

PLAN TO BUY HOMES **AS LEASES EXPIRE**

Purchase by the City of Island homes as their leases expire, apparently as part of a long-term program to clear the Islands for re-development purposes, is being anxiously discussed and studied by residents with a view to representations at the next City Parks Committee meeting May 6.

Decision on a recommendation by the city's real estate division for purchase of eight Lakeshore homes on which the leases expire this year was postponed for two weeks at a Parks Committee meeting April 22, after Ald. Herbert Orliffe asked for extra time in order to confer with Island ratepayers.

Of the two remaining leases Of the two remaining leases expiring in 1954, one is that of the Queen City Yacht Club on Algonquin Island.

"As the Club is recreational in character, its continued occuin character, its continued occu-pancy of Island land should not interfere with any plans for Is-land redevelopment and we can should not be renewed for a term expiring December 31. 1968," the report stated.

The other expiring lease men-The other expiring lease men-tioned was at No. 7 Iroquois, of which it was noted only that the property was flanked on eithen side by premises under lease until 1968.

The eight Lakeshore houses were said to be located on land were said to be located on fail "which would be required if a roadway were to be constructed as proposed by the Toronto City Planning Board in its report of 1949 and filling would be necesary, as the land is somewhat low.

AVOID EXPROPRIATION

The report also pointed out that if it were decided to re-develop the Island by taking over properties before the leases had properties before the leases had expired, the City would have to expropriate the leaseshold inter-estion, this would involve con-sideration not only of the build-ing value, but other factors auch as compensation for a set of the expine term of business dis-nurbance. turbance

Reactions of Islanders gener-ally to the proposal were varied. Most seemed to accept the idea that some such announcément was to be expected sooner or later.

"Well, at least we know that they intend to clear the Island by 1968," said one long-time resident.

Many were critical, however, of the way in which the propos-al had been announced. Although the suual copy of the agenda of the Parks Committee meeting at which it was to be discussed was sent to the Inter-Island Council, the householders affect-ed were not informed.

WATT TILL '68 Initial view of many was sum-med up by Aid. Orliffe, who said at the parks meeting that he thought all residents should be dealt with on the same basis in 1965 when the last of the 21-year leases on city-owned Island load coving land expired.

Fear was expressed by many that a "piecemeal" taking over of residences as leases expired would accelerate a trend towards slum conditions, whether the houses were to continue to be rented by the city and occupied until 1968 or not.

OWNERS' OPINIONS

At a meeting of the eight Lakeshore owners last Sunday, opinion was divided as to the most acceptable alternative. Four of the eight were reported to want their leases renewed, if want their leases renewed, it possible; two others were said to be willing to sell now and were more or less agreeable to the proposal, depending on the terms of compensation and futwo had no particular prefer-ence as to the possible alternatives.

Opinion varied according individual circumstances, includ-ing length of residence, amount of work and money invested and permanent or summer residence only.

POLICE CRACK DOWN ON "MISSING" BIKES

An effort to cut down on the number of bicycles regularly reported "missing", stolen and damaged will be made by Island police.

Each year, an average of some 500 bicycles is reported 'missing.'' Most-but not all-are recovered by police or just "turn up", in varying states of repair. In addition, numerous complaints are received, particularly during the Spring and Fall, of damage to machines and petty theft of parts and accessories.

"We're going to try and cut down on this sort of thing," promises Patrol Sgt. Maxwell J. Proctor, who recently joined the local detachment.

If they're to be successful, though, police warn, they'll need the full co-operation of residents.

To protect their machines, police advise Islanders to do two things: first, get a license; second, buy a lock — a good one — and use it. do FOLLIES FOR '53

MOST RECOVERED

Of all bicycles reported miss ing to police, over 95 per cent are normally recovered. Of these, between three and four cent per cent turn up in the city, us-ually at license time. The rest are found "somewhere" on the Islands. From two to three per cent are not recovered.
