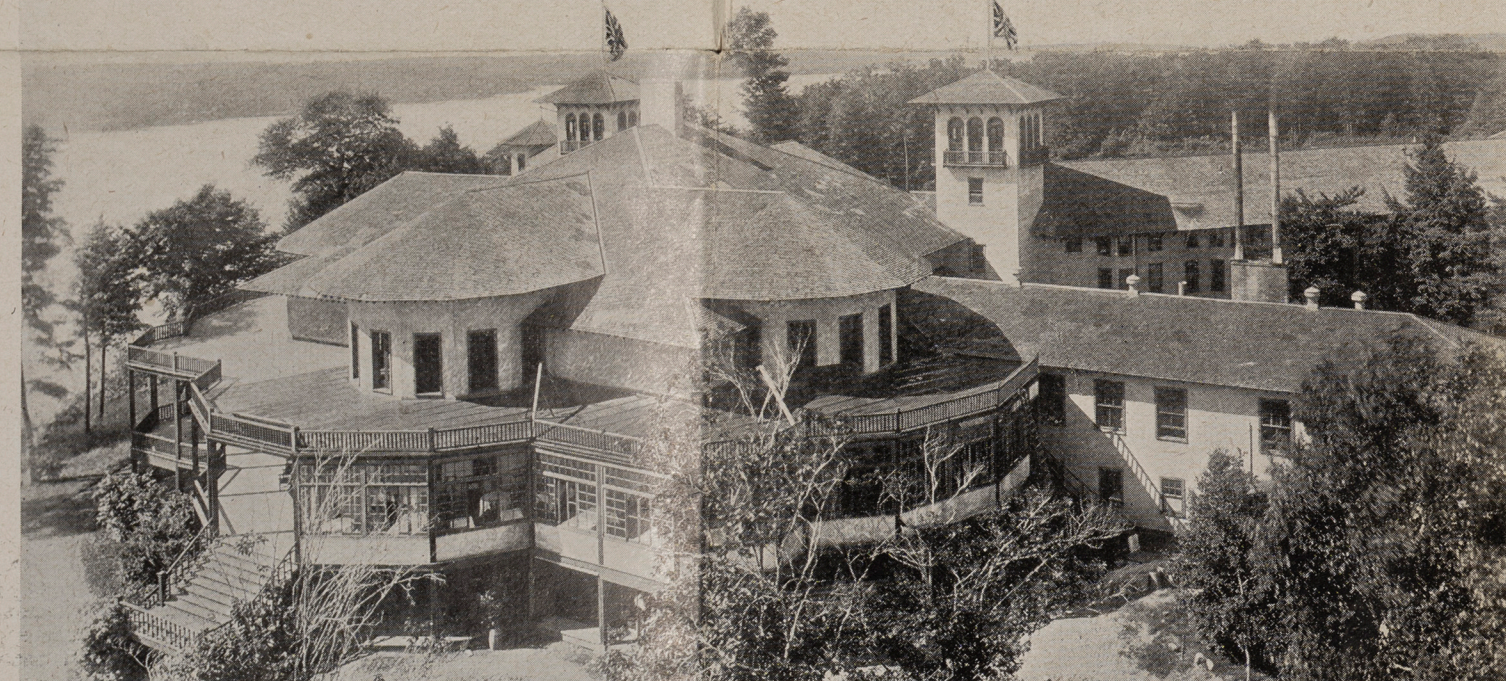

BAGGAGE ARRANGEMENTS.

Sportsmen—For sportsmen and campers, singly or in parties on hunting or fishing expeditions one hundred and fifty (150) pounds of baggage and camping outfits will be checked free of charge on each full ticket, and seventy-five (75) pounds on each half ticket, provided it consists of wearing apparel, sportsmen's and campers' outfits, such as tents, small bundles of bedding, camp utensils and provisions in small quantities packed in proper receptacles, such as boxes with handles, or trunks, so that they can be checked, piled or handled as ordinary baggage.

Furniture, barrels, bags of flour, or like bulky articles of that nature, also articles containing liquids of any kind, will not be checked as baggage, but must be sent by express or freight.

