Stephens in Bond Street for Army & Fashionables. 30 or 40 saddle horses & litters often outside.

Whites, Boodles', Brookes, Wallers (Bolton St Piccadilly) Guards, Arthurs & Grahams only West End clubs. White's best. Great place for play. General Scott who lived on toast & water & won 200,000 at Whist.

Brookes was a Whig Club, Charles James Fox, Schuyler, Lord Carlisle & others played faro & Macao.

George Harley Drummond of the Charing Cross Bank lost 20,000 in one night to Brummell at White's.

Howard & Gibbs the money lenders.

A pipeful of powder or shot.

Kings rooms (when ill) on North terrace of Windsor

15/- price for public dinner

George drank sweet liqueurs.

Scot (d) dressed in loose satin robe lined with fur Wagons, post chaises, Mail coaches - only 4 people inside little milk carts drawn by dogs.

Foreigners admired the flagstones of London.

Fitzgerald's 'George the Fourth'

| George IV could play on violoncello - had a good voice

| Fond of Ranelagh and Vauxhall - taught boating by Angels.

He was nearly forty in the year 1800 - had no idea of telling the truth

Duke of Cumberland, his uncle, was worse than himself.

Charles Fox - harsh dark saturnine face - two black shaggy eyebrows - pleasant smile broad heavy figure - lodged in St James' Street.

Hellgate Barry - brother to Cripplegate Barry (club-footed), brother to Newgate Barry (Rev. Augustus)

Their sister was Billingsgate Barry - became Lady Melfort.

Lord Barrymore (Hellgate) could turn verses and was musical - alternated between gentleman and blackguard - would drive instead of postillions - would fight waggons House at Wargrave, near Maidenhead - he was a good actor. Hooper the tin-man was his bodyguard. Hooper dressed like a clergyman died at twenty-three (1794)

Duke of Queensberry - born in 1725 - drove carriage nineteen miles in an hour - little sharp-looking man - very irritable -

Hon. George Hanger - goose and turkey man -

Mrs Fitzherbert - 1785 - 28 years old - used to hide under sofa to escape the Prince's companions

Duke of Orleans in England.

Duke of York's duel in 1789 with Colonel Lenox

Fondness for horse flesh - Currie - Asparagus - Torbay (his horses) - races at Newmarket - Sam Chiffney

the jockey.

Duke of Kent - a nonentity - served in the army - eternally in debt.

Duke of Clarence - guilty of misappropriation in the navy
Augustus Frederick - sixth son of King - afterwards Duke of Sussex.

1794 - Prince broke with Mrs Fitzherbert - wooing of Caroline of Brunswick by Lord Malmesbury
Marriage April 8th 1795 - quarrelled as they were leaving church - separated in three weeks

George III He He He What? what? - fussy bustling manner - Amateur theatricals all the rage.

Picnic society performed in Tottenham Court Road - Volunteer enthusiasm - Speaker of the House and Prime Minister used to drill every day. Prince eternally proposing extraordinary plans. Prince commanded 10th light dragoons. Sir Philip Francis used to interrupt Prince in his stories & say "Well sir, well sir, what then?" Prince rebuked him by saying - "If Sir Philip Francis will let me proceed." Francis' character was fierce and uncontrolled. The King said, There is only one of my children who wants courage, and I will not name him because he is to succeed me - Capable of great good nature. Merry goodhumoured man - tall, portly; laughing eyes, pouting lips, nose slightly turned up. Well powdered wig with pigtail (1796) - Coat single-breasted and buttoned up to chin. Leather pantaloons, Kessian boots, huge white neckcloth round throat.

Inquiry into Princess Caroline's conduct 1806
Death of Pitt about 1806

Princess Caroline - in her youth a pretty woman - fine light hair - good complexion delicate features, penetrating eyes - good mouth - head too large

neck too short, figure stumpy - defiant expression, but could be very queenly. 'Mein god, dat is the dullest person god Almighty ever did born.'

He was ascending the stairs, when he heard the sound of singing and whistling, and ^{presently} saw the King. He had a whip with which he was switching his boots. At sight of doctor, he gave a piteous shriek - 'Oh, John Willis again; god help me.' - And fell on the ground in a fit. (1810)

1811 - Lady Hartford - platonic affection.

Prince's fingers so swelled that rings had to be sawn off. (1811)

Prince would speak about State affairs before the servants

1812. Percival assassinated.

Lord Morda Prince's friend

Duke of Clarence married Princess Adelaide of Saxe-Meiningen

George IV died 1820.

Dandies

Dandies of 10th would not go to Manchester when regiment was ordered there.

