

We created a new and progressive Mission Statement with a vision of knowledge, exploration and equal access for all North Yorkers. We developed a new Three-Year Business Plan that turned staff and public input into an action plan.

As a public library, we strive to provide information in ways that are efficient and accessible to our users. Today that includes more electronic formats than ever before. In 1996, we established the Gateway Services Department in Central Library as a way of promoting our electronic resources and providing a training centre to educate the public in their usage.

In Gateway Services, users can browse the World Wide Web on new Internet workstations. They can search the online catalogues of NYPL, the National Library, the Library of Congress and more. Or they can find full-text magazine articles on the Masterfile periodical database. Researchers can use a variety of sophisticated CD-ROM reference products on multimedia workstations or they can borrow from our collection of circulating

CD-ROMs. These electronic tools are provided in many NYPL locations, but only in Gateway Services do they form a single comprehensive research package coupled with appropriate training.

Gateway services was busy from the moment it opened on May 9 and it is not unusual to see all workstations in use. Our new User Education Centre in Gateway Services has also built up a substantial clientele. It was created as a prototype training centre to help the public and staff stay abreast of current and future technology. Many of the courses developed there are now being used at other branches. Both Gateway Services and its User Education Centre are symbols of the evolution of library service in North York.

Our Internet Home Page made its first appearance on the World Wide Web on the day Gateway Services was launched. It offers access to our online catalogue, links to exciting Web sites, access to a world of information, and gives users a new way to bring the library into to their homes.

In addition, the growing number of Internet terminals in our branches gives Internet access to library users who may not have it otherwise.

In equally important news, 1996 saw renovations being completed at Brookbanks and Victoria Village Community Branches, as well as a major overhaul at Downsview Regional Branch Looking good as new, the 35-year-old branch is now ready for years more service.

We also made positive changes in important operational areas. Our new Three-Year Business Plan 1996-1998 will ensure that NYPL remains responsive to the needs of the city for the loreseeable future. Our working relationship with the City of North York grew stronger as the library's Design and Printing Department began taking on the design and publicity production needs of all City of North York departments.

Partnerships grew in other areas as well, first and foremost with the National Film Board, who placed

1,500 video titles in our collection and used our Gateway Services Centre to launch its interactive children's Web site. A pilot project that saw CATNYP online catalogue workstations placed in Victoria Park Secondary School was completed in 1996, paving the way for closer ties with the North York Board of Education

The end of the year brought the announcement of an amalgamation of all Metropolitan Toronto municipalities into one large city. This means that 1997 will be a busy year, a year of working towards fully integrated library service in the new City of Toronto. However, until plans are formulated it is 'business as usual' at North York Public Library. Our patrons may be assured that staff will continue to work productively on innovatively to ensure a high level of library service for all-

HIGHLIGHTS OF 1996

THE GATES GO UP

M ay 9 saw a new innovation in public service at North York Public Library with the opening of the Gateway Services Department on the main floor of Central Library. The technology hub of NYPL, Gateway provides access to the Internet, CATNYP, full-text magazine databases and the CD-ROM Network. There is also a circulating CD-ROM collection and staff trained in all these tools. The adjoining User Education Centre was designed specifically to offer training classes for the public and staff on using NYPL's electronic resources. Gateway's popularity in its first eight months of operation provided ample evidence that such departments will be a big part of libraries in the future.



NEW ERA DAWNS AT DOWNSVIEW



Thirty-five years after the sod was turned to begin construction of the Downsview Regional Branch in 1961, a grand opening celebration signalled a new life for NYPL's second-oldest branch. The doors re-opened on May 6 after a 10-month, \$1.1 million renovation that added 2,000 square feet of space to the branch and saw major structural and cosmetic changes. These included a new roof, entrance and elevator as well as new paint, carpet, lighting, equipment and furniture. The result: a brighter, spacious, more modern branch and a May 16 ceremony that celebrated Downsview's diverse cultural heritage.

NEW LEVEL OF CELEBRITY FOR AN OUTSTANDING PROGRAM

"That was how author/broadcaster June Callwood described NYPL's Writer-in-Residence program. She should know; Ms Callwood spent six months as Writer-in-Residence, ending her term in the spring. She reviewed 95 manuscripts, including many by published writers such as Jeanne Hopkins, a regular contributor of local history pieces to Metro newspapers, June also

facilitated many writing programs at the library







PERFORMANCE HIGHLIGHTS

Total circulation growth 1986-96: 58%