On the return journey, a game or fish catch of fifty (50) pounds' weight, not in conflict with existing laws, may be

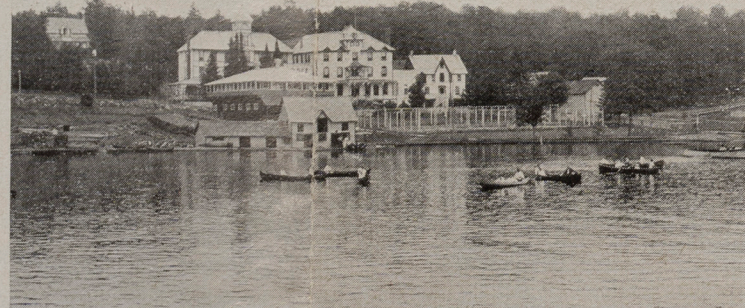


The Royal Muskoka is the social centre of this beautiful lakeland. It is magnificently situated and from its broad verandas lovely views are obtained.

included in the free "allowance" when checked to points in Canada only.

Guns in wooden, canvas or leather cases may be taken into passenger cars, but if not protected, they must be conveyed in the baggage car at owner's risk. Canoes, skiffs and row-boats, not exceeding 18 feet in length, when accompanied by sportsmen or campers, will be taken in the baggage car at a nominal charge. Campers' outfits, etc., carried only at owner's risk.

The foregoing arrangements apply to a limited district in Canada, including Algonquin Provincial (Ontario) Park, and certain other points north of Toronto.

TORONTO EXHIBITION.

The City of Toronto is the objective point for all traffic for the "Highlands of Ontario"—a beautiful city full of interest to the tourist and sight-seer. Each year during the latter part of the summer the Toronto Industrial Exhibition, which is considered to be the best annual fair on the continent, is held here and is well worth a visit. In 1917 the Exhibition will be held from August 25th to September 14th.

MAGANETAWAN RIVER.

In its rivers as much as in its lakes lies the beauty of Muskoka. The Maganetawan is reached fifty-eight miles north of Muskoka Wharf, at Burk's Falls, on the Grand Trunk Railway. The Maganetawan River is just equidistant between the Muskoka Lakes and Lake Nipissing, and drains a surface of about four thousand square miles. Some idea may, therefore, be gathered of its magnitude and of the possibilities for canoeing opened up by the ramifications of the numerous tributaries and their connected lake enlargements.

This is the very heart centre for sport for rod and gun. Its rivers and lakes can be ascended and descended in canoes, and

the best of sport, while the eye is fascinated by the fresh and unsullied wildness of its forest haunts.

Burk's Falls stands upon the banks of the main Maganetawan at the head of steamboat navigation, and about half a mile below the forks of the river, where the two great north and south branches join. From here can be taken the steamers of the

Maganetawan River Line. For fifteen miles the river winds to and fro as all Muskoka rivers seem to do. Lake Ceccebe forms the next link for ten miles, at the foot of which is the village of Maganetawan. After passing through the locks the steamer continues for three miles more in the river, and then enters Lake Ahmic. This is another of the gems of Muskoka most quaint in form. It is twelve miles in length, and provides another excellent route for boating, as there are no rapids to interfere or portages to make; a nice diversity of paddling or rowing in the river is interspersed with sailing on the lakes.

Muskoka Lakes

THE Muskoka Lakes enjoy an international reputation. The beauty of their scenic setting, their cool, health-giving, breezes and the wonderful facilities which they offer for recreation, have won for them a firm hold on the affections of large numbers of discriminating travellers from all sections of the Continent.

The reason of their popularity is found immediately you enter the region. Nature has here been lavish with her finest handiwork—pine scented forests, sparkling, island studded, lakes, laughing streams and waterfalls, are all part of a wonderful heritage.

On Muskoka's placid waters sunny days may be dreamed away in canoe or launch, there are glistening stretches of sandy beach where you may bathe in safety, golf links overlooking lovely lakes and a multitude of lovers' walks through the fragrant woods.

The turmoil of city life is soon forgotten when you fall under Muskoka's spell. There is never any "crowding," the territory being so large that you might plan a fresh trip for each day of your stay, and still travel in a veritable kingdom of your own.

MUSKOKA'S PERFECT CLIMATE.

Muskoka's name is derived from the great chief of the Hurons "Musquado," signifying "clear sky" and no happier appellation could have been adopted. Situated about 1,000 feet above sea level, the altitude produces a modifying effect on the sun's rays and makes the climatic conditions ideal for the holiday-maker even in the height of midsummer. Hay-fever is unknown.

