Blue Seal Guaranteed Nursery Stock

Avoid disappointment, by buying nursery stock with a name behind it. We grow and ship to customers stock guaranteed true to name (all our Blue Seal Nursery Stock has a blue seal attached to each article) and to be in good condition and inspected when leaving our nursery. However, through causes entirely beyond our control, stock sometimes fails to grow when planted by customers or their agents and for this we feel we are not responsible: but any "Blue Seal" stock planted by our landscape department, failing to make satisfactory growth within six months, will be replaced at one half cost price providing we can satisfy ourselves that stock has had fair treatment.

Landscape Work

Our Landscape Department is prepared to undertake the designing and laying out of estates and gardens, the correct pruning and spraying of old or overgrown trees, shrubs and hedges and to bring them back to normal growth; the building of pools and rock gardens, and the creation of new shrubberies or perennial borders.

Lawns

We maintain the equipment for the treatment of weeds in lawns and other grass areas. Our method destroys weeds without discolouring the grass. The formula used by us acts as a tonic and fertilizer to the grass while riding the lawn of weeds. This work can be carried out over large areas on a guarantee basis.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Prices

The prices in this list are for goods at shipping points in Toronto or for local delivery—boxing, baling, and packing charged extra at cost.

Terms

All orders are booked upon condition that they shall be void should we be unable to supply stock through causes over which we have no control. Goods can be sent C.O.D. to points where there is an express office; otherwise money must accompany order with sufficient to cover packing, express or freight. Any balance will be promptly returned. All orders must be accompanied by at least 25% of the order.

Contracts

Contracts of \$500.00 and under are payable on completion of work. On contracts exceeding \$500.00 payment will be required from time to time as work proceeds; the final payment being due upon completion of work exclusive of any guarantee that might be given. Work undertaken on time and material basis, payment will be required as of above, plus 10% to cover our expenses.

Evergreens

All evergreens are shipped balled in burlap and should be planted without removing the sacking or breaking the ball and receive an abundance of water the first year. While some evergreens are ideal for foundation plants others of the

taller growing varieties are better used as specimen shrubs on the lawn, or for park planting, tall hedges and shelter belts.

Flowering Shrubs

In this line we make a specialty of growing specimen stock suitable for a shrubbery or for foundation planting around a home, all flowering shrubs are transplanted and kept root pruned thus digging with a good fiberous root system. Most should show some bloom the first year of planting.

Shade Trees

All ornamental and shade trees listed are extremely hardy. Most are very rapid growing and make a great addition to any home either as a windbreak or as protection from the summer's heat. Some trees are of tall growth such as the forest giants, our native elm. Others are very floriferous, bearing an abundance of bloom and others are of medium growth while providing shade in the average garden will not become so overpowering as to interfere with other plantings in their vicinity. All newly planted trees should be kept securely staked till well rooted.

Hedging Plants

We cannot speak too highly of the results acquired through a well grown hedge. All types listed have been thoroughly tried for a number of years in our nursery. Some varieties make a formal border or edging for a walk of from 1-2 feet. Other varieties make a dense hedge of from three to four feet, or provide a screen of from twelve to fifteen feet. We suggest severe pruning of all newly planted hedges.

Vines

The vines and climbing plants herein listed are all extremely hardy and are ornamental both in flower and foliage. An unsightly corner or wall can soon be screened at a very small expenditure.

Perennials and Alpines

We believe that we have one of the most complete stock of herbaceous perennials and rock plants in Canada. Perennials can be planted either in the spring or fall, although September is perhaps the best month to plant paeonies and oriental poppies. We grow many other varieties and species, but have only a limited stock, hence they are not included in this catalogue. But as our stock of these rare and exotic plants accumulates we shall be offering them to the public from time to time.

Fruits

The fruit trees listed are those of proven worth for the average home garden or small fruit grower. The apples and crabs are all hardy and well known varieties. Plums and cherries often fail to bear fruit for the reason that some varieties are self-sterile. In which case we recommend planting one or more of a different variety to ensure fertilization of the fruit buds.



Ornamental and Shade Trees	
The trees listed here are of a very large variety, both in foliage and blossom and the purpose for which they are intended. Among them will be found our mighty elms, oaks and maples for street planting and where a large shade tree is desired. 
