

This bibliography has been composed to aid the serious researcher in his or her studies of east Toronto and to allow the local library patrons to learn the history of their homes, schools, or churches. The area which I have covered in my research extends from Woodbine Ave. to Victoria Park Ave. and north at the city limits south to Kingston Rd. I also included the village of Norway because of its historical importance. The time period which I have covered is from the 1880s to the present but I have also included some earlier data found by students working with the EAST TORONTO AND BEACHES HISTORICAL SOCIETY. Each of them did a very indepth study at the various archives and thus some of the information they uncovered dates as far back as the 1790s when Governor John Graves Simcoe resided in "Little York". Eventhough East Toronto included the Beaches (south of Kingston Rd.), I did not include information on that district in my bibliography although some data is already in the local history collection at Main St. library.

East Toronto, in the late 1790s and early 1800s, was part of York Township. However, as soon as prominent Toronto businessmen began buying land further east of the Don, a small village was established and was incorporated as such in 1888. Many of these well-known businessmen and politicians, for example, A.E.Ames and James Lamond-Smith, bought the land and built either permanent homes or summer residences. James Lamond-Smith was responsible for establishing the Toronto Golf Club in 1876 which became an exclusive club for the businessmen. Slowly the area grew and many industries evolved. Andrew McMillan and William Costain introduced a lumber business near Main and Danforth while brick and clay industries were rapidly developing closer to Victoria Park Ave. Therefore, because of the great development and expansion in the east part of Toronto, the area be-

came a separate town in 1903. Doctor W.R. Walters was the first mayor of the Town of East Toronto and a prominent man in the political arena. However, East Toronto was not a town for long. Toronto city limits were extended and by December, 1908, the town was annexed.

East Toronto has many historical buildings and sites.St. John's Norway church, Morton hall, the York station of the Grand Trunk Railway are only a few. There are also some historically important homes and one which is still in good condition today is that of D.G.Stephenson who was one of the most controversial politicians of East Toronto in the 1890s. It is interesting to note that today many of the original buildings still stand, thus giving the area a distinct aura.

I consequently found my researching very worthwhile. I visited the various archives- provincial, religious, educational, and municipal and made references to the important and revelant material of which a large amount has been included in part or in full in the collection at Main St. library. Beaches library also has an interesting historical collection and I found much of the information useful for my area. As previously mentioned, the EAST TORONTO AND BEACHES HISTORICAL SOCIETY had students working for it and concentrating on indepth primary source research Their findings were very helpful anf I have included a synopsis of what they found useful under the various institutions. Thus, a clearer picture of the growth of East Toronto can be given and research will be made easier for the interested student or local person who wishes to further use the archives and libraries discussed.

Finally, the bibliography will be divided into sections such as books and pamphlets, periodicals, newspapers, newspaper articles and newsletters, manuscripts and unpublished documents, Government publications, and directories. Under manuscripts and unpublished documents, the various

archives will be dealt with and public library collections will also be explained. I hope that this bibliography reveals to the local resident the historical importance of the area and that from this basis more research can be conducted.

BOOKS AND PAMPHLETS

This booklet was put out by the Acacia Lodge (Masons) of East Toronto to celebrate its 75th anniversary. A brief history of its development is included and it is important to note that its first meetings were held in the building where D.G. Stephenson had a drugstore and later at the Society hall at Danforth and Dawes Rd. and Snells hall at Gerrard and Main St.

This book is useful for lists of reeves and councillers many were active in government east of the Don. There is also a list of annexation dates and East Toronto is mentionedas being added to Toronto in December, 1908. MTCL

This booklet was published to commemorate the 100th anniversary of St. John's Norway. Included is an up to date history of the Church and its associations as well as a map of the area. *

It is an excellent biography written about one of the most influential families of Toronto. The family also contributed to the growth of East Toronto by funding Hope United Church and turning over the Massey Estate to the City and the area is now known as Dentonia Park.

This book is an excellent work. Noteworthy biographical sketches of all prominent politicians and businessmen of Toronto are given and a picture accompanies each sketch.

This commemorative booklet also gives a good history of the Charch.*

14. Kimberley-75th anniversary: 1882-1957. Toronto, 1957.

This is a booklet briefly describing the history of Kimberley St. School which was once known as Mary St. School.*

15. The Mail and Empire. Toronto the Prosperous: 1872-1906. Toronto, 1906.

This is a book which the tourist in Toronto would have enjoyed looking at in the early 1880s. All the prominent banks, stores and businesses are decribed in elaborate detail and some articles are accompanied by colourful pictures. The only thing pertaining to East Toronto was an advertisement on p.77. for L.A. DeLaplante

Lumber and Hardware at Main St. and Danforth Rd. in East Toronto. MTCL

16. Middleton, Jesse Edgar. The Municipality of Toronto: a history. 3 vols. Toronto: The Dominion Publishing Co., 1923.

Volume I contains a good history of York(Toronto). It mentions transportation growth, business development, and prominent newspapers.

Volume II describes churches, sports clubs, and members on the City Council, i.e. Andrew McMillan-1909.

