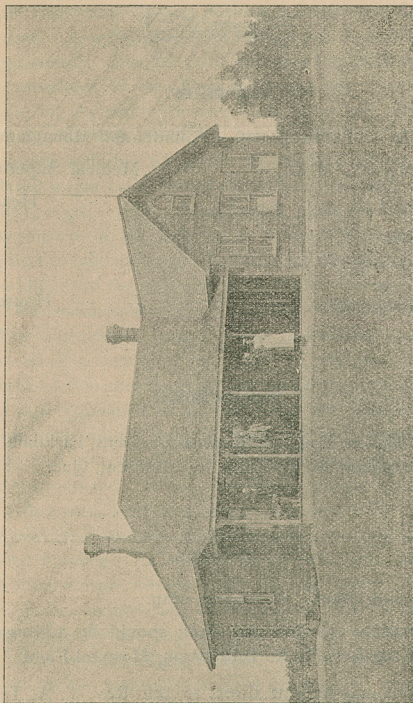

DEAR FRIEND,—

This Institution, on behalf of which I take the liberty of appealing to you for assistance, was formally opened on Sept. 23, 1896, by the Honorable Charles McIntosh, Lieutenant Governor of the North-west. In a few words let me tell you how the Institution came into existence. For the past ten years I have been ministering to the members of the English Church scattered over a vast country. During my residence here it has been my desire to see medical aid placed within reach of our people, having personally witnessed much suffering for want of medical attention. Even where such aid might have been had, the cost placed it beyond the reach of most people. After considerable thought the only feasible plan seemed to be the erection of a small Hospital. As the Institution was to take the form of a home for the sick, the term hospital was modified by the addition of the word "Cottage." A general appeal was made to the whole country with the result that a small building was erected, large enough to accommodate 10 patients. The work commenced on Sept. 23, and since that time the beds have been in constant use, the nurse's quarters having also been called into requisition to accommodate the patients. During the past year over seventy patients have received treatment within the building, and the number of those seeking admission being steadily on the increase. When we commenced the work we were burdened with a small debt, and now we have not only this to settle but also to provide more beds for patients by erecting an addition to our present building. In order to do this we appeal to you. We have done what we can ourselves and are still doing, but without your assistance we cannot carry on the work. We therefore appeal to you most earnestly and feel sure you will not refuse to help us. The work is not on any religious basis. All in need of treatment are received into the Institution without reference to creed or church and therefore our wants appeal to all. No doubt you have your own local charities and institutions needing help, and many perhaps will make this an excuse for not giving, but no one will feel the small sum which we ask each one to give. The enclosed card will

bring us safely 25 cents and we shall feel deeply indebted to all who will kindly send us the small amount.