In the variety of excellent accommodation offered to the visitor Muskoka has few rivals among resort districts. You may make a choice of hotels, ranging from the modest to the fashionable, of boarding houses, of peaceful country homes or of cozy island cottages.

The Muskoka territory is directly under the control of the Provincial Legislature, thereby presenting the charms of an unsettled region, while at the same time it affords all modern conveniences such as mail, telegraph, telephone and railway service.

GEMS OF THE LAKE LAND.

The district is part of the famed "Highlands of Ontario." Many hundreds of square miles in extent, the "Highlands of Ontario" are in turn part of the great Laurentian range. They are thickly wooded with stately pines, giant hemlock, fragrant balsam and wide-spreading maples, and are dotted with hundreds of pretty lakes of all sizes and depths. Three of the largest and most beautiful of these are comprised in the group called "Muskoka Lakes." They are lakes Rosseau, Joseph and Muskoka.

You are amazed at the extent of these lakes, which appear so small on the map. You had perhaps expected to see some charming miniature, some pretty historic pond, through which a tiny vessel would travel fretfully. But in any other country than Canada the Muskoka Lakes would be called "great," and geographers would lecture on them at length. Secondly, the multitudes of islands and diversified shore-line cause you to wonder how the captain finds his way. These lakes are a veritable maze, a watery labyrinth, the haunt of novel illusions and evasions. Against the steep woodlands, in which trees deciduous and trees evergreen commingle, nestle pretty cottages and summer villas, the owners of which have fallen in love with Muskoka. In nearly all cases these charming summer homes harmonize with their surroundings of wistful waters and bracing woods.

Lake about midway between Muskoka Wharf and Beaumaris, on the eastern shore of the lake, and on the route of the Muskoka Navigation Company's steamers to Bracebridge, a pretty town eleven miles north from Gravenhurst. The Dee River, connecting Three-Mile Lake with Lake Rosseau, near Windermere, Skeleton River from Skeleton Lake to Lake Rosseau, and Rosseau River, with the pretty Rosseau Falls, all feed this, the second largest of the three lakes, on its eastern boundary, while Shadow River, one of Nature's gems, at the head of the lake, will alone repay the tourist for the entire journey up the lakes. With its deceptive shadows and reflections, it is an enchanting and lovely stream. Two other notable streams, dear to the heart of the sportsman and the intrepid canoeist, are the Moon and Muskosh Rivers, which flow into the Georgian Bay to the west.

MUSKOKA'S ISLANDS.

The Muskoka Lakes contain between four hundred and five hundred islands of every shape and size, ranging from one of 1,100 acres, in Lake Rosseau, to those containing but a single tree, or a rock rising sheer from the water's edge. Most of the islands, however, are densely covered with pine, balsam, cedar, birch, maple, oak and other varieties of tree life. Many of the islands, on which have been erected handsome dwellings, are the private property of wealthy Americans and Canadians, but there are hundreds of choice little spots on which visitors are at liberty to take up their abode for the season.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES.

Muskoka is noted for the number and variety of its hotel and boarding-house accommodations, situated at various points along the lakes. A complete list of such will be found at the back of this folder. From these the visitor can select a place to suit his taste and purse. There are comfortable farmhouses, and scores of cleanly, well-kept hotels offering good substantial food and endless variety of other attractions. The prices range from the modest fee of \$6.00 per week up to those of greater pretensions.

THE ROYAL MUSKOKA.

The Royal Muskoka Hotel, located on Lake Rosseau, in the heart of the Muskoka district, is one of the finest summer hotels in Canada.

It was constructed by the Muskoka Lakes Navigation Company, with a view to offering first-class accommodation to those who appreciate quality. The hotel has accommodation for three hundred guests, and among other attractions has a splendid nine-hole golf course, miles of delightfully wooded walks, bathing beaches, tennis courts, bowling greens, canoe courses, etc.

The continued popularity of this fine hotel is the best testimonial to the service offered and the unequalled location chosen for the resort.