Volume III contains some biographical sketches on such people as A.H.Cox and George Leslie. MTCL.

17. Presbyterian Church in Canada. Presbytery of East Toronto. A Photographic Record of the Edifices erected for Presbyterian worship within the bounds of the Presbytery of East Toronto., 1974.

This was done as a special project to mark the Centennial of Union in the Presbyterian Church in Canada, 1875-1975. A picture of Emmanuel Presbyterian and a small note on its beginnings is included.

- 19. Robertson, John R. <u>Landmarks of Canada</u>: a guide to the J.Ross Robertson Canadian Historical Collection in the Toronto Public Library. Toronto: Toronto Public Library, 1967, 384pp.

Informative historical sketches onplaces and people in Canada form this book and pictures from the collection are also displayed. Brief biographical notes are given on A.E.Ames and John Small.

20. Robertson's Landmarks of Toronto: a collection of historical sketches of the old Town of York from 1792 until 1833, and of Toronto from 1834 to 1914. Republished from the Toronto "Evening Telegram". 6vols. Toronto: J.Ross Robertson, 1894-1914.

The articles in these books originally appeared in the columns of Robertson's paper, the Toronto Evening Telegram. As they accumulated, they were made up into pages and then into book form. This means that there is no chronological or topical order to the series. Robertson's came partly from manuscripts, but the large part came "from the lips of the pioneers". Volume 4 was very useful for church histories.

This book includes a good description of East Toronto on p. 30. "Going east the cars cross the Don River, pass the baseball grounds and continue to the Woodbine Racetrack, Kew Beach, Balmy Beach, Victoria Park, and through a section of magnificent scenery traversed by streets which to the summer outing homes in bushlands near the lake where many Torontonians and summer visitors from the States pass the season in cottages. Bathing and boating are extremely popular here.

At the Woodbine Park, the Toronto Railway connects with the Scarbore Electric Railway which passes through what is very aptly described as the "Switzerland of America". This line has its terminus at the Victoria Park gates. Round trip tickets are issued over both systems for fifteen cents."

NEWSPAPERS

There were a number of newspapers which dedicated columns to East Toronto activities. The Toronto Telegram dedicated many articles to the east end in the early 1900s. Copies can be looked at on microfilm at the Metro Reference Library but the condition of these are not the best. The Toronto World which is no longer in print gave excellent coverage of political and social events in East Toronto in the 1890s and early 1900s. Copies of this newspaper can also be looked at on microfilm at the Metro Reference Library and I have included a number of these interesting articles in the collection at Main St. Library.

There were also numerous other papers dedicated in part or in whole to East Toronto and they are no longer in print. Some of these are the East End Eye-Opener, The East Ender, the East Toronto Standard, the York Citizen and Gazette, the Orient, and the Recorder of North Toronto, East Toronto Village and the Township and County of York. Copies of the Recorder can be seen on microfilm at the Ontario Archives

and the Orient can be studied at the Ontario Historical Society. However the other papers do not appear to be preserved at any institution.

LOCAL NEWSPAPERS

I previously mentioned the Toronto World and the Recorder as being papers which gave good coverage of East Toronto. Still in print is Ward 9 Community News and it has been in existence since 1972.

A number of back issues are available at Main St. Library and a complete collection is available at Beaches Library. It is an excellent community newspaper and many historical buildings and people have been written about by members of the EAST TORONTO AND BEACHES HISTORICAL SOCIETY. Ihave included numerous articles from the paper in the collection but I will not list each individually as back copies of the paper are available.

Both the Toronto Public Library Scrapbooks and Biographical Scrapbooks were put together by librarians in the library system to preserve old newspaper articles that could be used for further research. Both scrapbooks are on microfilm and are at Northern District Library and the Metro Reference Library. The TPL Scrapbooks is a collection of newspaper articles on places, people and events of Toronto and is on reels in twelve volumes.

MANUSCRIPTS AND UNPUBLISHED DOCUMENTS

All manuscripts and unpublished documents can be found at the various archives and several public libraries in Toronto. The archives that I found useful were the Church Archives, the School Board Archives, the Ontario Archives and the City of Toronto Archives. The public libraries that had some unpublished materials were the Beaches Branch Library, Northern District Library, and the Metropolitan Toronto Central Reference Library where the Baldwin Room is situated. I will discuss each institution separately and list the documents that were relevant to East Toronto.

TORONTO PUBLIC LIBRARIES

1. Metro Toronto Central Library

I have previously noted that all books written about Toronto can be found in the Canadian History section of the library. There are also City Directories dating back to the 1890s. Finally there is a very useful vertical file cabinet of newspaper articles on prominent people, places and buildings in Toronto and I found many revelant articles there.

The Baldwin Room

An interesting manuscript and picture collection are preserved here. The Baldwin Room is situated also in the Canadian history area of the library. I came across a couple of interesting documents relevant

to the area.

