different cultures, a wide socio-economic spectrum of the community, and diverse vocational, educational and recreational needs.

This community borrowed 4,120,000 books, films, records and other materials from the Library in 1972. Approximately 650,000 people viewed the 41,195 films circulated from our film collection. Over 135,000 people joined the Library of which 67% were classified as adult borrowers and 33% as children. In addition other thousands without cards used reference materials, attended programs or received services through the LINK Information and Referral Service, Service to Shut-Ins and other special programs.

During the year major changes were made in several of our buildings. The Gladys Allison Library was refurbished providing the patron with better lighting, improved shelving, and a greater accessibility to materials. The Audio-Visual Department was relocated in new space in the same building thus providing much needed space for other public service functions in that branch.

A major addition was completed to the Services Building thus providing for the housing of the art department, circulation control, maintenance, stores, and an expanded book buying and processing program.

These physical changes provide for a better level of service being offered to the citizens of North York. In 1972 the Library expanded its adult education and extension programming by 80%. Reflecting the diversity of the community, the programs covered such subjects as films, handicrafts, book discussions, contemporary social concerns, art, music and related topics. Children, young people, adults and senior citizens were provided with opportunities to meet their personal needs in various cultural, recreational and educational pursuits. We have now reached the point where many of our public meeting facilities are being fully utilized.

The Library continued its work with those people who through age or physical disability are not able to visit one of the branches. With federal government L.I.P. funds a group of staff brought programs of films, crafts, music and related activities to people who previously had not been able to share in these experiences. A site was acquired for our last area branch to be located in Don Valley Village on the Fairview site. As an interim measure a community branch was opened September 1 to provide limited service to this large community.

As community needs become more clearly defined, cooperation between public institutions becomes more important. Effective liaison between the Board of Education and the Library has been fostered on both the policy making and the operations level so that maximum use of the services of both institutions is made. Equivalent type of cooperation exists with the Parks & Recreation Department. This is being given a physical form in the new Humber Summit Library and Community Centre to be built and operated jointly by the two services.

Although the major and rapid growth of the Borough is tapering off in physical terms the information needs of its citizens continue to grow making it necessary to provide the knowledge required for the sophisticated community in which we live. The Library will continue to grow and change as it responds to the changing world around it.