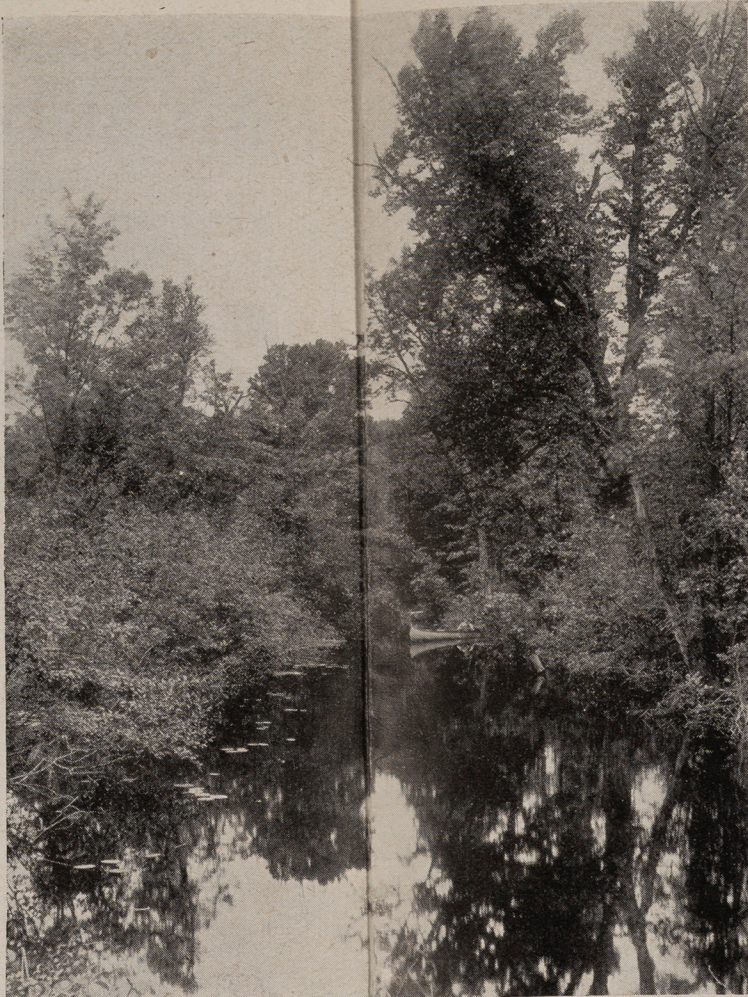
GOLF.

Royal Muskoka Golf Links.—In connection with the Royal Muskoka Hotel, Lake Rosseau, Muskoka Lakes, there is a nine-hole watered golf course laid out by an expert, and exceptionally attractive. It is situated within three minutes of the hotel. In addition, it possesses rare charm because of its picturesque situation. It is kept in good condition during the season and lies over well-tufted and highly diversified ground. A professional keeper is in charge and is available for those desiring his services as instructor.

Beaumaris Golf Links.—One of the most interesting and picturesque eighteen-hole golf courses in Ontario is situated at Beaumaris, within an hour's sail of Muskoka Wharf and the through trains of the Grand Trunk. The scenic surroundings are superb—Lake Muskoka

Shadow River, at the head of Lake Rosseau, is a sanctuary for bird life and one of the loveliest spots in the whole Muskoka Region.

The Fascinating Falls of Bala.—There will come a day among these land-locked lakes when the quietness brooding over all seems to oppress, when one longs for the water to ripple and swish. Then it is that one should take the trip to Bala Falls. When once there, if you are of the venturesome kind, have the guide direct your canoe or rowboat close to the swirl of water, but if of a dreamy turn of mind, go sit on a rock near by and hear the water gurgling and laugh as it rushes along towards Moon River.

Charming Waterways and Enchanted Islands.—Take a trip on the Queen of the Fleet, the "Sagamo," and feel that there is nothing to do but sail on and on through all the lovely day.

Swinging out on our voyage through fairyland, the shores of the mainland widen and become distant, but other shores rise up around, of islands little and big, near and far, rocky or covered with luxuriant green to the edge of the water, and the only sign of human life is here and there a red peak among the trees, or a tiny pier and boathouse at the edge. Island folds back on island, in innumerable shades of rich sunlit green, till the distant ones, veiled in mist, blend with the sky; island on island, from the large tract of many wooded acres to the stubborn little rock thrusting up its brown head with one rugged storm-beaten pine. Farmhouses nestle on the banks, and here and there are little spots chosen by "rolling stone" holiday makers as a resting-place.

At times we think we must be caught in the maze of islands, but the boats take a gentle turn and lo, the channel lies before us. Thus we wind in and out until with the setting sun lighting the panorama before us we glide into port.