I found the Beaches Library very useful. A good historical collection

is there and can be looked at by any interested patron. The collection consists of several photographs-some originals and some copies from City Hall Archives collection. The papers of the Ward Eight Ratepayer's Association from 1921 and 1922 were helpful and copies are now in the Main St. collection.

Northern District Library

This library has an excellent historical collection on Toronto.

Old rare books such as Robertson's Landmarks are there along with copies of Donald Jones articles on famous people and places in Toronto. There is also an entire cabinet dedicated to Newspaper articles m Toronto .On microfilm there is the Toronto Public Library Scrapbook and the Biographical Scrapbook. There are also Back issues of the York Pioneer, the Ontario Historical Society, and Might's Directories.

The Municipal Reference Library

This reference Library is located at the City Hall and contains useful information. There is a large vertical file cabinet which is divided into planning districts, for example, the Beaches which takes in my area of research. In these files are newspaper clippings from 1930-present. Old newspaper articles are on microfiche. There are also Census Tracts from the 1940s -which can be useful in determining population densities in certain areas as well as ethnic influence. Copies of old Planning Board Reports can be looked at and they are also divided into district. There are also City Council Reports and copies of books on Old Toronto but the collection is not as complete as that at the Metro Reference Library.

Church Archives

The Anglican Church of Canada, Diocese of Toronto Archives

This archive holds all parish records including parish histories parish registers, consecration documents, original deeds, pictures, and

Synod Journals. Ifound useful information on St. John's Norway and St. Saviour's in East Toronto.

The St. John the Baptist Norway Collection

There are copies of the two published histories in the collection.

The St. Saviour Church Collection

There is not a great deal of information on the Church at the archives because the Church has kept its records . However, I did come across a couple of interesting petitions .

1. The parishioners at St.Saviour's to the Lord Bishop of Toronto-a petition . 1890.

The parishioners demanded that the Church Decome a new and separate parish. Some prominent people who signed the petition were William Hodge, Frank Boston, George and Frank Empringham, and William Hewitt.

2. The parishioners at St. Saviours to the Lord Bishop of Toronto-A petition. 1921.

The parishioners objected proposals of All Hallows Mission to make the Grand Trunk Railway Tracks the northern boundary of St. Saviour' Some prominent names were George Empringham , the Osbornes, E. Snell, the

Dawes, L.E.Cox, and Charles Hewitt.

There was also a register of parishes which had been started by Rev.

Sweatman. A brief Chronological history of St. Saviour's was included.

The General Synod Archives

This archive is excellent for gathering copies of published Church histories. There is a card catalogue which is useful for noting what is available on each Church. Copies of the Canadian Churchman are available on microfilm. Ifound a couple of interesting articles from that journal; one was dated 1890 about the opening of St. Saviour's and another was dated 1945 discussing the consecration of the Church.

The Archdiocese of Toronto (R.C.) Archives

The Roman Catholic Church Archives holds all parish records of the Roman Catholic Churches in Toronto. Marriage register records are on micro film, letters of correspondence, and histories of thechurches are all included in the collection. Something which I found most useful was an architectural inventory of all the churches. The inventory on St. John's was excellent in giving a detiled history of the Church.

There are individual files for each church which contain Church histories, orders of service, minute books, records of Church expenditures and correspondence papers. I found useful information in the Emmanuel Presbyterian Church Collection.

This archive is also located at the University of Toronto in Victoria College. I found things easily accessible and the people very helpful. Folders which held parish histories were the most helpful and I copied Church histories for Glenmount United and Hope United.

The School Board Archives and Libraries.

The Metropolitan Separate School Board Archives

This library and archive is now located at 60 Sheppard Ave.E. The archives is not well organized but the archivist is very helpful and knows the material. Basically there are no individual files for schools but documents are kept in large boxes arranged by decades and then by school. There are also Minutes of the Roman Catholic School Board of Toronto, 1878-present. Is was successful in locating some documents of tenders for St. John's Elementary School and Notre Dame High School but the schools unfortunately have kept their own histories.

The Toronto Board of Education Records and Archives Centre The Library

The Library has a school file which contains past and present newspaper articles, copies of school bulletins and brief histories of the schools in the system. The schools in my area were Kimberley, Main St., Coleman Ave., Gledhill, Norway, Malvern Collegiate. There are also School Board Minutes. There are East Toronto School Board Minutes from 1903-1903. At that time East Toronto was a separate town and thus had a separate Board Of Education. Therefore schools in East Toronto before 1903 were noted in the Public School Board Minutes and again after 1903 when East Toronto once again became part of the City. East Toronto Public School Section #6. Minute Books. 1891-1901. East Toronto High School Board. Minute Books. 1903-1908

Norway: York Township School Section #20. Minutes. Dec. 26, 1894- Dec. 19, 1907

Jan. 26, 1903-Nov.6, 1909. I have included copies of all information from the historical school files in the Main St. Library collection

under each appropriate heading . These are too numerous to list here but are excellent research sources for the collection

The Archives

The archives has an excellent picture collection of all the schools and and historical school files which hold valuable documents. There is also an interesting artifacts collection which is on display.
