The Work of the Toronto Fellowship

FOUNDED in 1905, by the late E. S. Williamson, the Toronto Branch of The Dickens Fellowship has, from its inception, devoted the great bulk of its funds to the assistance of the sick or under-privileged child.

Two cots have been endowed in the Toronto Hospital for Sick Children; two in the Hospital for Incurable Children; one in the Queen Mary Hospital for Consumptive Children, and one in the Orthopaedic Hospital, totalling an expenditure of ten thousand dollars.

For twenty years the Fellowship has provided a special Treat at Christmas for the Hospital for Incurable Children, and the occupants of Fellowship cots are specially remembered.

For the past eight years The Dickens Fellowship Christmas Tree and Treat has brought to many little ones an extra whiff of that "Spirit of Christmas" which Dickens did so much to spread abroad.

Three years ago the Toronto Branch built the Charles Dickens Memorial Dining Hall at the Children's Fresh Air Camp at Bolton. Last year they gave three of the cabins which are replacing tents, naming them for "Little Nell," "Sissy Jupe," and "Little Em'ly." This year an additional gift of two cabins is being made to the Camp — "David Copperfield" and "Oliver Twist."

The Fellowship has made substantial donations to the Great Ormond Street Hospital, in which Dickens was so interested, and to the purchase fund of the Dickens House, Doughty Street. In Western Canada, a school section was named for Dickens, and the Toronto Branch has recognized this by the presentation of his

portrait and a copy of David Copperfield to the school.

In these and sundry minor ways the Fellowship has sought to carry out the teachings of the great-hearted man whose love for humanity, interest in children and the under-privileged, and disgust with all forms of hypocrisy and sham, together with his sweetening sense of humour, has helped to right many wrongs, correct many abuses, bring encouragement and cheer to many hearts, and make of "Dickens" a household word.

So much for the tangible accomplishments of the Toronto Branch. Who can estimate the influence of this group of Dickens lovers, on the viewpoint and sympathies of the city at large? Beginning with a small band of devoted students and admirers of the much-loved author, the Branch now numbers 1,200. Toronto has been particularly fortunate in having as its Presidents such men as the late E. S. Williamson, the late F. M. Bell-Smith, Mr. Albert E. S. Smythe, and at present, Mr. Jas. W. McFadden, each of whom has made a distinct contribution to the wonderful growth and development of the Branch. Leaders of thought in many directions have been actively associated with the Fellowship and rendered valuable service, and the Executive Council of the Toronto Branch look forward with hope and confidence to still greater success crowning their efforts to "spread a love and knowledge of Dickens," a greater appreciation of the things he stood for, and a closer feeling of kinship, especially among the Englishspeaking peoples.