The Mysterious Rivers of Shadows.—Shadow River sounds inviting as a day's outing. Seating ourselves comfortably in canoe or boat and half-shutting our eyes to get the proper view of the labyrinth of beautifully wooded islands before us, we set out from Rosseau.

Soon we are creeping steadily and stealthily into the deep mystery of shadows. We seem to be in perpetual circles of branches and boughs and boughs and branches, above and below. Which the real and which the image our fingers soon discover as they slip into the soft still waters.

GO DREAM AWAY THE WEEK-END.

When you consider that Muskoka resorts are within three and a half hours' ride by the Grand Trunk from Toronto, and proportionately accessible from many of the larger centres of Ontario, as well as being easily reached from Buffalo, Niagara Falls and other American cities, no more delightful week-end trip can be planned. A pleasant journey of a few hours by train; a delightful sail of from one to four hours through beautiful lake and island scenery; a couple of days' sojourn at a well-conducted hotel or boarding house at moderate rates; indulging in such recreations as are freely provided at all those resorts, completes a most enjoyable week-end.

HOW TO REACH MUSKOKA.

From points in the South, passengers reach the Grand Trunk Railway either by way of Buffalo and Niagara Falls, or by way of

on one side and Milford Bay on the other, with beautiful stretches of woodland. The course is kept in splendid condition by the Beaumaris Golf and Tennis Association, and is in the centre of a district of magnificent summer homes. Very reasonable fees are charged by the Association for playing privileges and hotel accommodation is had right at the links, where the Beaumaris Hotel is situated. The general layout of the course is admirable. There are five one-shot holes, a couple of long ones, respectively 467 and 476 yards, with a good sprinkling of 300-yard holes. The bogey of the course is 72.

Rosseau Golf Links.—Within a short distance of the Monteith House at Rosseau, Muskoka Lakes, a first-class nine-hole golf course has been laid out. It is now in its fourth season, and improvements and additions have made it very popular with visitors to Muskoka. It is a course of 2,150 yards and is under skilled and careful management.

SPECIAL FEATURES.

Beautiful Side Trips.—The fleet of fine steamers of the Muskoka Lakes Navigation Company gives a splendid twice-daily service to and from all points on the lakes, and the time tables are arranged for the convenience and comfort of tourists at all points affording many a delightful cruise through the chain of lakes and rivers among the hundreds of islands and rugged scenery.



With three fine golf links available, the Royal and Ancient game has taken a strong hold upon the Muskoka District.

Detroit. From each of these points the trains of the Grand Trunk convey the passengers to Muskoka Wharf.

In the West, from Chicago, and points in the Western States, passengers are carried over the main line of this system by way of Port Huron and Toronto, passing through some of the principal cities of the United States and the western part of Ontario. From New York and Buffalo, trains are run over the Lehigh Valley and Grand Trunk, crossing the Grand Trunk's single-arch, double-track steel bridge over Niagara River.

From Toronto, fast Grand Trunk express trains are run solid to Muskoka Wharf.

Passengers from eastern points, such as Quebec, Portland and intermediate stations, proceed via the main line of the Grand Trunk Railway through Montreal to Toronto, and those from Boston and all New England points by connecting lines via the same route, and thence on to Muskoka by the Grand Trunk Railway System.

Tourists from the Maritime Provinces reach the Grand Trunk by the Canadian Government Railways (Intercolonial Railway) via Montreal, and proceed over the main line as above described.

The district may also be reached from Montreal and eastern points over the Ottawa Division of the Grand Trunk System, passing through Ottawa, the Capital City of Canada. This division of the Grand Trunk also passes through Algonquin Provincial (Ontario) Park, a new and attractive region set aside by the Provincial Government as a reserve. It is a region that has won favor with a large number of tourists looking for new fields to explore. Special publication has been issued on this district, which may be obtained from any of our agents.

From points in the East and south of Buffalo, including the States of New York, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Maryland, etc., the route is by way of Niagara Falls, thence Grand Trunk Railway.

OWN A SUMMER HOME IN MUSKOKA.

Come up this summer and view the country. Buy an "Around the Lakes" ticket. If in a hurry you can cover the three lakes, i.e., Rosseau, Joseph and Muskoka, in three days.