Brummel lived in Chesterfield St. - took two people to make his gloves, one cutting the thumb, the others the fingers. He said that with strict economy one might dress out £600 a year.

Carried about with him a huge chest of toilet utensils. "Gave him my arm all the way from White's in St James St to Wattier's in Bruton St"

Jack Lee - Alvanley - Pierpoint - Sir H. Mildmay

"Good snuff box for summer but would not do for winter wear."

1816 See bolted from England.

Lord Yarmouth - another dandy - known as "Red Herring."

King Allen - said English could make nothing well but a kitchen poker.

Lord Fife - Golden Ball Hughes - £40000 a year - great gambler

Pearl Green Haynes - Beckford - Hoby the bootmaker

Roland the hairdresser, both in St James' St.

Almacks in King St, St James' for dancing

Extravagance of George IV found among his effects -

£10000 in 500 pocket books of different dates - great quantity of hair - some locks with powder and pomatum still on them - heaps of gloves - Royal plate, worth nearly two million - Coronation cost £250,000. ~~Fearful waste in kitchen.~~

Harvey of the Ramillies was his brother.

195. Lord Bridport took place of Howe.

The Circumspection shown by the British Navy during the first three years gave place later to great audacity.

At this time 1200 francs in paper were 20 in Gold.

From 95 the French gave up the sea supremacy & took to Commerce-destroying. 195 was a bad year on land for France.

'I wish to God someone would assassinate Knighiton'

Damn Watson! Let him wait!

Never gets up till six in the evening - very violent on the Catholic question - open window curtains at 7 in the morning, then he breakfasts in bed, reads paper, dozes, gets up, in bed again by 10. Rings bell 40 times a night. Won't put out his hand for a glass, or look at his watch.

Autobiography of a Seaman. (Dundonald).

Good seamen in 1793 were promoted to the Quarter deck.

A Seaman setting up rigging would have a ^{lump of grease} master spike in his hand, & a marlin spike slung round his neck.

Acquaintance of life bounded by the bowsprit & the taffrail.

Worthless vessels were continually brought into the service in exchange for baronial influence. (£400 a month)

Payzemoney was the great inducement with sailors.

Walking the deck with a sloops broadside (7 4 ps) in his pocket. First lieutenant dressed as a seaman gammoning & rigging the bowsprit (no dredged meetings in 93).

Though we beat Napoleon he wounded us sorely - we still
feel his weapon in our vitals. our national debt is the greatest
monument ever raised to his greatness.

'A Ship professedly in ballast - but among the shingle church plate.
French Convention bought supplies' with them.

Rigging not properly set up, ship rolling, masts swaying until the shrouds
were tight as iron bars on one side & hanging in fathoms on the other.

1798 Queen Charlotte destroyed with 700 men by fire near Calabria

Bonne Citoyenne corvette of 18 guns.



Mouth thin-lipped but pleasant to laugh. Teeth good, chin short, jaw heavy, well formed hands & feet, of which he was very proud.

He had little education & no manners "A man who can neither make a bow, rise from a chair or enter a room". Harsh voice. abrupt Questions. "No generosity in him". He would say "He lies better than he did". Tried to separate all his followers from each other. "A Cowardly Act! Why not? Why should I not do a Cowardly Act?"

When Talleyrand was Minister of Foreign Affairs under the Directory he lent 100,000 francs to N.B. then starting for Egypt. N.B. could never tell why.

Remained on friendly terms with Talma the Actor. "I am slapping a king". Despised women. Had hardly ever known ladies, debauched Italy, Paris under the Directory. "I have found a wife for you & I have announced the wedding which occurs on Sunday".

Josephine (Madame de Beauharnais) made him



There was only one Cuirassier regiment until 1803 when Nap created eleven.

Dark blue coat, light blue breeches, horse hair helmets.

Sequo's description of a fine French type still found in 1800.

These were the Spartans of the Rhine who filled the armies in 1793. Men who despised all reward, looked upon themselves as citizens not soldiers, and were distinguished for their courage, their simple habits & the republican austerity of their appearance. They looked with disdain upon the new type of ambitious & luxurious generals.

In Moreau's Army (1800) there was great equality among officers & the same tone with the Commander.

Macdonalds had a somewhat grumbling disposition when he had grievances
Otherwise polished & wary.

The French Army in 1801 still felt that it represented the people against the aristocracy of France & of Europe. Generals & officers all dated from 1792 and still smarted under the old humiliations of the Monarchy.

The Generals when peace came found it very difficult after the deposition of their headquarter to take an inferior position.

Bernadotte would have all to himself - or nothing.
