THE CORONATION

On Coronation morning King George VI will leave Buckingham Palace accompanied by the Queen Consort. They will ride in the historic State Coach drawn by a team of eight Windsor Greys. Upon arrival at Westminster Abbey, Their Majesties will be received by great officers of State, in the robes or uniforms of their offices, headed by the Earl Marshall they will precede the King and Queen up the nave to where the Archbishop of Canterbury reverently places the St. Edward Crown on His Majesty's head. This is marked by a sudden and brilliant illumination. The great assembly will burst into an Acclamation in which thousands of voices will exclaim "God Save the King, Long Live the King", to an accompanying fanfare of trumpets and drums.

The Queen Consort is then crowned by command of the King.

One of the most interested spectators of this coronation will undoubtedly be the Heir Presumptive to the throne, Princess Elizabeth, the charming little daughter of our King and Queen, who is in her eleventh year.