To live in Muskoka does not mean roughing it. Provisions are easily obtainable. Supply boats, carrying fresh fruit, groceries, fresh meat, etc., call at cottages at least every other day from June to October. Fresh milk in abundance supplied by nearby farmers.

There are many islands, and mainland and island points for sale; for the more economically inclined there are shore lots from \$100 upwards; there are cottages for sale and for rent, and there are a few hotels offered.

The Muskoka Navigation Company, Gravenhurst; Monteith Bros., Rosseau, Ont., or Mahaffy Bros., Bracebridge, Ont., will be pleased to supply information and assist anyone interested.

MUSKOKA'S CURATIVE WATERS

The most scientific methods have been generally adopted to prevent any pollution of Muskoka's waters. These waters are naturally pure and soft, being free from lime salts. The Muskoka rocks are Laurentian granites and Gneiss. The soft limeless waters have been declared to be of special value to overworked men and women, especially if showing any high blood pressure or arterial changes. The advantages of a soft water supply combined with an ideal climate should be considered when planning a vacation.

RELIEF FROM HAY FEVER

It should also be emphasized that Muskoka, in common with the whole Highlands of Ontario, offers perfect immunity from hay fever. Thousands of people suffer annually from that most distressing and annoying ailment, many of whom are not convalescent for weeks after an attack of the malady. The disease is also called by other names, such as "autumn catarrh," "hay asthma," and "rose catarrh". In some cases it comes on in June with the advent of the roses; in others, with the new-mown hay; but with the majority during the month of August. At this season of the year the Muskoka district is in Nature's most beautiful dress.

CHECKING OF BAGGAGE.

Passengers for the Muskoka Lakes should see that their baggage is checked THROUGH TO DESTINATION ON THE LAKES, BUT IF NOT POSSIBLE TO SO ARRANGE WITH RAILWAY AGENT AT STARTING POINT, IT SHOULD BE CHECKED TO MUSKOKA WHARF. (See Page 18 regarding Customs Arrangements.)

FISHING NOTICE.

The pickerel fish hatchery at Port Carling has been taken over by a new organization, and under the new organization last year deposited in the Muskoka Lakes five and a half million pickerel fry, and this year it is the aim to deposit at least fifteen million.

Any non-resident of the Province of Ontario desiring to angle in the waters of the Province must first obtain an angling permit, the fee for which shall be \$2.00 per rod, said permit to be good until the 31st of December of the calendar year, and must be produced by the person angling when required to do so by the Overseer or other official authority. When remaining on their own boats and not temporarily residing at hotels or boarding-houses, or living in their own cottages, the fee is \$5.00 per rod. The holder of such permit shall be entitled to take with him, when leaving the Province, a new permit for catch of two days' fishing, when the coupon accompanying the permit is attached to the receipt containing the fish, otherwise the fish will be liable to confiscation. These regulations do not apply to the following waters: Niagara River, Detroit River, River St. Clair and St. Mary's River, opposite the State of Michigan. Non-residents fishing in these waters will be charged a fee of \$2.00 per rod, whether they are residing in the Province or fishing from their own boats or yachts.

Permits may be obtained from officers of Game and Fisheries, or from the Department, Legislative Building, Toronto, Ont. Persons acting as guides for hunting or fishing parties must take out licenses.

OPEN SEASON FOR FISH AND GAME.

CUSTOMS ARRANGEMENTS.

Persons visiting Canada for a limited period may bring with them guns, fishing tackle, tents, camp equipment, cameras, bicycles, etc., required for personal use, and such articles must be reported to Canada Customs Inspector when baggage is inspected, and an amount equal to the duty deposited thereon, which amount will be refunded, if the articles are exported from Canada within six months, providing the articles are reported to the Canada Customs Inspector at the time of exportation.

The Customs examination should be attended to at the first port of entry to Canada, but baggage may be bonded to stations in Canada where a Customs Officer is located regularly, and for the convenience of passengers, Customs Inspectors are located at Muskoka Wharf, Huntsville and Burk's Falls during the summer season.

Likewise, a United States Customs Officer will be located at Muskoka Wharf during the tourist season for the examination and bonding of baggage destined to the United States on the return journey.

There is also a Canada Customs Inspector stationed at the Lehigh Valley station in Buffalo during the summer season, to examine baggage for Canada. United States Customs Inspectors for the examination of baggage for the United States are located at Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, London, Collingwood, Quebec, Levis and Muskoka Wharf (during the summer season).
